SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Football Union Formed

HALIFAX, Oct. 22. A meeting was held this evening to form a Maritime Province Football Union. Representatives were present from Digby, Kings and Acadia, the Wanderers, New Glasgow and West Riding football teams. It was decided to form such a union. Capt. Wood, of the West Riding, was elected President, Prof. C. G. Roberts, of King's, Vice-President, and J. N. Duffus Secretary-Treasurer. The constitution of the Scottish Rugby Union was adopted essentially as the constitution of the new union. The playing rules of the same union were also adopted. All Clubs in the Maritime Provinces will be members of the union on paying the fee of \$2. A great improvement will be made in the system of scoring by points.

Halifax News.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22. The West Riding Regiment, it is said, is to leave this station in March next for Shorncliffe, England. The Grenadier Guards and the 17th Regiment, now at Bermuda, are expected to relieve the West Riding.

St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church of this city has been vacant since the appointment of Rev. R. Lving to the secretaryship of the Ladies College.

At a Congregationalist meeting to-night it was agreed to call Rev. A. J. Mowet, of Fredericton. The salary is \$4,550 with a manse.

Notwithstanding the increased tariff on potatoes, American buyers are now purchasing in this district and paying an advance of five cents a bushel on the old price.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has been notified by parties in Nova Scotia that it is their intention to ship live lobsters to the English market, and arrangements are now being made with the steamship companies with that object in view.

The Minister of Marine states that the Government have received no intimation from the Newfoundland Government of their intention to open the negotiations with the States regarding the fishery question.

A Report Contradicted.

MONTREAL, Oct. 22. The president of the Lake of the Woods Milling Co., says that there is absolutely no truth in the report they are about selling their property to syndicate, or that they are about entering into a combine with other millers. They purpose operating their own mill as heretofore.

Birchall's Sentence.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 22. As expected, the petition for the commutation of Birchall's sentence has been coldly received by the public. About one in every fifty appeared willing to attach their signatures to the document, although it has been greatly modified.

Sad Death.

THREE RIVERS, Que., Oct. 22. Louis Terreault, aged 19, got up on a circular saw table at Ross Estate Mills this morning and fell across the saws, one of which cut off his two feet, the other severing the body in two diagonally. He died an hour after the accident.

Obituary.

BOSTON, Oct. 22. F. W. Nickerson, well known in shipping circles, and formerly a heavy owner in the Boston and Savannah Steamship Line, died to-day in this city of dropsical trouble.

AMEHERST, N. S., Oct. 22. In the match race here to-day, Sir Charles an easy winner in three straight heats, distancing resolution in the third, and making, notwithstanding the heavy track, the time of 2.40.

Again Postponed.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 22. The race between St. John and Halifax four oared crews was again postponed an account of heavy north east wind.

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—10 a. m. Moderate winds to-day, fine weather, not much change in temperature.

Prospective Markets for Canada.

The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa has issued a commercial pamphlet dealing with the trade done on this continent, which contains besides the detailed statistics of trade between the United States and Central and South America, the tariffs of the Argentine Republic, Bolivia, Brazil, Chili, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Uruguay, as well as the new United States tariff including the free list. In a brief introduction, Mr. George Johnson, Government statistician, says: "The tables show what trade with the continent has been done by the United States. As Canada has much the same classes of articles to export as the United States, these tables will serve as a guide to our exporters. Attention is especially directed to the table showing the market there is for flour. The several countries in South and Central America and the West Indian Islands import over \$12,000,000 worth of flour. It is believed that with our superior wheat much of this trade could be done by Canada, which is compelled by the increased tariff against her products entering the United States market to seek new outlets for her products, and thus make up for possible loss."

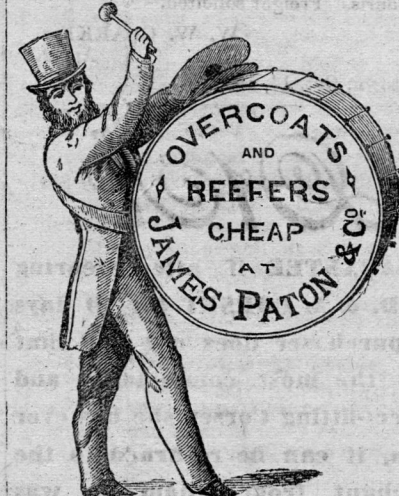
