- AVOID GETTING OVERTIRED**—Too strenuous play, long swimming periods, late hours cause fatigue. Extreme fatigue makes an individual more susceptible to polio infection.
- AVOID CHILLING**—Don't stay too long in cold water or play too long in wet bathing suits. Don't swim in polluted waters.
- KEEP CLEAN**—Especially keep hands clean. Wash hands before eating and after going to toilet.
