NOTES AND COMMENTS.

A despatch from Tien Tsin reports that "there is no rain, no crops, and a prospect of pestilence and famine."

The Montreal Gazette says that "If the Government has not the courage to make all newspapers pay postage it should have the fairness to carry all free."

Ex Alderman Rowan, of Ottawa, an old-time Ottawa Liberal has formally joined the Conservative Party led by Sir Charles Tupper. He says that the defeat of the Liberals in 1878 will be repeated at the next general election.

The Union Standard, of Thornbury, Ontario, remarks it is about time the farmers of this country were awakening to the fact that a higher grade of cattle is wanted as well as a more thorough system of feeding.

As to the Vitine Swindle it has been well remarked that there are two deplorable features of this transaction. The first is the affair proper; the second is the organized attempt to hush it up.

Montreal Gazette: On the emergency food scandal division the Laurier Government's majority went down to 14. Thirteen per cent. of the Liberals in the House of Commons voted against it. If 13 per cent. of the voters who put the Laurier Government in power vote against it at the general elections its end will be emphatic.

Mr. James Somerville, M. P., one of the Mackenzie Liberals has been forced out of the Tarte-Laurier Party. He is an honest man who condemns the Government's extravagance. It has been remarked that "there will be very few of the genuine Liberals in the next House Laurier does not want to be harassed by members who insist that the principles be observed."

Emperor William has telegraphed to the commander of the German squadron in Chinese waters, to the governor of Shan Tung, to the viceroys and to others, offering a thousand taels to anyone accomplishing the deliverance of any foreigner of any nationality whatever, now shut up in Pekin, who is handed over to any German magistrate, and offering to pay expenses of the publication of this offer in Pekin.

It is reported from St Petersburg that the Czar will not hear of any peremptory settlement of the Chinese affair or the expansion of the territories belonging to any single power. The Czar is convinced that Germany will support him in this policy. Powerful influences are at work trying to induce the Czar to maintain absolute reserve until the strength of the other powers is exhausted, when Russia will assume the position of arbiter and secure the lion's share of the spoils. The despatch concludes by saying that the Czar will have to show extraordinary firmness to weather the storm of feeling it will arouse.

TO BE INSPECTED.

SIR,—I notice in an editorial in the Guardian of the 6th inst, under the heading of "Farmer and Doctor Candidates," that that paper had no disposition to intervene between the parties who are contesting the Second District of Queen's. I notice too that although that innocent independent paper heard Mr. Tarte's speeches and unbecoming expressions for many a day without a word of disapproval it has selected the time when the votes of the people of Rustico are wanted for the Farquharson Government to show its independence by denouncing Mr. Tarte with the evident intention of having the paper placed in the hands of the French electors of Rustico where it has nothing to lose in order to show how their compatriots in the Liberal Government are used by the press, and get their votes for the Liberal candidate.

It says "We may venture to examine the principle laid down in the sentence above quoted from THE EXAMINER and try and sift the chaff from the wheat." Who is better qualified to sift the chaff from the wheat than the temperance editor, who would laud Premier Farquharson to the skies for pressing a prohibition bill that will give him blood money during all the days that he will be in power and that postpones any hope of any change from the present license system till the Government is a thing of the past? The article shows that as a sifter the editor of the Guardian can do fairly well; but when the sifting is done why give us all the chaff? It goes on to say "its underlying principle is that a body of electors ought to be represented by a man of the same calling as themselves." Its underlying principle is nothing of the kind, but its underlying principle is that no one should act for or advise the public but a person who knows and means what he is talking about. For instance, a lawyer, doctor or business man should not prate too much about the interest of the farmer. It means, too, that a person should not set himself up as the representative and spokesman of temperance people when he was willing to sell, sacrifice and betray the temperance cause in order to bolster up a rotten and corrupt party, more especially when he claimed to belong to no party but was independent. This is the underlying principle, Mr Guardian, and we hope you will apply it in so far as it suits you. The Guardian insultingly says that comparatively few farmers are qualified for seats in Parliament. They have not endeavored to qualify themselves for representative positions and adds "we think this is to be regretted." Certainly it is to be regretted if correct. But fortunately it is not correct, and such unworthy opinions of the farmers of this province are only entertained

by a few who are swallowed up by their great opinions of themselves. Who, besides the editor of the Guardian will undertake to say that there cannot be found in this province a thousand, to say nothing of thirty, farmers who are sufficiently well qualified to act as representatives? The truth is that when a farmer contests an election it is with the view of representing the people and getting in return only a trifling sessional allowance and will not resort to deceit or to paying out large sums of money that will never be returned in order to win, while a doctor or lawyer will see visions of lucrative and honorable positions at the head of society and will go any length to gain the seat that they consider only a stepping stone to higher honors; the farmer is left and in the end the interest of the country is left. This is the reason we do not have more farmer representatives.

The innocent Guardian is of the opinion that since the farmers do not fill thirty seats in the legislature it is because there are not that many qualified farmers in the province. What qualification is required? We hear that at a meeting a few evenings ago, the Leader of the Government said that if they had issued twenty-six thousand more debentures last year they would have the handsome surplus of six thousand dollars. Why not issue a million and twenty-six thousand debentures, have over a million surplus, and be rich at once. If the qualification shown by the Premier is all that is required I think it would be an easy matter to find farmers qualified for representatives; and I do not think it would be hard to find a farmer who could be a Guardian and act his part honorably too. Farmers should look with suspicion on doctors or any other class of people who will neglect their calling to enter politics from which they cannot expect any honest return for the loss incurred.
