Council Urges Paving Of Railway Stn. Yard

KENSINGTON — Edson Rayner headed a delegation waiting on the Kensington Town Council Monday night requesting the Kelvin Road be paved from the Summerside road (Victoria Street) to the Kensington rink.

Others on the committee were Lorne Crozier and Heath Mayhew. They were assured that it is the intention of the town to pave this street.

In the interest of street improvement it was planned by the meeting to purchase filling material for unpaved streets. It is also the intention of the town to pave all important streets in the near future, and the matter of the unpaved railway station yard in the centre of the town was discussed.

Since this area continues to be a source of mud and dust, and since requests to the C.N.R. authorities for the paving of the yard have been ignored it was decided to approach the federal member for Prince County as well as the C.N.R., general superintendent for the Atlantic region.

MANY COMPLAINTS
Police Officer Fred McCormack reported many complaints regarding broken sidewalks. It was agreed that they are in a deplorable condition due to the work last fall on the sewage system, but repairs will be deferred until the frost is out and the ground settled.

A permit was granted the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., for construction of gasoline fuel and oil

storage space in the town to be placed underground.

The town clerk Mrs. C. M. Kennedy was authorized to write a letter of appreciation to the Mutual Fire Insurance Company for a donation which will be added to the fire truck fund.

Fire Chief Bruce MacLeod reported that the fire brigade has responded to 11 calls in the past month, three outside the town.

This produced a lively discussion regarding the answering of calls in the country by firemen in cases where the subscription fee is paid after the fire is started. It was agreed that a period of several hours should elapse between payment of the fee and response to a call.

OFFICE VACANT
The mayor reported that the office of magistrate is still vacant with no result from names submitted at last meeting. New names were suggested but no appointment made pending acceptance.

The perennial question of dogs damaging gardens was brought before the meeting, and Officer McCormack said he had destroyed a large number but there are still many dogs running at large.

Several of the councillors plan to attend the annual meeting of the Island Federation of Municipalities in Charlottetown next Friday.

Mayor Everett Champion presided at the council meeting, and all councillors were present.

SUMMERSIDE — The case of a Borden man charged with dealing in motor vehicles without a licence was further adjourned until May 19 when the man appeared in Magistrate's Court here yesterday morning.

He pleaded guilty to being intoxicated on an Indian reservation and was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days in jail. A sister of the accused was fined \$10 and costs on a similar charge.

Island School Trustees Form Own Association

A Prince Edward Island School Association was organized at a well attended meeting of trustees held last night at Birchwood High School auditorium.

The association, the first of its kind ever formed on the island, has Charles MacArthur of Windsor as president. Vice-presidents elected were Ralph MacCarville, Kings County and Donald Stewart of Bumbury for Queens.

The secretary and treasurer will be chosen from the executive members who are Dick MacKinnon, Clair Croken, and Walter White (Queens); Charles MacFarlane and Vernon Greenan (Prince); John S. MacDonald, Frances Shepherd and Howard MacLean (Kings).

GUEST SPEAKER
Charles M. Simms, of Fredericton, N.B., a vice-president of the Canadian Association of Trustees, told the meeting of the steps leading up to the formation of the New Brunswick association and the benefits derived from it.

He said better teacher tenure has been worked out and teachers in N.B. now have better salary schedules and sick leave.

He pointed out that circumstances on P.E.I. where there are high enrolments in rural schools with staggered classes are similar to those in other provinces. These problems led eventually to large building programs.

RCAF MERCY FLIGHT

Injured S'side Boy Is Flown To Halifax

Seven-year-old Nelson Blanchard was flown by RCAF mercy flight to hospital in Halifax last night suffering undisclosed injuries following an accident in the early evening.

The young lad, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Blanchard, Notre Dame Street, was struck by a car in front of his home near Civic Stadium about 6 p.m. He was flown to the Nova Scotia capital at 10:30.

The driver of the vehicle was

believed to be a young Summerside man.

The RCAF Dakota aircraft from the local station making the flight was piloted by Flight Lieutenant Harry Savelle with Flight Lieutenant J. Finkbine as co-pilot.

An alternative plan to land at Greenwood air base was worked out provided fog prevented a landing at Halifax. An RCAF ambulance would be available at Greenwood to transport the young boy to Halifax.
