

# Four Accused Are Remanded

**SUMMERSIDE** — Four Western Prince County youths appeared yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in County Court charged with disrupting a religious service near Alberton Thursday night.

Pleading guilty to disturbing an assemblage, by throwing bottles at the church and using profane language, were Kevin Joseph Gavin and Roy Joseph Gavin from Tignish; John Kenneth MacArthur, and Joseph Ivan O'Meara, Alberton.

The four pleaded not guilty to assault causing bodily harm.

They were remanded until Tuesday on both charges.

Aubrey McAllister, who will be ordained a minister in December of this year, told court he was in charge of services at the United Pentecostal Church, and that the service was broken up by a disturbance at about nine o'clock Thursday evening. The church is located on the Casumpeque highway near Alberton. It is a new church that was built during the summer in Alberton, but services have been held in Alberton since last December, and in the new church since July 30.

The assault charges were laid following an alleged attack on Mr. McAllister.

Magistrate MacDonald stated that he wished to get to the bottom of the case, and that he wanted to learn how the boys got the liquor they drank. According to the youths, they bought through an older person—two dozen beer, which they drank—except for about three bottles—between 5.15 and 7.30 p.m.

Investigating officer, Const. A.H. Bennett of the Alberton detachment RCMP, said that the church has been bothered by similar incidents, but these weren't quite as bad as the latest.

# SDU Representatives Attend CUSO Meeting

A former SDU student, Catherine Duffy of Kinkora, is serving with CUSO at the present time as a teacher in Sarawak, North Borneo. Miss Duffy is expected to return home in August 1967.

Two representatives of St. Dunstan's University are in Ottawa this weekend to attend the annual meeting of Canadian University Service Overseas. They are history professor Frederick Driscoll and senior arts student John Rowe of Bedford.

The three-day session will be attended by representatives from all universities in Canada and will deal mainly with the means of recruiting and selecting additional volunteers. At the present time CUSO has more than 400 university students serving overseas in Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean, Southeast Asia and India.

**HAS SUPPORT**

CUSO is primarily interested in providing under-developed countries with highly trained personnel, not only university graduates, but also graduates of nursing schools and technical institutes. The organization has the support of the Canadian government and receives an annual grant of \$500,000 from Ottawa.

# Goose Season Ends Early

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The season for hunting Canada geese in seven Wisconsin counties ended at sundown Friday because of an exceptionally high kill during the first weekend of shooting. The interior department announced Wednesday.

John S. Gottschalk, director of sport fisheries and wildlife, took the action after a number of protests were received that the goose kill in the first three days of the season approached the quota set for the whole state.

Gottschalk said on Oct. 8, 9 and 10 hunters registered an actual take of 9,600 Canada geese in the zone surrounding Horicon National Wildlife Refuge. The kill in the seven-county area around this zone also was exceptionally high.

"We are convinced that the take in the remainder of the state will result in a state-wide kill at least equal to the quota of 14,000 birds. The season in the rest of the state will end Nov. 3."

# Trinity, Anglican Churches Will Worship Together

Congregations of Trinity United and St. Paul's Anglican will be worshipping together on the third Sunday of October and November, with the intention that such corporate worship will continue throughout the year. These combined services of worship will be held in the evening, beginning at 7 p.m.

The first combined service of worship will be held at St. Paul's Anglican Church this coming Sunday, October 16th. To lead in the singing and in the presentation of a special anthem, Trinity's and St. Paul's choir will be combined. Rev. John Ball, pastor of Trinity United, will preach the sermon, and the Rev. Louis Elias will conduct the Anglican form of worship.

On Nov. 20 both congregations will be worshipping at Trinity United. Rev. L. Elias will preach and Rev. J. Ball will conduct the United Church's form of worship.

Immediately following both services, a fellowship gathering will be held in the church's respective halls where a light luncheon will be served by the ladies' organization. This will give opportunity to congregations and officers of both churches to meet and acquaint with one another.

Such cooperation between these two historic churches is not altogether a new experience. One could cite an example from the annals of history when the were welcome to address both congregations in the old St. Paul's Church.

**GREAT BARRIERS**

These combined services of worship come at a time when the United and Anglican Churches of Canada are jointly searching for ways and means leading to organic union. It is generally conceded that such union between the two communions is not foreseeable in the immediate future. Two great barriers preventing immediate union are the doctrinally conflicting views of church government, and certain doctrinal matters essential to each communion.

But it is commonly agreed that these barriers will be gradually reduced, as by learning to appreciate and understand one another's traditions and way of life. Praying together is perhaps the greatest contribution any congregation can make, leaving the Holy Spirit in complete charge of our aspirations.

Members of both congregations have been urged to make every effort to attend these important services. Members from other communions will be most welcome.

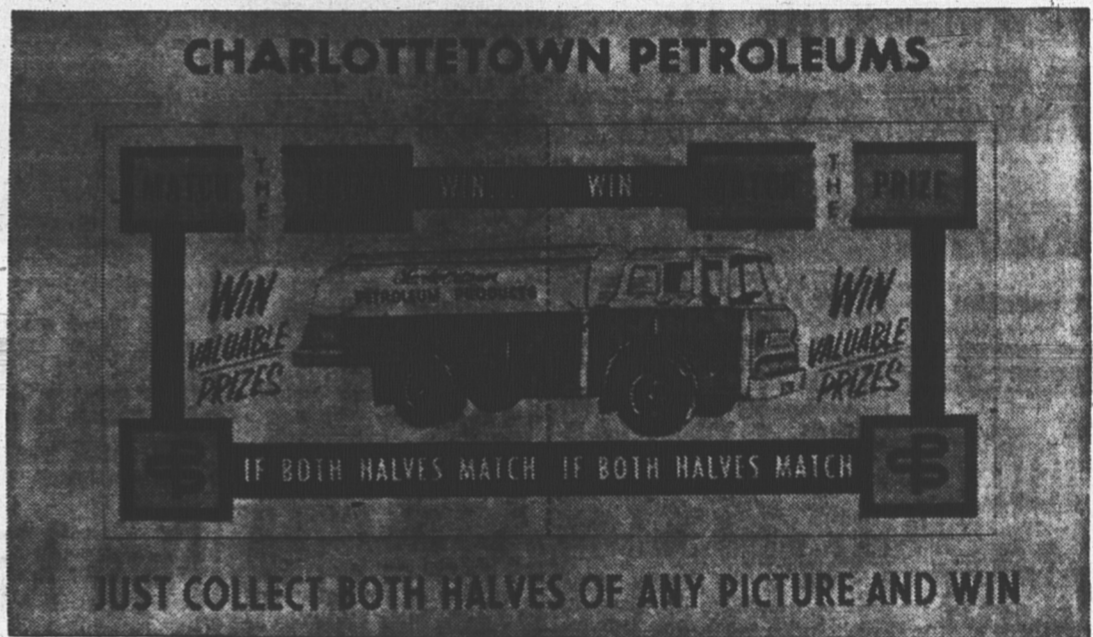
