Ch'Town Royalty And Vicinity

The Annual District Convention of the Women's Institutes of P. E. I. was held in Parkdale School hall on Wednesday last, when Hastings, Milton, Spring Park, West Royalty, Central Royalty, and East Royalty Institutes, were the guests of Parkdale Institute. Both sessions were unusually instructive and entertaining and were well attended. This event marks a mile stone in the life of this up to date school erected two years ago by Vall Bros, filled with running water, an oil heating system, etc. It is one of the best equipped schools in the Province. At the time of opening, two rooms were furnished on the ground floor and two teachers, Miss Rena McFadyen and Miss Fanny Leigh were engaged. The second floor was used as a community hall. Two months later a music teacher, Miss Helen Calbeck of St. Avarids, was added to the teaching staff. At Christmas Miss McFadyen resigned to take up the study of nursing at the Royal Victoria Hospital at Montreal. Miss Victoria Hospital at Montreal. Miss N. B. Brenton B. A. was engaged to her place. Last summer a third room was opened on the second floor. School opened with Mr. L. H. Dignan, Prince County and Miss Fanny Leigh, both of Charlottetown, re-engaged, all receiving good supplements, Miss Calbeck was again employed by Parkdale Women's Institute to instruct the children in singing. This spring the Institute purchased a nine foot flag, and with the co-operation of the trustees, erected a forty foot pole on the school grounds, this adds a great deal to the appearance of the school and should do much to foster a spirit of patriotism in the pupils. Keen interest has been taken in the school by the community in general and the Women's Institute in particular, and much credit is due the citizens of the newly formed School District of Parkdale, made up as it is of parts of several districts represented by persons of varied outlooks and interests, all working together and showing a community spirit worthy of a district of long standing. It is understood that plans are afoot to build a public hall to meet the ever increasing needs of this growing community. The school trustees for the coming year are Mr. Niel D. Walker, Mr. Joseph Gaudet, and Mr. Heron re-elected, with Mr. Warren Burn's as secretary.
