Find Inhaled Gasoline Fumes Killed Man In Car Accident

A coroner's jury empanelled to inquire into the cause of death of L.A.C. Joseph Horace Raoul Tierman, age 29 years, of R. C. A. F. Station Summerside, who was found dead under his car at Linkletter Road on the morning of August 31st, met in the Court House last evening and after hearing the evidence of Dr. Harold Shaw, provincial pathologist and of Constable Cameron of the R. C. M. P., returned a verdict that the deceased had met his death as a result of a car accident in which he was pinned under the car in such a position that the gasoline from the car saturated his clothing, causing congestion of the lungs which in turn caused suffocation and death.

that in the process of inhaling the fumes while under the car the irritant gas caused excess fluid to gather in the victim's lungs and that as a result of this he had actually drowned internally. Dr. Shaw emphasized the fact that this case illustrates the need of immediate attention being given to a victim following an accident in which the clothing is saturated with gasoline. The inquest was conducted by Coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan and the Crown was represented by Mr. Nell MacLeod. Members of the jury were: Albert Linkletter (foreman); Sterling Reeves, Angus Cameron, Benjamin Doucette, Sigurd Mackinnon, Duncan MacKendrick, Scott Frohlicher. L.A.C. Tierman was a native of Montreal.

An outline of her experiences indicated that while parts of Europe are quaint and parts very lovely, there is still no place like Canada. Travelling throughout Europe during her holidays, she visited France, Italy, West and East Germany, Denmark and Sweden, as well as England and Ireland. She met with the people of these nations, taking in the many interesting sights they have to offer.

HOSPITAL FINANCES At the meeting Rotarian Frank Arnett introduced Judge Walter E. Darby of Summerside, who is chairman of the financial committee for the Prince County Hospital. Judge Darby gave an outline of the hospital's finances and advised that they were in a critical stage. Their bankers have set a limit of \$120,000 on their overdraft and this amount is presently exceeded. In addition, bills representing pay rolls and supplies are now due and cheques for some of these have been sent out in the hope that revenue will come in to take care of them.

In this connection some 400 letters have been sent out and it is the intention of the board to canvass those people who do not respond to the letter.
