Preliminary Hearing in Lee Case Is Continued

The second day of the preliminary hearing in the case of Harold Lee charged with theft and public mischief was continued with J.P. Nicholson appearing for the Crown and J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C., for the defence.

The cross examination of A. S. Savoy, superintendent for Anglin-Norcross (Maritime) Ltd. at the time of adjournment the previous day was continued by defence counsel.

The witness was questioned at some length regarding two receipts signed by Dominic Doyle for work done for the Federal Building project, one in the amount of \$279 and the other for \$527 both of which were dated October 15, 1955. Mr. Savoy produced receipts showing that the cheque for \$279 was recorded in his statement to Montreal, but he did not recall having seen the one for the larger amount. The receipt for the \$527 was apparently for the rental of three trucks. At this point the Magistrate issued a warning to the witness "to be careful of your evidence".

QUERIED RE CASH

Mr. Campbell asked witness if the cash balance with the statement on which the \$279 payment appears, to which he received the reply that it did. Counsel then asked that "if Doyle had been paid the \$527 your cash would have been out." The witness then stated that there had been a shortage of \$250 last fall about the time of the date of the receipt.

"It is to be assumed then that you sent false records to the company" said Mr. Campbell, to which he received the reply, "Yes - that is right".

When asked about the system of making up the payroll and seeing of cheques, witness stated that Lee made them the payroll under his (Savoy's) supervision and they were initiated by witness who also signed all cheques issued on the trust account held at the Bank of Commerce. The witness verified Mr. Campbell's statement that all employees of the company handling money were bonded and possible insured.

Mr. Savoy stated that cheques were generally typed out by him and presented to him for signature. On some occasions witness said that he filled out cheques which were not filled out at that point a signed unfilled cheque was produced to the bail.

Other cases on the docket was one charged with vagrancy who was sentenced to thirty days in jail and three drunk and incapacitated, two of whom received sentences of ten days and the other twenty days in jail. A motorist for falling to stop at a red light was adjourned to this morning. Arrangements by his counsel, J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. Harold Lee was released yesterday afternoon on a thousand dollar cash bail.
