Sask. Commission

The Government of Saskatchewan has recently appointed a Royal Commission on Agriculture and Rural Life. The work of the Commission is expected to provide a blueprint for the development of agriculture for the next twenty five years.

Specifically the Commission will investigate and make recommendations regarding the requirements for the maintenance of a sound farm economy and the improvement of social conditions in rural Saskatchewan.

Members of the new body include H. L. Fowler, a native of Prince Edward Island who moved west in 1911. A second member is J. L. Phelps, President of the Farmer's Union.

Farm Associate

Over the years the farmers of this province have promoted a great variety of concerns to handle the marketing and processing of farm products.

Most of these ventures have rendered a valuable service to the members, but in spite of this fact many have run into financial difficulties and have passed out of existence.

While it may be easy to point to any specific factor that was the cause of these ventures going out of business, it may, we feel, be stated with fairness that two things appear to be essential in maintaining a healthy association or co-operative.

(1st) The members should be actively interested in the affairs of their business and realize its value to them.

(2nd) They should have a reasonable financial investment in the enterprise.

If these two factors are in evidence the business should continue useful and vigorous and not develop hardening of the arteries as has too often been the case.

Potato Problems

While from the growers standpoint the two main factors of price and crop are satisfactory, there looms on the horizon at the moment, the problem of moving the crop out of the province and this is particularly important in relation to potatoes in outside farm storage.

Refrigerator cars are very scarce and shipment in box cars from now on is certainly hazardous.

One hundred cars a day could easily be used, but at the moment a small fraction of this number are available.

Beef Floor

We understand on reliable authority that the Price Support Board is prepared to purchase at \$35.00 per hundred boned-out beef from Maritime Packing Plants.

Due to the wide variation of dressing percentage in the grades affected it is difficult to state definitely what this could mean in terms of live cattle price.

The price quoted could mean an increase over present prices offered for some grades, but might possibly mean a decrease in others.

The price offered is the Montreal price, less freight to that point, for our own part we fail to see why the price of meat which in most cases does not move out of the

SHEPARD, Alta. (CP) - Fred Nelson, a farmer in this district just of Calgary, sold his 2,000-acre farm to a United States industrialist for \$100 an acre. It was reported one of the biggest Alberta farmland deals in recent years.

Canada To Extend Credit To Yugoslavia

OTTAWA, Oct. 23 (CP) - The Canadian Government has decided to extend almost \$10,000,000 worth of credit to help Yugoslavia buy wheat from Canada. Federal officials disclosed Tuesday.

The credit will be in the form of a guarantee of payment under the Export Credits Insurance Corporation and will run about one year, officials said. If Yugoslavia defaults, payment will come out of the Federal treasury.

Yugoslavia, hit by a domestic wheat crop failure, has agreed to purchase 150,000 tons of Canadian class II No. 5 wheat, paying 26 per cent cash. The Federal credit will cover the remaining 80 per cent.

Total cost is expected to run to about \$12,000,000, with the Federal credit totalling about \$9,600,000.

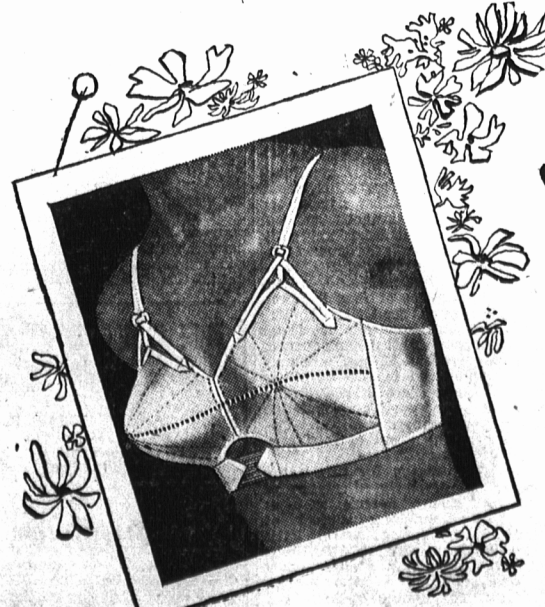

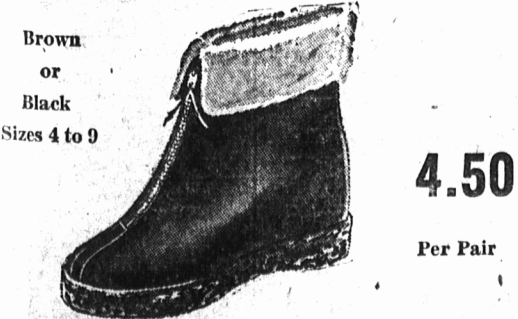
