A HIGHLY complimentary address to Sir Ambrose Shea was presented last Wednesday evening on the eve of his departure from St. John's to assume the governorship of the Bahamas. It was signed by three thousand citizens of St. John's, representing all classes and denominations. His Excellency sailed for Halifax yesterday on the Pervian, en route for the Bahamas, via New York.

BEST's soda water factory, on Brunswick Street, Halifax, was destroyed by fire on Wednesday evening last. The building was insured, the policy expiring at 12 o'clock yesterday. Four hundred dollars worth of bottles, and the machinery valued at three thousand dollars were also destroyed. The water supply was deficient, otherwise, it is said, the building might have been saved.

CHARLES LEE, of Woodstock, N. B., received a heavy electric shock last Tuesday evening. The awning of a store, when turned up, had come in contact with the electric light wire; Lee, reaching up, took hold of the awning and was knocked out on the sidewalk, almost senseless. He was picked up and, after a few minutes, restored to consciousness. He evidently was not aware that the awning was loaded.

A HOTEL KEEPER named Trouellette left Chamby, near Montreal, on Monday forenoon in a small skiff, intending to cross the Richelieu river to St. Martin's, where he was to pay \$145 he had in his possession. The boat was upset and Trouellette was rescued by one Bland, aged 20, who robbed him of the money and then ducked him in the river, leaving him to drown. He was rescued by another and restored to consciousness. Bland was arrested.

An accident occurred to the boiler in the Electric Light Station last evening which left the city without lights for some four hours, just at a time when they were most required. We learn that a second boiler is being built at the foundry of Messrs McKinnon & McLean, of this city, for the Electric Light Co., and in the course of a few weeks will be ready for use, so that in future should any part of one boiler get out of order, they will have another to fall back upon, and thus prevent a recurrence of last night's mishap.

Gladstone's Proposal Attacked.

LONDON, Oct. 20. Lord Randolph Churchill, at Sunderland, to-day, denounced as immoral Gladstone's proffer to make the disestablishment of the Church in Wales a plan for the Liberal platform, in return for support for his Irish scheme. He said that even if Gladstone succeeded in forcing a dissolution, and obtaining a majority for Home Rule, his proposals would be fought to the last grip, even to the abolition of the House of Lords, thus certainly postponing these vital reforms until at least 1891.

The Fisheries Question.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20. A Washington dispatch states that Attorney-General Garland's persistent efforts to maintain the headland theory on the Pacific Coast has caused a disagreement between him and Secretary Bayard, who cunningly wished no determination in that action until the Atlantic Headland question was settled. The feeling here is that under such circumstances Canadians may get their due.

Davitt's Reception.

DUBLIN, Oct. 20. Michael Davitt was given a grand reception on his arrival at Queenstown to-day from New York. He declared that the Irish in America were more earnest than ever in the cause of Home Rule. American public opinion had unequivocally pronounced against Coercion.

Another Disastrous Collision.

LONDON, Oct. 20. The steamer Upupa collided with and sunk the German bark Flantaur, off Beachy Head, on Sunday. Eleven persons were drowned. The captain of the bark has since died. Only two of the crew of the bark survived.

More Floods.

HAVANA, Oct. 20. Numerous springs have appeared in the district of Roque, and formed several lakes, which are gradually uniting. The village is inundated and many are homeless. The floods are increasing.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20. At a meeting of the Cabinet to-day, Judge Angers, of the Superior Court of Quebec, was appointed Lieut. Governor of Quebec.
