

Indonesia Eases View On Malaysia

SINGAPORE (Reuters) — Indonesia has backed down on its decision to cut all communications links—radio, telephone and telegraph—with the new Malaysian federation.

A communications department spokesman here said Indonesian officials told Singapore authorities it wanted to resume the telephone and cable links cut Wednesday as part of a "confrontation" policy which earlier led to diplomatic isolation.

Metalworking Profits Show Upward Trend

CLEVELAND (AP) — Higher sales and cost trimming are pushing up metalworking profits and more gains are ahead, Steel magazine reported Sunday.

The trade journal also forecast that this year's production will be 107,200,000 ingot tons if fourth-quarter output simply equals that of the 1962 period. Total output last year was 98,300,000 tons.

Steel said the average rate of profitability was 4.66 cents out of each dollar of metalworking sales in the first half. This compared with 4.68 cents for all of last year.

OTTAWA (CP) — July production of domestic washing machines in Canada rose to 21,450 units from 21,324 a year earlier, and output of clothes dryers increased to 8,672 from 7,840, the bureau of statistics has reported.

In January-July period, the bureau said, machine production advanced to 178,100 units from 160,267 a year earlier, while clothes dryer production rose to 61,418 from 60,520.

Value of factory shipments of warm-air furnaces during the seven months January-July rose to \$13,300,000 from \$13,680,000 a year earlier. Of the total, \$8,037,000 were gas-fired and \$5,263,000 were oil-fired.

July production of machinery declined to 11,028,000 pounds from 11,245,000 a year earlier. Shortening production rose to 13,710,000 pounds from 12,234,000.
