(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 13—Police tonight concentrated on a lone clue, a 13-inch piece of cord, in their search for the bathtub slayer of Mrs. Nancy Evans Tilterson, wife and sister of a National Broadcasting Company executive.

LOW SUMMER FARES TO EASTERN CANADA WILL AGAIN BE IN FORCE

A popular travel incentive to the Maritime Provinces which was in effect last summer is again being put into force for the summer of 1936 by Canadian railways, namely the 21-day limit low summer tourist fares. The fares apply to stations in Eastern Canada from points Montreal and West to Armstrong and Port Arthur, Ont., on the Canadian National Railways, and will be in effect from June 15th to September 7th. Fares are based on the regular first class one-way fare plus one tenth for the round trip. Stopovers are permitted in both directions within the limit of the ticket but passengers are restricted to the same route both going and returning.

REPUBLIC LOSES VAST RESOURCES

CARACAS, Venezuela, 14—(CP) Shortage of cash resources due to large withdrawals of bank deposits by members of the family of the late General Juan Vicente Gomez, former President-Dictator of Venezuela, is reported in Caracas, newspapers. It is estimated that withdrawals were far in excess of \$15,000,000—all made since the middle of last December.

President Gomez, who ruled the South American republic with an iron hand for 27 years, was regarded as one of the wealthiest men in the country, with tremendous land, light and power interests. Members of the dictator's family left Venezuela during the January uprisings and were reported to have purchased a large estate in Jamaica.

Repaired Blast Furnace Relighted

S., April 13—Four-year old Brierley brightened the outlook for Sydney's hundreds of steelworkers Saturday when she lighted a giant blast furnace that had been cold for nearly three months while undergoing repairs in the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation plant.

Applying the torch that started the unit in operation, the little daughter of the assistant general superintendent was the central figure in a ceremony attended by Sir Newton Moore, President of the Corporation.

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Bombs Sent As Easter Gift Packages

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WILKES-BARRE, Pa., April 13—Working with a list of "dangerous characters" furnished by one of the seriously injured, detectives pressed today their search for terrorists whose "Easter gift" packages of bombs killed two persons and maimed three others.

The toll of fatalities reached two last night with the death of four-year-old Thomas Maloney, Jr. Several fingers of his left hand were badly bruised by a dynamite bomb which exploded Friday in his home. His father, organizer of the United States Anthracite Miners, a union, since virtually disbanded, which was opposed to the United Mine Workers of America, remained in a serious condition.

From his hospital bed, Maloney gasped out to detectives a list of the names of men he believes may have been responsible for the outrage. Michael Gallagher, 70, caretaker of a cemetery was called as he opened one of the packages in his home on Friday. Police said Gallagher and Maloney were close friends and he had testified against dynamiting suspects and reported thefts of explosives from the cemetery.

World Divided Into Two Classes

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 13—Nations of the world could be divided into two classes—the "haves" and the "have nots"—Major-General W. A. Orlesbach told the United Services Institute of Nova Scotia at its annual meeting Saturday.

One class, including Great Britain, Russia and France, had vast expanses of productive territory, while the other, including Germany, Japan and Italy, had no room for expanding population. Soon or later the British Empire, with its tremendous resources would be challenged, Senator Orlesbach said.

"This may mean war and tribulation for us, but history tells us that that is the age long test by which the nations are judged in their struggles to survive, to be happy, to be free, to be secure."

PASSENGERS DESCRIBE AIR CLIPPER CRASH

Pilot Swerved Airliner To Avoid Launch on Take-off.

(C. P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire) GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, April 13—Passengers of the giant air clipper that crashed off Trinidad Saturday with a loss of three lives said here today the machine did a ground-loop when one wing dipped into the water after the pilot had swerved to avoid a launch.

Describing the accident, E. M. Flynn, Wildford Tansley and Arthur Carr, Toronto mining men on their way to the British Guiana goldfields, said drizzling rain made visibility poor and the clipper was almost on top of the airway launch before the pilot saw it.

"As the machine looped there was a bump as if it had struck something and we were all thrown over to the left side," Flynn continued.

"Two of the port holes on that side were knocked out and water began to rush into the cabin. There was no panic but some passengers got on top of the cabin. For some reason or other none of the passengers got out the front exit. As they went towards the rear exit the tail of the plane began to sink, and those who got out stood on top of the plane so close to the exit they blocked the escape of those still in the cabin with water up to their necks.

"The launch came around promptly and took us off. The women passengers kept their heads well. We were all surprised and sorry to learn afterwards that two passengers and a steward had been drowned. Possibly their lifebelts handicapped them."

The three drowned were Ramon Martinez, New York export manager for the Empire National Company; Dr. Eric Brough, distinguished London pianist, and Nomades Lopez, Miami, dining steward.

Sixteen passengers and six members of the crew of the Brazil-bound plane were rescued and returned to Port of Spain, which they had left just before dawn.

A relief plane brought 11 passengers to Georgetown last night, and eight, including Jose Turbi, celebrated musician, left today for Rio De Janeiro.

The three Toronto mining men, who remained in Georgetown, bore slight scars of their experience. Three stitches were required to close a wound over Flynn's left eye.

Women Discuss Economic Problems

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, April 13.—Stocked rugs and international relations, garden patches and economic problems, these are some of the pegs that talks will hang upon in the meeting of a thousand or so rural women here during the first week of June.

Already officials of the Associated Country Women of the World have been informed that delegates will come from upward of a dozen countries including Canada.

In the exhibit of handicrafts that will be put into shape for the meeting, space is being prepared for samples of work in farm homes.

One of the speakers at the meeting will be Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who has taken deep interest in the various types of farm women's work. Another will be Lady Aberdeen from Scotland, at whose suggestion the first international meeting was held in London in 1929.

Hindus Interrupt All-India Congress

LUCKNOW, India, April 13—Sessions of the all-India Congress were interrupted today as a score of Sanatanists—cast Hindus—rushed the meeting hall. The demonstration was in protest against what the Sanatanists termed the interference with religious matters of the Congress.

Jawaharlal Nehru, president, was forced to leave the chair for a short time until the demonstrators were dispersed. No one was seriously injured.

Resolutions declaring opposition to India's participation in any "imperialist war" and expressing sympathy with Ethiopia in her fight against Italy were adopted by the Congress. Another resolution condemned the "great powers" of the League of Nations for their policy in connection with the Italian-Ethiopian war.
