THE MARITIME CHAMPIONSHIP track and field meet staged as part of Lobster Carnival week at Queen Elizabeth Park Saturday just about lived up to all expectations as far as record-breaking performances were concerned.

About the only disappointment of the entire meet was the fact that Glace Bay's speed merchant Joe Mullins did not set an all-Canada record in the 800-yard run. There were some who were hoping for such a feat, but Mullins did present himself with an unmatched half-mile Maritime mark lowering the old record by 2.4 seconds.

Actually there was no reason to believe that a Canadian record would be set for Mullins was running more or less against the clock. Only one other competitor was entered in the half and quarter mile events and in neither case did Mullins have to extend himself to grab the victory.

The lanky Cape Bretoner added a lot of excitement to the meet and officials and fans will be looking forward to seeing him in action again next year. Maybe with a little competition he might be pushed into a record breaking effort.

A **GREENWOOD YOUNGSTER** Bartley Duns nearly stole the show with his record-shattering high jump leap of 5 ft 8 1/2 ins. The jump actually battered the Dominion midget mark, which he himself holds, by a quarter-inch. Had he been competing in a midget meet his jump would now be an all-time high mark, however, because he was competing in a senior tournament his leap will not be recognized.

Duns is only 15 years old and appears to have an excellent future ahead of him in Canadian amateur athletics. A little perseverance and patience on his part and he should be smashing all kinds of records in a few years time.

WHILE MAINLANDERS took most of the honors. Prince Edward Island competitors grabbed their share of the glory also. Summerside's Alf Greenwood did as expected by winning the pole vault with a jump of 13 ft. The Maritime record holder tried to establish a new mark but hit the bar three times at 13 ft. 6 ins. However, his leap was a record for the Summerside tournament. Alf also entered the 120-yard high hurdles and emerged a winner.

Other Islanders who sparkled brightly were Isaac Paul and Dave MacLeod. Isaac led all the way in winning the five-mile run easily beating Joe Richards of Lancaster while MacLeod set a record in the javelin and finished second in the race for the top athlete award with 16 points.

The man that Isaac Paul beat in the five-mile event is no stranger to track meets on Prince Edward Island. Old Joe, who Saturday admitted to being 45 years old, has been competing in meets here for years and years. And he says he has no intention of quitting for a long time yet.

EYEING ALL ISLAND ATHLETES closely Saturday were Bill Reid, Jim Hogan of Summerside and Ham Douglas of Mount Stewart. The three make up a committee appointed by the Canadian Legion to recommend a local athlete to attend the Legion Training Plan scheduled for Toronto late in August.

These three gentlemen, all followers of track and field for many years and sharp scouts of talent, will be attending all meets on the island this year. It is their job to pick a young athlete who they think will benefit by attending the Toronto program and recommend him to the Dominion Legion Command.

One athlete has already been singled out for scrutiny, but the committee is withholding his name while scanning the field for other possibilities.

NEW YORK YANKEES, who we had counted on of the American League pennant race, came up with an unusual performance in Yankee Stadium last Sunday. The Bombers won a game on the first day of the week and such an accomplishment for the Stangeles was really something out of the ordinary.

Indeed so far this year when Sunday doubleheaders came up, the Yankees proceeded to boot them with real regularity. Even winning a single game on Sunday was mighty tough for the world champions.

THE YANKEES, however, gained no ground in their recent series with the Chicago White Sox. The Bombers dropped the first two on Friday and Saturday by one run margins. The sweep gave them no better than an even break in the four-game set.

YANKEE FANS are hollering now that this recent capturing of a twin bill on Sunday means that the New Yorkers are on the victory march. That could be, but we are still convinced that both Chicago and Cleveland will head Casey and his men in the wire next September.

Cleveland had a great chance to gain more ground Sunday when they blew that first game to the Red Sox in the bottom of the ninth. It looked like the Tribe had that one all wrapped up but Bill Jurgens inspired his lads to pull the affair out in the final frame.

The newspaper executive was a former president of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development and had held a number of major government posts dating back to the First World War. Meyer had been under treatment at hospital for a heart ailment and cancer.

The 78-year-old Swiss composer and conductor, whose music often was based on Jewish rituals, for five years was director of the San Francisco Conservatory. JIM WALKER LEADS PROS

Bud Kennedy Captures N.B.-P.E.I. Tourney Lead

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—After five years of searching, Bud Kennedy of Riverside found the putter he has been seeking. Going into the first round of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island golf tournament Monday, he spied the club in the pro shop, bought it and with just 25 putts shot a two over par 72 to lead the field.

Snapping at his heels among the amateurs are two youngsters and a veteran, Doug Lewis of Moncton, Dave Irving of Fredericton and the perennial threat, Maurice Dowling of Moncton.

Leading a pack of 10 professionals is a golfer who is no stranger to the N.B.-P.E.I. tournament but one who has never been able to win. Jim Walker, now showing the fundamentals of golf to Moncton hopefuls, has a three-stroke lead with his 73.

Walker was one over par on both the front and back nines in stroking his 73. Previous to this year he was professional at Kentville Golf club in Nova Scotia's Annapolis Valley.

Errol Nicholson of the Green Gables golf club is second with his 76.

Kennedy, long off the tee, birdied four holes, parred 10, was one over on three and three over on one, near the disastrous 17th.

For nine holes previous to the 17th, Kennedy had stroked pars or birdies. His touch seemed to run wild on the par 4, 17th as he barely escaped with a 7. On the 18th, however, he settled down and carded a neat par.

Kennedy's leading 72 came as a surprise to most of players and fans alike. By noon the topic of conversation was the spectacular first nine 33 birdied by Dowling.

There was talk of a record as Dowling appeared to be shooting one of the best games of his career. Though one over par on the first two holes, he birdied three, four, five, six and seven and came within another roll of the ball to getting two more on eight and nine.

Three bogies and one double bogie in the second nine squashed talk of a record and he came home with a 40. His 73 was still good enough to place him second.

Tied with Dowling are Dave Irving of Fredericton, last year's junior champion, and one of the golfing Levises of Moncton, Doug. Both played golf that is best described as consistent, all holes being par or within one of par.

All Budlong took a new mark of 2:13-2 and Airy Ann a 6-year-old bay mare, reined by H. B. Willis, lowered her mark from 2:13-3 to 2:12.

Mr. Jolliscot, piloted by Joe Hennessey, was the only double dash winner on last night's card. The 8-year-old chestnut gelding captured both dashes in the C Pace, in times of 2:14 and 2:10-3. This was also a new record for the gelding owned by Rogers and Hill of Charlottetown.
