



ATTEND DAIRY SCHOOL

The annual Dairy School is now in progress at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. Thirty students will spend three months at the College studying the principles of modern technical dairying. They will learn the processing of milk products, such as butter, cheese, powdered milk, and ice cream, and will be trained to assume positions in the dairy industry.

The class is drawn from all parts of Ontario, as well as from Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. One student, Ramiro Branco, has come all the way from Portugal to take the course. He is a graduate of the Agricultural College at Lisbon. There is also a student from Switzerland. The dairy school has been conducted continuously

at the college since 1893, and in this time 4,178 students have taken the course. Some of the students are seen in the photo as they watch the process of making powdered milk. Saint John Will Clear Out Slum

SAINT JOHN (CP)—Eviction notices are to be served before May 1 on 23 families comprising 140 persons living in ramshackle, condemned quarters in north-end Millidgeville. The buildings, constructed as temporary air force barracks in 1940, are owned by the municipality, which will carry out the evictions. Saint John common

council agreed Tuesday to support the municipality. There was no immediate decision on where to re-settle the people. The area to be cleared was described by a building inspector as a "grave fire hazard," with plumbing and "a mere trickle" of water due to low pressure. A health department report said many of the apartments were overcrowded, foundations were crumbling, there was no hot

water and water pipes froze continually. Common council agreed to back the municipality's decision when it was reported that only 12 of the 23 families made an attempt to pay their rent of \$16-\$18 monthly. Pipeline Statement Given House By Finance Minister

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government is going it alone, without Ontario aid, in financing the Crown-owned section of the Trans-Canada natural gas pipeline through Northern Ontario. Finance Minister Fleming informed the Commons Tuesday that although Ontario had agreed originally to finance one-third of the cost there had been no agreement on the interest rate it would receive.

The rate asked by Ontario in recent negotiations, he indicated, was too high. Now that the line had been virtually completed solely with federal financing—\$12,750,000 up to Jan. 31—Mr. Fleming said the government has decided it has "no alternative" but to provide all the funds required to complete the Northern Ontario section of the line.

Under the plan of the former Liberal government, a Crown company, Northern Ontario Pipeline Crown Corporation, was to build the section from the Manitoba border to Kapuskasing, Ont., and lease it to Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Limited.

Ontario was to finance one-third of the cost up to \$35,000,000 with interest to it based on the prevailing rate for Ontario bonds. Mr. Fleming's statement, on a subject which stirred a bitter Commons debate in 1956, produced no reaction in the House. In 1956 the Progressive Conservative and CCF Opposition parties put up an angry battle against the then Liberal government's plan to help Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Limited finance its gas line from Alberta to Montreal.
