

Phillies Beat Milwaukee Dodgers Lose To Redlegs

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Philadelphia Phillies slapped Milwaukee Dodgers for 13 hits Tuesday night, handing Warren Spahn his first defeat of the season in an 8-4 victory behind Robin Roberts.

Spahn left for a pinchhitter after giving up five runs and seven hits in four innings. He had won four straight this season, on no occasion allowing more than two runs.

Granny Hamner, the Phillies veteran infielder and a team sparkplug, signalled the end of his experiment as a pitcher by returning to the lineup at second base. He opened the third inning by driving one of lefty Spahn's pitches into the upper left field stands and also singled in his four trips to the plate.

Stan Lopata, the Phillies highly touted slugger who has been anything but awesome this season, snapped to life with a perfect night at the plate—three singles and a double—and drove in one run. But Chico Fernandez, the Phillies' shortstop, did the most damage during the game by singling twice at the right time to drive in three runs.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Cincinnati Redlegs pounded three Brooklyn pitchers for 14 hits to defeat the Dodgers 9-2 Tuesday night for their eighth straight victory. Hal Jeffcoat spaced six hits for his second triumph as the Redlegs climbed to within a half game of second place and 1½ games behind the league-leading Milwaukee Braves.

In winning for the first time at Ebbets Field, Jeffcoat walked three and struck out three. Both Brooklyn runs were unearned.

Art Schult got three hits to pace the Reds' attack which included six doubles, two by Don Hoak. The red hot infielder also drove two walks, stole a base and drove in two runs. Frank Robinson and Roy McMillan also batted in a pair of runs as Johnny Podres went down to his second defeat.

Gino Cimoli, who collected five hits, including a game-winning home run against Milwaukee Tuesday night, continued his torrid hitting for Brooklyn, banging two singles in four times at bat. The biggest Dodger hit was a two-bagger by Don Zimmer in the fifth.

NEW YORK (AP)—Ray Katt and two singles to lead New York Giants to an 8-5 triumph over St. Louis Cardinals Tuesday night. Katt's two-run single in the fifth inning highlighted a three-run rally erasing a 5-3 St. Louis lead.

The Giants pounded Herman Wehmeier and Bob Smith, his successor, for 15 hits, their biggest assault of the season. Red Schoendienst and Dusty Rhodes hit home runs, both coming in the first inning to give the Giants a quick 2-0 lead. Everybody in the Giant lineup hit safely at least once with the exception of the pitchers.

Pete Burnside started for the Giants but he couldn't protect a 3-0 lead and was derailed in the fifth when the Cards assaulted him for five hits and as many runs.

Allen Worthington took over with runner on third and nobody out in the fifth and pitched two hit ball the rest of the way to receive credit for his first victory of the year.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Chicago Cubs scored four runs in the 14th inning Tuesday night and hung on for a 10-8 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates who were shoved into the National League cellar by Dale Long, a former Pirate, drove in what proved to be the winning run.

The Pirates scored twice in the ninth to forge a 6-6 tie, the fourth consecutive night game they have rallied for a tie and gone on to lose.

And in the 14th, after the Cubs had scored four times, the Pirates tried to come back again but Jackie Collum—the sixth Cub

pitcher—came in to stop the rally.

The victory went to Turk Lown who gave up only one hit in 4 2/3 innings. The defeat was charged to Laurin Pepper, recently recalled from Hollywood.

Pepper gave up a single and walk to open the 14th and Cal Neenan beat out a punt to fill the bases. Pinch hitter Bob Speake then singled home two runs through the drawn-in infield.

Gong's two-run single came after the bases were again loaded on a sacrifice and an intentional walk.

DETROIT (AP)—Home runs by Frank Bolling and Frank House, hander Paul Foytack spliced Cookie Lavagetto's debut as Washington manager Tuesday as Detroit Tigers beat the Senators, 5-2. The loss was Washington's ninth straight.

Bolling drove in two runs with his fourth homer of the season and House scored two more with his second. Both blasts came in the fifth inning off the right-handed pitcher, first of three Washington pitchers.

Foytack issued seven walks. Lavagetto was named to succeed Charlie Dressen just two hours before the club took the field. The Washington club now has dropped 17 of its 21 games this season.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Cleveland Indians beat New York Yankees 2-1 Tuesday night on two unearned runs and lost for an indefinite period the services of their prize southpaw, Herb Score, who was struck in the right eye by a hard-hit liner.

Score was taken to a hospital, and it will be "several days" before full extent of the damage to his badly cut eye can be ascertained.

Bob Lemon took over when Score was carried off the field with two out in the first inning and held the Yanks to six hits.

Tom Sturdivant, the loser, walked Rocky Colavito in the eighth inning with the bases filled to force home the winning run.

Former Yankee Gene Woodling singled with one out to start the tribe to victory in its first 1957 meeting with the pennant winners before a crowd of 16,386.

Gi McDevall, second man up for the Yankees, lashed the liner which struck Score squarely in the right eye, cutting it badly. Bleeding freely from nose and mouth, as well as from the cut, Score was taken off the field on a stretcher.

A 20-game winner last season, Score had a 2-1 record going into Tuesday night's game. In his third year with the tribe, he is considered one of the most valuable—if not the most valuable—player in baseball today.

CHICAGO (AP)—Tom Brewer's excellent three-hit pitching and Ted Williams' big bat pulled Boston Red Sox to a 4-3 triumph over Chicago White Sox Tuesday night.

Williams singled home a run in the first, walked three times in a row—twice intentionally—before blasting a two-run ninth inning homer to ice Brewer's third triumph against two defeats.

Williams' homer, his sixth of the season, proved to be the big blow. Brewer got careless and served a two-run homer to Larry Doby with two out in the ninth.

Prior to that, Brewer, going the route the first time this season was the master. The Sox didn't get a hit until Nell Fox singled in the fourth.

Mrs. Gibbons, who won two acclamations as mayor of her community in Pontiac-Temisamingue election Monday where Conservative Leader John Diefenbaker spoke. The constituency has not elected a Conservative since 1930.

The woman mayor told a reporter she always voted Liberal but now plans to vote Conservative.

Her term as mayor is expiring and nominations for the next term are due today. She plans to stand for re-election.

Motor Vehicle Output In April

OTTAWA (CP)—Production of passenger cars and commercial vehicles in April dropped to 49,895 from 59,594 in the corresponding month a year ago, but output in the first four months of the year was up 177,420 units from 165,970 in the January-April period of 1956.

The bureau of statistics said Tuesday production of passenger cars declined to 41,763 units from 47,775, while production of commercial vehicles slipped to 8,132 from 11,819.

Factory shipments of Canadian-made vehicles rose in March to a 12-month high of 58,031 units, up from 46,664 in March, 1956.

The Royals knocked four Columbus pitchers for 15 hits with the loss—his second against one win—going to lefty Dino Donoso.

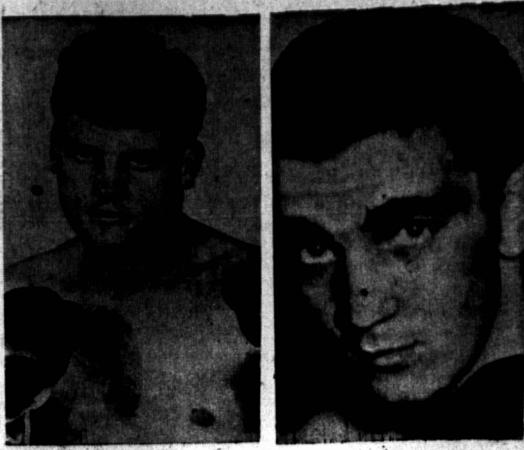

Senators Change Managers, Cookie Lavagetto New Boss

DETROIT (AP)—Washington Senators changed managers Tuesday, ousting Chuck Dressen and naming Harry (Cookie) Lavagetto—the man Dressen picked as his chief coach and sidekick seven years ago—to replace him.

Off to their worst start in 57 seasons in the American League, the Senators decided drastic changes were needed to pump new vigor into the team that hasn't finished in the first division in 11 seasons.

After the last-place Senators dropped their eighth straight game Monday and their 16th in 20 starts president Calvin Griffith sped to Detroit to move the 44-year-old Lavagetto into command and order Dressen a front office job.

Lavagetto, a coach under Dressen for seven seasons in three different leagues, is getting his first chance to manage. He agreed to complete the current season and was given an option to sign a one-year pact at the end of the campaign.

NEW POSITION
Dressen, the personable 58-year-old skipper who engineered Brooklyn Dodgers to National League championships in 1952 and 1953, was asked to fill a new position of co-ordinator of player personnel.

There was no assurance that Dressen, just beginning his third

year at the Washington helm, would accept Griffith's offer. Griffith, who said the managerial change "is no attempt to kick him (Dressen) upstairs or run out his contract," described the move as one that will strengthen the entire Washington organization.

Dressen demanded full authority with personnel, at least a three-year contract, and enough money and spending power to construct a better farm and scouting system.

WITH PCL CLUB
Lavagetto was nearing the end of his 18-year playing career when Dressen, as manager of the Oakland Club in the Pacific Coast League in 1939, picked the one-time world series star as his aide.

When Dressen took over at Brooklyn the following year, Lavagetto went along and subsequently turned down chances to manage in the high minors to stay with Dressen. Lavagetto came to Washington when Dressen became the Senators' manager in 1955.

Dressen watched Tuesday's Detroit-Washington game from the press box while Lavagetto removed himself from the coaching lines and ran the club from the dugout. Lavagetto had little to say about his club, except that, "it faces a major but certainly not impossible rebuilding job."
