WE AND OUR NEIGHBORS

Gifted Child Cannot Be Assessed By I.Q. Alone

These past weeks we have touched on various psychological tests that are being used more and more in the search for the Gifted Child. The best known and most helpful of these is the Intelligence Test yielding the now familiar IQ score (Intelligence Quotient). We pointed out that even the most reliable of the intelligence tests such as the "Stanford-Binet" or the newer "Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children" has defects and limitations and should be administered by a trained psychologist and the score (or scores) interpreted with an understanding of the child (group tests should not be used) and the weakness of the test.

But under the most favorable conditions (it has been emphasized) no final judgment should be made on the basis of the child's IQ alone. The score must be checked against the day by day observation of the child's behavior—his thoughts and feelings as expressed in his words as well as in his actions. And since our schools are chiefly responsible for the mental development of our children, the class-room teacher is in the best position to identify the gifted child. But her data would be superficial indeed without the help of parents, doctors, playground directors, others who have observed the child in his pre-school days and can still study him outside of the school situation.

NURSE WEDS

EDINBURGH, Scotland, (Reuters) — The 40-year-old Earl of Strathmore, cousin of Queen Elizabeth II, was married recently in the private chapel of his castle at Glamis to Mary Brennan, an Irish nurse from Dublin.

Last July, Canon J. C. Rorison, retired Episcopalian minister who is private chaplain to the Strathmore family, said he had refused to marry them because Miss Brennan was a Catholic.

The couple first met about two years ago when Miss Brennan, now 30, nursed the Earl after an operation in London. She since has attended him during several illnesses.

Lord Strathmore's father, whom he succeeded as the 16th Earl in 1949, was the eldest brother of the Queen Mother Elizabeth.

The ceremony was performed by Canon Douglas C. Noble, rector of St. John's Scottish Episcopal Church at Forfar. The witnesses were two of Miss Brennan's friends.

The new Countess said after the service that they hoped to go abroad for three or four weeks on a honeymoon.

The couple held a press conference after the wedding and the new Lady Strathmore said she realized her marriage in an Episcopal church meant giving up her own religion.
