

Local and Other Items.

QUEEN SQUARE.—Mr. Newbery is rushing the work on Queen Square. That's right.

RELIEF FOR THE SUFFERING.—The Governor-General has forwarded \$500 to assist the sufferers of the late St. Sauveur, Que., fire.

FROM BOSTON.—The steamer Worcester, Captain Nickerson, arrived from Boston this forenoon, with the usual general cargo and several passengers.

POLICE COURT.—Two countrymen—James Duffy and James Lacey—charged with drunkenness, were this morning fined \$2 or 8 days, and \$4 or 20 days respectively.

HOME FOR INTERMENT.—The body of Thos. Bell, who was accidentally killed at Tacoma, arrived here last evening, and was interred in the Peoples' Cemetery. The funeral was largely attended.

QUICK GROWTH.—An exchange says: Mr. B. W. Kay, of Kay Settlement, Salisbury, N. B., took from his cellar and planted last Saturday week some "Manitoba" potatoes. On Thursday last the stalks were five inches above the ground.

THUNDER STORM.—A severe thunder storm was experienced at Guysboro, N. S., the other evening. During the progress of a social prayer meeting in the Baptist Church, the electric current passed down the chimney, and extinguished the lights, causing considerable alarm. No one was hurt.

CORRECT.—The Pictou Standard, referring to the football match at that place on Saturday last, says: "The Charlottetown men have played here now annually for five or six years; they always play well, and conduct the game in a fair and gentlemanly manner."

READY FOR USE.—The new Armstrong breech-loading rifle guns, which have been here for some time past, are now mounted and will probably be ready for practice to-morrow evening. One was mounted by No. 1 Battery, G. A., last Thursday evening, and the other by No. 2 Battery on Monday evening.

NEW TELEGRAPH STATION.—A movement to secure a new telegraph signal station at Tonga Island, on the northwest coast of Ireland, is again being pressed upon the Imperial Government. This station being on the Canadian route, the Canadian steamship companies are interested in the movement.

FROST.—Says the Moncton Transcript of Monday: There was quite a heavy frost last night, but no damage is reported near Moncton. A party from Pellet River says, however, that the frost there was very heavy. Many apple blossoms were destroyed, while ice formed on ponds, etc., to the thickness of over an eighth of an inch.

THE SALMON CROP.—A New Brunswick exchange says: The land-locked salmon placed in Chamecock Lake a few years ago, have thrived and multiplied. One fisherman captured 13 there one day recently. J. M. Hanson, of St. Andrews, took six, and Dr. Harry Grove and other gentlemen were equally successful.

GOINGS BEGGING.—T. P. O'Connor, M. P., says in his London cable to the New York World: The topic on which people are talking is the difficulty of the Government in failing to secure a successor to Lord Londonderry, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. Although there is a salary of \$20,000 a year attached to the position the post is going a-begging.

THE GASPEREAUX FISHERY.—The St. John Sun says: The yield up to date has been about the same as last year, but as the season will continue until about the middle of June it is believed the total catch will be about 5,000 barrels of the best quality and 500 barrels of the second. So far no sales have taken place, the market being quiet. Dealers are waiting to see what the catch will be before buying.

COST HIM HIS LIFE.—A Montreal telegram reports the remarkable death of a medical student named Landerville. It appears that Landerville, with a number of friends, opened a vein in his leg for the purpose of demonstrating a certain theory of his own in surgery. Not being able to stop the flow of blood, Landerville was taken to Notre Dame Hospital, where he died shortly after.

COMING.—A celebrated Zulu chief (Simoon Zama) and his interpreter, D. Van Beck (Zulu Simoon), are about making a tour of the Provinces, and have written the manager of the Lyceum for dates. They lecture and give a stage performance. They were with Barnum for some years, but are now among the curious at Austin's Nickelodeum, Boston. Should they decide to visit the Island they will likely have good houses.

LOOKS LIKE PROSPERITY.—Mr. J. J. Gillis, the well-known tonsorial artist and all-round punster, has had the interior of his hair-dressing establishment thoroughly renovated and beautified. The walls and ceiling have been nicely papered and painted, the chairs re-upholstered, new mirrors put in and other improvements made. His establishment is now one of the best in the Maritime Provinces.

Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, May 28.

The twenty-first meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association takes place on September 2nd. According to the programme the prize list aggregates upwards of \$7,000, the largest ever offered.

Sir Henry Loch, Governor of Victoria, intends to return to Melbourne from England in August via Canada, and will pay a short visit to Lord Stanley.

The Post Office Department has authorized proceedings against infringements of the postal law in several cities by private letter carriers.

Dr. Playter, of Ottawa, is again booming the establishment of a central board of health for Canada. He has enlisted the sympathy of several members of Parliament.

Cardinal Taschereau's Circular.

QUEBEC, May 28.

Cardinal Taschereau, who is about to commence his annual pastoral visits to the different parishes of the arch-diocese, has issued a circular to the clergy and people, expressing a desire that the custom of lining roads by which he passes with young trees and erecting triumphal arches of the same, be abolished, as it is exceedingly difficult and expensive to procure decorations in older parishes. He also absolutely prohibits all fireworks, cannonade and fusillades in his honor as another cause of useless expense, declaring the best mark of respect his people can pay him on these occasions is their diligent attention at the offices of the church.

Indicted for Murder.

CHICAGO, May 28.

Detective Daniel Coughlan, Patrick O'Sullivan and the ice-man, Frank J. Black, alias Woodruff, were indicted by the Grand Jury this evening for the murder of Dr. Cronin. This result was reached after an investigation lasting several hours, during which two dozen witnesses were examined, and a mass of evidence considered. No evidence was introduced to prove conspiracy, and the Grand Jurors were unanimous for indicting all three.

Pugilistic.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.

The first of a series of contests for the middle-weight championship of America took place to-night between George LeBlanche, the Marine, of Boston, and Mike Lucie, of Philadelphia. Lucie was knocked out in the thirteenth round.

Yacht Racing.

NEW YORK, May 28.

The America Cup committee held a meeting to-day, and it is said they determined to adhere to the conditions of holding the cup under the deed gift, to which the yacht squadron objects. There may, therefore, be no race this season.
