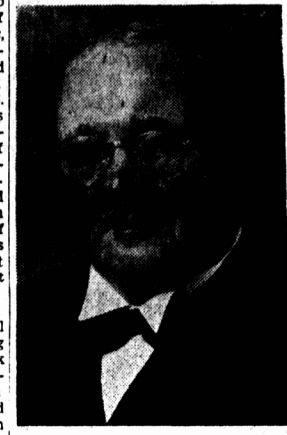
Consumer Price

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Higher prices for foodstuffs also were the chief factor in the May rise in the consumer price index. The bureau said the rise in the prices of eggs, fresh fruits and vegetables in June were seasonal. Fresh pork which had risen sharply in May dropped back. Beef was unchanged. Fractional increases were recorded for flour and bread and similar decreases for cheese and butter. But the increases heavily outweighed decreases to drive the food sub-index to 112.7 from 111.4. The clothing sub-index rose to 110.3 from 110.1 mainly because of higher prices for knitting yarns, overalls and work shirts. Increased coal, gas and household help prices drove the household operation index to 117 from 116.6. Rents were higher and the costs of home ownership heavier during June, bringing a three-tenths of a point rise in the shelter sub-index to 123.9 from 123.6. The sub-index for other commodities and services rose slightly to 115.2 from 115.1. Increases in the price of newspaper subscriptions and drugs outweighed a decrease in the cost of personal care to bring about this jump. Wholesale Prices On the wholesale side, industrial materials continued to ease during July but the farm products index was firmer. The index for industrial materials prices, based on 1935-39 prices equalling 100, dipped to 231.6 on July 24 from 233.2 on June 26. The Canadian farm products index jumped to 219.9 from 215.5. Losses were less scattered than in the previous period. They were confined to tin ingots, linseed oil, raw rubber, sisal, sulphite pulp and copper. Moderate increases were recorded for western oats, lead, iron ore, beef hides and raw cotton. Wholesale prices for eastern potatoes, rye, hay and eastern wheat, barley and oats. Hogs, eggs and western milk for cheese manufacture strengthened while prices for calves, western lambs and western milk for cheese manufacture eased.
