Church-State Settlement In Argentina Indicated

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — The Roman Catholic Church and President Juan D. Peron's government Sunday gave evidence that both are eager to settle their bitter dispute which has kept Argentina in a turmoil for eight months.

The prime of Argentina, Santiago Luis Cardinal Copello, issued a message read in all Buenos Aires churches Sunday morning urging "the clergy, religious associations and all the faithful to occupy the first line in the pacification of spirits in which we all must engage."

The cardinal said he had shared the sufferings and sorrow "for priests arrested and churches closed, and felt that since all the clergy now have been liberated and restrictions on the church lifted it proved those measures were unjustified in the first place.

But he took steps to avoid any new tension between the church and the government. He stayed away from services in Buenos Aires cathedral. Close associates explained he feared his presence might inspire a demonstration leading to new trouble.

DISAPPROVES MARCH
The cardinal let it be known the shouting march of Catholics through downtown streets Saturday after the cathedral was reopened does not have his approval.

During morning masses Sunday police in buses toured downtown Buenos Aires but both churchgoers and police were on their best behavior and determined to avoid incidents.

In this atmosphere of conciliation, high level peace talks have been opened. Msgr. Mario Zanin, papal nuncio to Argentina, met Saturday with Foreign Minister Jeronimo Remoino. They were joined by two high prelates of the Argentine church and Carlos Oliva Velez, Argentine ambassador to the Vatican, indicating this was a serious discussion of church-state differences.

Neither side disclosed the subjects of discussion or whether any decisions were reached although Remoino has been reported counseling moderation by the government in the controversy.

U. S. Sec'y Of Agriculture Makes Amends To U Nu

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prime Minister U Nu of Burma got a purple carpet reception at the department of agriculture Friday in sharp contrast to a heel-cooling incident that left protocol authorities aghast.

Following up his own personal apology Thursday night to the visiting Asian leader, Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson had everything ready long before their scheduled conference.

The meeting was arranged to take the place of one which failed to come off Thursday because Benson kept U Nu waiting for five minutes beyond their appointed hour.

The Burma prime minister stalked off then with the words, "I'll tell them we'll see them some other time."

As the "other time" approached Friday, assistant secretary Earl Butz stationed himself in front of the agriculture department's main entrance.

ALL WAS READY
Five minutes ahead of schedule U Nu's party arrived accompanied by a motorcycle escort.

Butz stuck his head through the door and shouted into the building: "Get the elevators ready. Here they come."

U Nu's car came to a stop and Butz rushed up to greet the visitor and escort him personally to Benson's office on the second floor.

There all was in readiness. Doors were opened ceremoniously for him at every turn.

Thursday U Nu and his party had been left to find their own way to Benson's office. Members of the party even had to give their names to a receptionist.

HARD LABOR SENTENCES
BERLIN (Reuters)—Four East Germans, alleged to have worked for RIAS, the United States radio station in West Berlin, have been sentenced to hard labor terms ranging from six years to life, the East German news agency ADN reported Saturday. A district court at Rostock, Mecklenburg, convicted them of military and economic espionage, sabotage and diversion.

DROWN IN WADING POOL
TORONTO (CP)—Curt Bramhill, 11 months, was drowned Saturday in eight inches of water in a plastic wading tank which his father put in the backyard the day before "to keep the kids off the street." Mrs. Robert Bramhill found her son 15 minutes after he fell face down into the 11-inch-high portable pool.

Pearson Declines Invitation To Visit Moscow

OTTAWA (CP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov has invited External Affairs Minister Pearson to visit Moscow, but Mr. Pearson is not planning any immediate trip, it was stated Saturday.

The invitation was extended by Mr. Molotov to Mr. Pearson and other Western delegates during last week's San Francisco ceremonies marking the 10th anniversary of the United Nations.

Mr. Pearson was reported to have expressed the wish to see Moscow sometime, but not immediately. His view is that the invitation is just part of Russian propaganda to show a "soft" approach to the West.
