THE advantage of elevated railroads as a method of rapid transit in cities has been generally recognized in the United States, and the system is soon to have a considerable extension. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company have begun to prolong their line by this means. The Reading Railroad is about to follow the example, and people of Pittsburgh have applied to their Council for permission to construct an elevated track in their city. Other charters have been applied for in the same State. Boston also intends making application to the Massachusetts Legislature for a charter for an elevated railroad which will connect the Highlands and other outlying points with the city. When will Canada follow in this branch of enterprise?

JUVENILE SINGING CLASSES.—Mr. J. W. Youmans will open a singing class in the Athenæum on Wednesday evening next. The subjects he will teach are:—"Rudimental Blackboard Exercises, Voice Culture, Object Lessons; also, Manners and Etiquette, whereby boys and girls will be enabled to appear with ease and grace in company, and demean themselves like little Ladies and Gentlemen; in fact, the training of the children will partake largely of the method adopted in the popular Kindergarten Schools of New York and Boston, which are so successfully governed by the irresistible law of Kindness and Love." The Press of the neighboring Provinces commend Mr. Youmans. Mr. Youmans will lecture in the Athenæum on Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock. Subject: "Punctuation." Admission, 5 cents.

HALIFAX AS A WINTER PORT.—A Herald reporter has interviewed Sir Hugh Allan in Halifax:—

Rep.—Returning to the "Winter Port" question, Sir Hugh, when do you think Halifax will become the winter grain shipping port?

Sir Hugh—Not until your people build elevators, and make an effort to make it a grain shipping port. I may say that Halifax is not naturally a suitable port for shipping grain, but it can be made so by artificial means. It never can become so, however, until there is through connexion with Chicago over Government Railways, with low rates. What is wanted is the purchase by the Government of the Quebec Shore Line, so they can make through connections with the grain markets, and carry it at low rates. The people of Halifax must do the rest. We do not want to go to Boston or Baltimore, and would only be too glad to make this our winter port of destination when we can secure return cargoes. Until then we will have to continue our trips to American ports.

Rep.—I notice that some of the Quebec ministers are now in Ottawa trying to sell the North Shore Road. Do you think they will accomplish their object, Sir Hugh?

Sir Hugh—I don't know.
