

THE EXPEDITION TO CHINA.—The 82nd Regiment and three companies of the 23rd embarked on Wednesday at Portsmouth, for Hong Kong. Seven companies, including headquarters, went on board the Assistance, screw troop-ship, and the other three companies on board the Adventure, screw troop-ship, with three companies of the 23rd Regiment. The troops did not go on board in quite so orderly a manner as usual, especially the 82nd. The men of that regiment made rather too free the previous night, and sadly disturbed the peace in certain localities. Some three hundred were reported as absent in the morning. As the day went on many were brought into the dockyard in cabs, &c., more or less intoxicated, and some of them seriously injured in fights, &c. A number of windows were broken, and one house was forcibly entered and robbed. The perpetrators were, however, captured, and have been committed to the assizes for trial.

MURDER OF MR. BLANDFORD AT NAPLES.—Mr. Blandford had only been in Naples five days when, on the evening of the 25th ult., he left his hotel (Les Iles Britanniques), at about a quarter-past eleven o'clock, for a short stroll in the Riviera di Chiaja. On his arriving just opposite the Church of St. Giuseppe he was overtaken by a man, who, having passed him, knocked off his own cap, as if by some preconcerted signal, and then endeavoured to seize him by the throat. Mr. Blandford instantly drew back, and struck the man severely in the face with a stick, thus compelling him to retreat, but almost at the same moment he received a blow on his head from one of two ruffians who were closely following him, which prostrated him instantly, and it is supposed that they either jumped upon him, or kicked him, causing severe injuries. As there was some slight moonlight, he was able to perceive that there were three men, and that the one who first attacked him was a short man, and wore a jacket and a peaked cap. In consequence of his cries and struggles the ruffians were too much alarmed to succeed in their attempt at robbery, beyond his hat and his cane, and effected a precipitate retreat. As soon as he had recovered his consciousness Mr. Blandford recoiled across the street and reached some men who were standing at the door of a cafe, not one of whom would come to his assistance. He then managed to proceed, with great difficulty, as far as the house of Mrs. Corby, an Englishwoman long resident in Naples, where he was placed in a carriage and conveyed to his hotel. Mr. Roskilly was immediately called in, and he, together with Dr. Bishop, and a Neapolitan surgeon, were in constant attendance, but he died a few days afterwards. Upwards of forty persons known as capable of such acts of aggression, have been arrested, and a reward, with free pardon, has been offered to any accomplice who will reveal the name of the man who gave the blow.

DISTURBANCES AT JASSY.—Letters from Bucharest state that, although the clubs have been dissolved, the spirit by which those bodies were animated has not been extinguished, and that the electoral agitation is much more formidable than it was before. The several commissioners were to continue their residence at Jassy a fortnight longer, in order that they might see with their own eyes the progress, and the issue of the affair. There will be a strict investigation into the justice of the complaints that have been made. A demonstration took place at Jassy on the 26th of April, which induced the Caimacan to forbid the repetition of such scenes. A crowd of men had assembled, who paraded the streets with the flags and banners of different countries, but there were other flags on which were emblazoned "The Union," "A Foreign Prince," "A Constitutional Government," and "Security for Self-Government," and they made the passengers greet these emblems with cheers and hurrahs. Hundreds of the agents of Austria are whetting the rage of the peasantry, and others in Wallachia and Moldavia against the Boyars, and the reason of all this underhand work is because she finds the nobles are not to be gained over to her interests.

PRESENT FROM THE KING OF PORTUGAL TO THE QUEEN OF ENGLAND.—The King of Portugal has just sent over to this country a present of cattle of a very peculiar breed to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, consisting of a bull, two heifers and a bull calf. The animals, which are of the most perfect symmetry, and very diminutive, standing scarcely 40 inches high, are of a dun colour and in fine condition. The cows are very docile, but the bull, on being driven from the station to Prince Albert's Model Farm, Frogmore, where they are now installed, exhibited a disposition rather the reverse of that of his companions, by tossing an unfortunate donkey, about his own size, which happened to come in his way. These Lilliputian animals very much resemble the Alderney or Jersey breed, but appear to be scarcely more than half the size.

IRISH EMIGRATION.—One of the Kerry papers has the following statement respecting the progress of the population drain in that quarter:—"We learn from many quarters of the kingdom that, notwithstanding the present prosperous state of Ireland, emigration on an extensive scale is going on—an emigration that embraces some of the very best of the working classes, particularly in the rural districts. Already have four large vessels sailed from Tralee for Transatlantic ports, with emigrants, chiefly young farm servants of both sexes; and two others are announced to leave before the close of the current month. Besides this emigration direct from the county town, people are every week leaving different parts of Kerry for America via Liverpool. Nor must we omit to notice in connexion with this subject that a different class of emigrants are leaving our county for Australia in no small numbers—we refer now to the younger sons of the more comfortable farmers, healthy young fellows who prefer to try their luck at the diggings rather than wait the weak chance of getting a farm at home during the present fierce competition for land. These men are likely to turn out a superior class of emigrants for the gold colonies, and to be the pioneers of an extensive emigration from the class to which they belong—the class that is, if we are to judge from the competition that exists for the occupation of land in this county, the most in excess of any in the South of Ireland."

A NEW ROMAN CATHOLIC ARCHBISHOP.—Dr. Cullen, as the Papal legate, has received from the Pope a bull for the consecration of Dr. Leahy as Roman Catholic Archbishop of Cashel and Emly, and Metropolitan of Munster; and a second bull for the translation of Dr. Keane from the see of Ross to the Roman Catholic diocese of Cloyne.

AFFAIRS OF ITALY.—Several chests of muskets have been landed in Tuscany. They have been seized by the authorities. Numerous arrests have taken place. The Concordat with Naples has been definitely agreed on and signed. The Archduke Maximilian has begun the work of digging out and deepening the canals and the lagoons of Venice, for the purpose of facilitating the access of larger vessels to the streets and quays.

THE QUEEN'S FORMAL CONSENT TO HER DAUGHTER'S MARRIAGE.—The following notice has appeared in the "Gazette":—"At the Court at Osborne House, the 16th of May, 1857, present, the Queen in Council was pleased to declare her consent to a contract of matrimony between the Princess Royal and Prince Frederick William of Prussia; which consent Her Majesty has also caused to be signified under the Great Seal.—Wm. L. BATHURST."

PUBLIC INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.—It appears, from the return just issued, that the gross public income for the year ending March 31, 1857, was £72,334,062, and the expenditure £75,588,557, showing a deficit of £3,254,004. From the customs were derived (in round numbers), £23,300,000; the excise, £18,000,000; stamps, £7,300,000; property tax, £16,000,000, &c.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE DISPUTE BETWEEN SPAIN AND MEXICO.—Advices from Madrid have been received here, announcing the settlement of the dispute between Spain and Mexico on the 10th instant. After the ratification of the treaty M. Lafransa will remain as Minister of Mexico.

SETTLEMENT OF THE NEUCHÂTEL QUESTION.—The propositions for the arrangement of the affair of Neuchâtel have been purely and simply accepted by Prussia. That power renounces the payment by Switzerland of a million of florins as indemnity, without any other condition.

GENERAL TODLEBEN.—This distinguished Russian engineer has fixed the first week in September for visiting England, and attending the banquet to be given to him in London by the officers of the Royal Engineers.

SERIOUS ASPECT OF AFFAIRS WITH THE KAFFIRS.—Since the sailing of the last mail steamer England (states the Summary of the Cape Town Mail of the 12th March), affairs on the Kaffir frontier have become more complicated than ever, and recently assumed so serious an aspect as to render it necessary for his Excellency Sir George Grey to proceed thither. The opening of the Cape Parliament had in consequence been postponed till the 2d April. Owing to the unsettled state of the country beyond the borders, the German Legion, the whole of which destined for this place have now arrived, have been placed on full pay, and are thus at once available for defensive operations, should such be found necessary. One of the German officers, Capt. Ohlsen, has been murdered, near King William's Town, by the Kaffirs, while riding out alone after dark. A soldier of the 89th Regiment has shared the same fate, when his comrades, in revenge, burnt the whole of the Kaffir huts in the vicinity. The Zulu massacre beyond the Tugela, at Natal, has not been followed up by further violence; and the anticipated danger of an irruption appears to be gradually subsiding. The elections for the new Legislative Council there have not yet terminated. Within the colony trade is fast increasing. The exports for 1856 exceeded those of last year by £269,786; and the imports also show an increase of £412,904, yielding an addition to the Customs revenue of £42,277. The prices of most articles of agricultural produce are just now unusually high in the Cape Town Market, wheat fetching from 30s to 36s per muid (about 3 bushels), and other grain in proportion; wine £7 10s to £8 per leuger; and wool from 1s to 1s 6d and 2s on the spot. Of this latter product there was exported last year to the value of £831,142, being £197,012 more than in 1855. The Angora goats imported from Persia by Messrs. Mousenthal have been disposed of by auction. At Graaff-Reinet they realised an average of £82; at Swellendam £50 each; the highest price given being £117.

RETIREMENT OF THE KING OF SWEDEN INTO PRIVATE LIFE.—The Faedrelandet has private letters from Stockholm, which it declares worthy of credit, announcing that the King of Sweden is seriously ill from the distraction of State affairs, and has resolved, by the advice of his physicians, to retire, and call the Hereditary Crown Prince to the provisional direction of public business.

A RUSSIAN EXPEDITION TO CHINA.—A frigate and a corvette are fitting out at Cronstadt for the China Seas. It is reported that a Russian Envoy Extraordinary is to take passage in the frigate. He is charged with a special mission to the Emperor of the Celestial Empire.

Prince Napoleon has been decorated with the Saxon order of the Rauten-Krone.

CARLETON, MAY 16.—ARRIVAL OF THE GOVERNOR OF NEWFOUNDLAND.—The British schooner Eveline has arrived here with Nassau dates to the 10th instant. She brought as a passenger Sir Alexr. Bannerman, the newly-appointed Governor of Newfoundland.

LOCAL NEWS.

FIRE IN THE WOODS.—Much loss of property has been occasioned about Mill River and vicinity by fires which broke out on Monday, 25th May. The fire seems to have originated about Haslam's, on the Malpeque road, and run in an easterly direction, carrying away whatever stood in its way. The scene is described as terrific in the extreme—nothing scarcely could be seen for a distance of three miles but one sheet of fire, which, blown by a strong westerly wind, seemed to menace total destruction. Fortunately, no lives were lost; several buildings were lost, among which was the Wesleyan meeting-house at Millvale—a handsome new building, all efforts to save it being fruitless, and the Mill River school-house burnt to ashes, books saved. The heaviest loss in this vicinity is Mr. Wm. Hacker, of Trout River, who lost his dwelling-house, two large barns, threshing machine, sleighs, carriages, all sorts of farming utensils and mostly all his fencing. His loss is estimated at £700. Mr. Hacker was a wealthy and respectable farmer, well known and esteemed by all the community. Also, Mr. Wm. Pickering, of Hope River, lost a large barn (about 60 feet in length); threshing machine, sleighs and several other articles; his loss is not less than £100. There are altogether nine buildings burnt about this vicinity itself. It is to be feared that there has been much more throughout the Island, as the air was darkened with smoke, and the fire seemed to range in all directions.—Pro.

THE FIRES.—On Monday, the 25th ult., fire spread through some parts of the country, before a strong and warm S.W. wind, with a velocity and damage hardly paralleled in the memory of the "oldest inhabitant." In our section of Queen's County, though tolerably well cleared and settled, we have heard of several dwelling-houses, barns and bridges, a school-house and Methodist chapel totally destroyed. Mr. Hacker, of Mill River, seems to be the greatest sufferer. We have heard his loss estimated at £700. His dwelling-house and barn, we are told, stood at a considerable distance from the forest, but the fiery tempest was carried so speedily along the dry grass and fences to his barn, that in his endeavour to save it, the house, which stood to leeward of the barn, caught fire, and the work of destruction was so quickly accomplished, that only a bag of flour, or meal, could be saved. All the farming implements are, it is said, destroyed, but the plough in which a pair of horses were yoked. Very large fires in other parts of the country, but the consequences we have not yet learned. The law is not sufficiently stringent in regard to kindling fires in the field or forest, before the green herbage can check its development. At present a man or boy goes out, sets fire to ground he wants cleared, and slinks away, and *Mr. Nobody* is the guilty person.—Isl.

She is owned by Messrs. G. M. Fowle & Co., of Lewis Wharf, Boston, and is a handsome and commodious craft, with a large saloon on deck, and ample and exceedingly comfortable accommodations for passengers. The captain—who has his wife on board—appears to be a respectable sort of man, and will, no doubt, attend to the comfort of all who may take passage with him. The fare appears very moderate—\$8 to Boston and \$2 head-money on landing.—Isl.
