

German Party Mastermind Outlines Nationalistic Aim

NUERNBERG (AP) — Wolfgang Ross, who helped mastermind the success of the rightist National Democratic party in the Bavarian state elections Sunday, is a captain in the West German Army.

A new member of a new party, Ross at 31 became the first active-duty soldier elected to a West German parliament.

And the blonde, crew-cut helicopter squad leader is confident that a heightened sense of West German nationalism will mean more successes for the party, whose appeal already has dismayed many observers.

"Young men such as I are growing increasingly annoyed at the failure to recognize the national element as an equal factor in politics," said Ross in an interview. "No other

party offered me an opportunity to do anything about it."

GIVE LOTS OF ROOM

Opportunity was abundant for Ross in the new party. The party is only two years old and Ross was assigned to run the party headquarters only eight months after joining.

The defense ministry in Bonn granted him a leave of absence from military service.

In Sunday's election he tallied the second-highest vote among all National Democratic party candidates and won a seat along with 14 other party members as the party polled 7.4 per cent of the vote.

The success roused fears that right-wing radicalism is rising only 20 years after the destruction of Adolf Hitler's Nazi Reich.

"We are not radicals and we are certainly not Nazis," Ross said. "Any African state can be nationally-minded, but Germany is not supposed to follow such a line."

SUPPRESSION A DANGER

Ross believes that "overly strong suppression of national feelings can cause extreme nationalism."

"We are trying to direct such national feelings into controlled paths."

Ross said his party is "less nationalistic than the followers of France's President de Gaulle."

"He tried to do quickly what can be achieved with less effort over a longer period: Throwing off the American fetters."

Ross, a Roman Catholic, was

Reich collapsed. He cut short his high school studies when his war widow mother could no longer support his education.

There are ex-Nazis in the party leadership, said Ross said: "I have nothing against them."

"There are former Nazis in all other parties too."

He made a point of not mentioning Kurt Georg Kiesinger, the ex-Nazi chosen by the Christian democrats to succeed Ludwig Erhard as chancellor of West Germany.

Other National Democratic party speakers have mockingly labelled Kiesinger a fellow sufferer in referring to criticism of his Nazi past.

WILL HELP IN END

"We are being terrorized," Ross said. "But you will see that terror will backfire. It will work for us eventually."

Ross, who rose to captain through the ranks, said: "It was just the same when I joined the army 10 years ago. They spat at me when I went out in my uniform. I kept wearing it and today people in Roth like us."

It is the garrison town of 10,000 near Nuernberg where Ross is stationed and where he heads the 80-member National Democratic party. His local party chapter includes 20 soldiers and Ross said he believes a considerable part of the 400,000 Bundeswehr (armed forces) are sympathetic to his party.

Ross, who will don civilian dress for the four-year legislative period, said he was once told that political activity was "not opportune" for army officers.

"I decided to ignore that hint."

Unit Labor Costs Remain Steady In U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unit labor costs in the United States have remained almost unchanged in the last nine years, while advancing sharply in other industrial countries, the U.S. labor department has reported.

"Only Canada matches the U.S. record in labor-cost stability since 1957," said the bureau of labor statistics.

The bureau said labor is the principal cost in manufacturing and is a vital factor affecting world trade and the U.S. balance of payments.

"From the standpoint of labor cost per unit of output, American manufacturers in the mid-1960s have achieved a better competitive position relative to foreign producers than they held in the late 1950s."

Compared with the virtually unchanged unit labor costs of Canada and the U.S. since 1957, labor costs rose 39 per cent in The Netherlands, 35 per cent in

West Germany, 19 per cent in France and Britain and 18 per cent in Japan.

The bureau's study showed the U.S. did not fare as well competitively in the increase of workers' productivity over the last 15 years.

OUTPUT UP

Output per man hour in manufacturing increased 40 per cent in the U.S. but soared well over 100 per cent in West Germany, Italy and Japan, about 100 per cent in The Netherlands, about 50 per cent in Canada, and France and slightly more than 50 per cent in Sweden.

The study noted that the countries showing the sharpest productivity increases all suffered heavy damage in the Second World War and part of the explanation was their abnormally low output even as late as 1950.

Despite the slower rate of pay growth, the U.S. worker still earns more than his counterpart in any of the other nations surveyed," the bureau said.

TABLE LOOKS BETTER

Fundamental World Issues Seen Between Rich And Poor

NEW DELHI (CP)—Dr. N. L. Keenleyside, co-chairman of the British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority, said today the

fundamental world issues are not between communism and capitalism but between the rich and the poor.

Dr. Keenleyside, former director-general of the United Nations technical assistance program, delivered the keynote address today to the third world conference on medical education.

The conference, co-sponsored by the World Health Organization and the Pan American Health Organization, opened Sunday.

Text of Dr. Keenleyside's address was provided to the press before delivery.

He devoted a major part of his speech to the problem of ever-increasing population and suggested that doctors of the world have the responsibility and competence to contribute to the solution.

"Increased production is not the answer to the population problem; at best it can be only a most temporary palliative," Dr. Keenleyside said.

WONT SOLVE PROBLEM

"No conceivable increase in production will solve the problem of proliferating humanity as long as unrestricted population contingents to add to the sum of human needs and to impede all efforts to meet them."

"For the last six years total world food consumption has exceeded production."

Dr. Keenleyside said that not only is population increasing at a phenomenal rate, but the rate of increase itself is also rising sharply—to 2.1 per cent in 1964 from 1.7 per cent in 1961.

Dr. Keenleyside said that if things go on as they now are, the maximum world population that can conceivably be tolerated will be reached long before the year 2100.

He said that it is apparent that the choice will be birth control or genocide.

"Let us hope that the hydrogen bomb is not the only answer to the over-active womb."

Dr. Keenleyside said the tragedy of today is the fact that so much time and money is devoted to ideological issues that should be resolved by debate instead of by threats of universal war—while a large part of humanity lives in fear and hunger and disease.

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CONTRACT BRIDGE

By B. JAY BECKER

1. You are declarer with the West and at Six Hearts. North leads the king of clubs, which you ruff. When you then lead the ace of hearts, North discards a spade. How would you play the hand?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump. North having overcalled your diamond bid with a heart. North leads the king of hearts. How would you play the hand?

1. To give yourself the best chance, you must consider the possibility of one opponent's having four diamonds to the jack in line with this, you play the ten of hearts on the ace, then cash the king of hearts, king of spades, and ace of diamonds, and follow all this by finessing the nine of hearts.

Now you cash the queen of hearts and ace of spades, discarding the K-Q of diamonds from dummy! You then play the ten of diamonds to force out the jack, and this is the only trick you lose.

2. You start with seven quick tricks and the problem is to build up two more without placing the contract in jeopardy. If you were to take the ace of hearts and enter dummy with a diamond in order to lead the queen of clubs and finesse, you could go down if North's hand looked something like this:

He would take the king of clubs and shift to the jack of spades, and you would go down at least one.

The sure way of making the contract is to lead a low club towards dummy at trick two. If North has the king and takes it, you play low from dummy and now have nine tricks. If South has the king and takes it, you are up to eight tricks and can easily make a ninth by leading towards the jack of hearts.

If North has the king of clubs and does not take it, you win the trick in dummy with the queen and develop your ninth trick later in hearts.
