DE YOUNG SHOT BY KALLOO. - A San Francisco despatch of April 23rd says: Charles De Young was shot and killed this evening by S. M. Kallooh, son of Mayor Kallooh.

STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT. - John Welsh, arrested in connection with the robbery of Mr. Lord's house of overcoats, was discharged. Patrick McGuigan, for assault on Joseph Hogan, was fined \$4 or 20 days. Daniel Maddin and Patrick McAree, were sentenced to six months' imprisonment, with hard labor for larceny of \$11 from the store of Benjamin Holland. The White boys, arrested for complicity in the same larceny, were discharged. Madlen was also sentenced to two months' imprisonment for stealing a pair of boots from the residence of Mr. Warburton. Patrick Dunn, arrested for vagrancy, was sentenced to eight months' imprisonment, and Robert White, arrested for the same offence, was sentenced to two months' imprisonment with hard labor.

THE Boston Herald is edited by able and shrewd men, and is published in a country which has had a longer experience of protection than any other, and this is the way it expects the Canadian tariff to operate. In an article urging the American Government to take steps at once to secure reciprocity with Canada, it says: -

"It seems reasonable to expect, if negotiations for a reciprocity treaty with the Dominion are too long delayed, that Canadian manufactures will have assumed such magnitude as to be able to prevent the adoption of any treaty favorable to the United States."

This is frank and honest, and shows how people who really know something about the effects of Protection regard it. It will have no effect however on the people who are engaged in Canada, in writing down Protection, for unfortunately they belong to a class who are wiser than any number of people who can render a reason. - *H. Herald.*

THE BARQUE "JAMES PEAKE." - Capt. Graham, of the Barque "James Peake," who arrived Philadelphia, on Monday last, in barque "Bessie Markham," reports sailed from Greenock, March 11th, for Philadelphia, when, with wind blowing strong from SW, and a heavy sea, found the vessel had sprung a leak. Set all hands at the pumps and continued pumping until the 14th, 11 a. m., when he found the water had increased to four feet in the hold; at this time sighted a vessel to leeward, and bearing down to her found her to be the "Bessie Markham," of Chatham, N. B., Capt. Gray, from Troon to Philadelphia, who lay by until 2 p. m., when, our crew refusing to pump any longer, I was forced to abandon my vessel and go on board the "Bessie Markham," the sea being rough, could save none of our effects. On the 22nd, we spoke barque "Sagitta," also from Troon for Philadelphia, and put seven of the crew on board that vessel.

The Police Magistrate at Halifax must be a terror to evil-doers, if stiff sentences are any terror. In his court on Wednesday, for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, a gray-haired female offender was fined \$10 or 40 days. Two women, mother and daughter, were fined \$5 or 60 days each for a like offence. A woman, for coming into the station in a state of intoxication, and making use of obscene language, was fined \$8 or \$80 days.

A grand philological fete or polyglot academy was held at the Vatican on the 19th inst. in honor of the exaltation of the Pope. The diplomatic body, the nobility and archbishops were present. The scholars of the Propaganda recited poems in forty-nine different languages extolling the Pope.

LONDON, April 25.
The Times says the ministerial crisis has ended.
Gladstone has accepted the duty of forming an administration, designating himself as Chancellor of the Exchequer, and first Lord of the Treasury.
Gladstone received a perfect ovation at Windsor. He spoke from the window of the railway carriage, thanking the people for their kindly greetings.

Lord Selborne, Lord High Chancellor. Wm. E. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland. Lord Northbrooke, first Lord of Admiralty.

NEW YORK, April 25.
The "Herald" cable says Gortschakoff seems to have issued victoriously from his last crisis, and excepting that his breathing is rather hard, he appeared comparatively well.

BOSTON, April 25.
A despatch from St. John's, Nfld., mentions that the "Caspian" went ashore and was afterwards run aground. Her fore compartments are full of water, and the dry goods on board scarcely damaged. Her cargo is being discharged.
