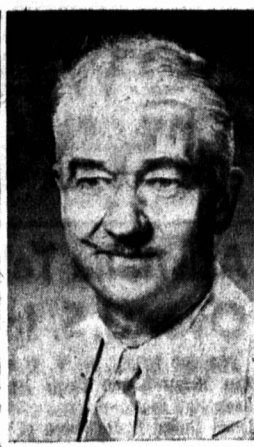

In June, Mrs. Hampson, 29, complained of a voice calling "Betty" and of hands being put on her shoulder and tugging at her dress.

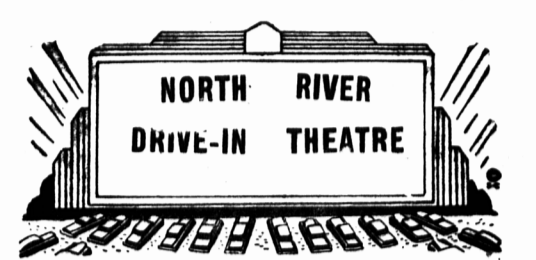
