## FARM SEPARATORS.

Advantage of Hauling Cream Instead of Milk to the Factory.

Our creameries here are run on the gathered plan with the endeavor to get our patrons to use hand separators on the farm. We have over 100 machines sending their cream here, and from the routes where the majority of patrons have separators we succeed, particularly in the winter season, in obtaining from 1 to 2 cents per pound more for butter than we get for that made from cream raised the old way. It is natural that this should be so, as there is no method by which the cream, milk and filth get quicker and more thoroughly separated than by a separator on the farm, obviating the mixing of evening and morning milk and the transportation and shaking together. We have long held that this method must eventually succeed over all others. It may take some time, pending lower prices on the machines and better prices on the product, but we don't see how the farmer can afford to haul his milk to the factory and somebody else's milk back again, when by investing in a hand separator he gets his investment back every year or year and a half, according to the number of cows, and keeps his own fresh, warm milk at home. This skimmilk, fed as it comes from the machines, proves to be quite an item, providing it is used immediately after skimming while the animal heat is yet there.

As for the creameries, the universal use of the farm separator will reduce the running expenses of a plant materially. A tank of separator cream will yield about double the amount of butter, against one from hand skimmed. It will be possible for the gathered creameries to successfully compete with the separator creameries as to the quality of the butter and, finally, will lessen the number of plants necessary to use the cream in a given section, all of which will make it possible to return a better profit to the patron.

As to the price of the machines, while it is true they are quite expensive, it is nevertheless a fact that a farmer with ten cows gets the money he paid for the machine returned every year or year and a half, and we think the care and repair on the machines, if well taken care of, would not amount to more than half the cost of hauling the milk away from the farm. Their repair expense depends much on the kind of machine used and the care bestowed upon it.

Here there are about 25 machines operated by dog power, the dogs weighing from 65 to 100 pounds. It has proved to be about the cheapest and best power for the purpose. While the milking is going on the dog does the skimming, wags his tail and seems to enjoy it.—A. Lindback in Creamery Journal.

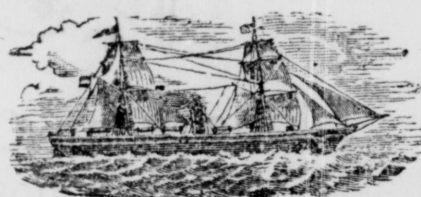
### Make a Note of This About Cowpeas.

Some time ago we gave the analyses of bran and cowpeas side by side for the purpose of showing the similarity of values, and recently we noticed a correspondent of The Practical Farmer who is so well pleased with cowpea hay that he intends to plant 65 acres. With many there is an idea that cowpeas will not thrive in the central states, but we published letters from readers showing that they do well in the southern part of both Pennsylvania and Ohio, and one man got a fair crop in the northern part of New York. The peas were short, and probably it would not pay to grow them that far north, but we think that they will pay farther north than is generally supposed.

And when it is considered that from one to two tons of bran may be grown on one acre, for that much cowpea hay may be grown, and a ton of hay is equal to a ton of bran, one wonders that they are not more extensively grown. They certainly deserve to be, for they are one of the cheapest means we have of getting that much to be desired substance, protein, or milk or muscle food. Try a few. A dollar and a half for enough to plant an acre is money well spent when we can get feed equal to one or two tons of bran from it.—National Stockman.

### Prince of Wales and His Family.

In The Ladies' Home Journal George W. Smalley writes interestingly of "The Personal Side of the Prince of Wales." "The domestic relations of the prince," he says, "are not a topic for free discussion, but at least one may say that one source of the general regard for him is his bearing both to the queen and to the Princess of Wales in public. Numerous public occasions have presented the prince in an attitude of affectionate deference to the queen which is plainly no matter of decorum merely, but personal, the son to the mother and, when the princess was present, the husband to the wife.

"Those who know will tell you how deep has been the devotion of the father to his children from their infancy and youth, when the prince used to be in the nursery early each morning, down to their present maturity. A word may be said also of his brotherly affection for the Empress Frederick, who has so narrowly missed, or at most nominally shared for a short three months, one of the greatest imperial thrones in the world. It was her nearness to Homburg which was among the inducements that took her brother there regularly. He was constantly at the old Schloss, where, till her new palace was finished, she lived. The empress was constantly in Homburg—her carriage, with its black horses, and the familiar imperial liveries, always in front of the prince's villa."

### Protecting Our Heiresses.

It is estimated that American heiresses pay annually to foreign titled fortune hunters the aggregate sum of \$30,000,000. So prevalent has become the fashion of rich American women marrying foreigners that the last New York legislature felt constrained to pass a law to protect such women and their heirs from the disposition of their husbands to grab everything they possess. This law provides that any woman, born a citizen of the United States, who shall have married or shall marry an alien, and the foreign born children and descendants of any such woman shall, notwithstanding her or their residence or birth in a foreign country, be entitled to take, hold, convey and devise real property situated within the state of New York. Under this law, if New York heiresses will leave the bulk of their property at home when they marry abroad, they will be able to control it, and will thus be able to command good treatment from their respective spouses. When a foreign fortune hunter gets the woman and her property into his own control the result is usually much misery for the American woman, as the numerous separations and lawsuits growing out of international marriages testify.—San Francisco Argonaut.

Dairymen simply turn their pocket-books wrong side out every time they take poor milk to the factory and get it accepted.

Don't forget that milk can be kept on the farm overnight pure and sweet without the use of ice. All you have to do is to aerate it and aerate it thoroughly; no half way business, remember.

By taking good care of your milk you are earning money just as fast as by making your cows yield more of it.

We often meet dairymen who profess to have no faith in the Babcock test. They are generally owners of poor cows, who patronize creameries where there is talk of paying for the milk according to the test. Their very argument against it proves that it is a good thing.

Any dairyman who had a fourth or third more cream in his milk than his neighbor does not like to divide it up with him by taking a common share from the factory returns. The Babcock test prevents unjust robbery, and no truly honest dairyman can find fault with it.

We often hear it advised, "Milk your cows regularly or they may shrink in yield." That statement should be put a little more positively. You must milk them regularly or they will shrink every time.

Dairymen often imagine that it is optional with them to do thus and so. They should all understand that there is a right way and a wrong way, and that the first always means profit and the latter always means loss.

Did you ever think that when milk is once tainted or in any way spoiled you can no more make it good milk again than you can rotten apples sound? A chemical change takes place that ruins the milk forever. That is the reason why all intelligent butter and cheese makers lay such stress on its care.—Exchange.
