CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 13—(CP)—Two veteran sharpshooters engaged today in a shooting duel that long will be remembered.

They matched bulls-eye for bulls-eye for 15 shots to break a tie in the featured Connaught match of the opening day of the 83rd Dominion of Canada Rifle Association meet.

A Gruelling Grind As some 100 spectators and marksmen watched, they matched shot for shot after the regulation five shoot-off rounds were fired.

Plane Lands On Greenland Glacier

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 13—(CP)—A nine-man party of the United States Air Rescue Service was camped on the Greenland ice cap today after making the first successful landing of a triphibious aircraft there this week-end.

The plane, first of its kind in history, is a Gruman SA-16 amphibian modified by a ski under the keel and small skis under the wing floats for snow and ice landings.

It touched down gently on a mile-thick glacier after two touch-and-go landings which left long, deep skid marks on the ice. It was accompanied by a helicopter on an exercise in Arctic rescue work ordered by Maj. Gen. Lyman P. Whittem, commander in chief of the U. S. Northeast Command with headquarters here.

Col. Richard T. Knight, chief of the Air Rescue Service who flew up from Washington to observe the experiment and landed in command of the ground crew, reported by radio the triphibian would not take off "until project requirements have been fulfilled."

New Air Navigation School Opens Today

Winnipeg, Aug. 13—(CP)—Training will start today at the R. C. A. F.'s new Air Navigation School at Winnipeg's Stevenson Field.

Eleven R. C. A. F. flight cadets and 12 C. A. F. acting pilot officers arriving yesterday from basic training at London, Ont., to take the 36-week course.

The first course for North Atlantic Treaty Organization students—from Belgium, Norway, Italy, France and possibly other countries—will get under way early next January.

Wing Commander Fred Y. Craig came here from Air Transport Command headquarters at Rockcliffe, Ont., to head the school.

Kremlin Busy Patching Dent In Iron Curtain

LONDON, Aug. 13—(Reuters)—The Kremlin is doing its best to patch up a dent in the Iron Curtain made by the West, close observers of Soviet affairs said yesterday.

They said the dent was made by 1. Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison's statement in Pravda, charging a lack of freedom for the individual in Russia; 2. President Truman's message to Soviet President Nikolai Shvernik and the "friendship" message to the Russian people sent by the United States Congress.

Observers disclaim any suggestion that Russia is adopting a "liberalization" policy, but add that they seem anxious to wind-down-dress for their own people and for the benefit of Communist sympathizers in the West.

Comments on Russia said that the impact of these unencensored Western views on the Russian people must have been considerable—despite the official Russian replies which sought to disprove Western charges and extract a maximum propaganda advantage.

The inference drawn here is that Morrison's statement was "too strong meat" for satellite countries whose people have not been conditioned by 30 years of political propaganda.

Observers pointed to several indications during the last week that Russian authorities are trying to disprove Western charges that Russia is a police state totally regimenting its citizens.

1. The deputy patriarch of Moscow and all-Russia, Metropolitan Nikolai, in a public declaration stressed that church leaders have travelled abroad and foreign church leaders have visited Russia.

2. The Mayor of Stalingrad announced acceptance of an invitation to visit Coventry, Britain's most-blasted industrial city.

3. A British "friendship" delegation has visited Soviet Central Asia—the first Western delegation to do so for many years. This is an area from which diplomats and resident foreigners in Russia are normally barred.

Begin Exploration Of Deepest Cave

OLORON, France, August 13—(AP)—A team of Belgians and Frenchmen today started probing the deepest natural cave ever explored.

The cave, known as the Pit of St. Pierre Martin, goes 1,068 feet straight down before branching off into a gallery, according to the explorers. Several corridors lead out from the 300-foot high gallery, and wind currents that whistle through them led the explorers to believe they may connect a network of natural tunnels under the Pyrenees Mountains.
