The Futurity Race.

Sir,—The Agriculturist of the 23rd inst. by implication throws the blame of the disagreement in reference to the race upon me, and implies ignorance of the cause of my resignation. Mr. Beaman, at the time the article was written, had received the following letter, addressed to himself as Secretary, which gives what I consider a sufficient reason for resigning, viz:

"I beg to tender my resignation as President of the Futurity Stake Race, now pending, also an order on the Merchants Bank of Halifax for the funds belonging to the Association, standing in our joint names. Experience has led me to believe that the directors should be composed of men who have no pecuniary interest in the result of the race, or be made up of all the horsemen who have entries for the purse.
