PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

MONDAY, May 1.

House met at 4 p. m. Mr. Gordon asked the Provincial Treasurer to table a statement showing the amount due by the Government on 27th April, 1899, to the Banks, and the name or names of the Bank or Banks, and the amount due each respectively; the amount due by Debentures and Private Loans, and the amounts due for Loans from Companies, Corporations and private individuals, respectively, not included in Debentures or Provincial Loans.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson presented the accounts asked for. Regarding the debentures he referred the hon member to the public accounts.

Mr. McKinnon asked the Commissioner of Public Works to table all petitions received for the opening of a Road between Valleyfield and Whim Road Cross, including the petitions to make it a continuation of Campbell's Road, and the petitions, if any, to open it in the present site.

Hon. Mr. McLean said all the petitions received could be seen at Public Works office.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the House resolved itself into committee of the whole to further consider the bill amending the Act regulating the registry of deeds and instruments relating to the title of lands and to repeal the laws heretofore passed for that purpose, Mr. Forbes taking the chair.

At the evening session committee was resumed. Progress was reported.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson tabled the information regarding the Hospital for the Insane, Asylum and Poor House asked for by Mr. M. McKinnon. House adjourned.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports for the past month show the enrolment to be 1399—831 boys and 568 girls. The Board decided to submit to the Legislature a bill regarding the care of children of school age found about the streets or parks during school hours.

THE LATE MRS. BARR.—The funeral of the late Mrs. James Barr, took place from the residence of her sister, Mrs. John Heurtz, corner of Great George and Euston Streets, this afternoon at half-past two. Mrs. Barr died in Boston on the 11th of last February, at the age of 76, and her body was embalmed and kept in a receiving vault. The remains were brought over in the Princess yesterday evening, accompanied by her two daughters, Mrs. Mearney and Mrs. Faust. The following were the pall-bearers at the funeral today: John Quirk, Martin West, George Davison, W. M. Coffin, Alexander Horn, and Philip Large.

ATTACKED BY A DOG.—The three-year-old daughter of Mr. Albert Burke, of Bay Fortune, was attacked by their dog one evening last week. According to a correspondent of the Guardian, while the child was playing in the yard the dog, which is a very large animal, attacked her fiercely inflicting deep wounds on the face. The eldest sister Minnie ran immediately to the rescue, and succeeded in getting the little one disengaged from her maddened foe. But again the dog grabbed the child and was deliberately proceeding with the work of death when the sister again clutched her precious charge and ran to the nearest building. By this time the father arrived and captured the brute which he immediately killed. Serious wounds were found on the child's face and forehead. The side of the face was so punctured by the dog's teeth as to leave the inside of the mouth exposed to view. Her recovery is expected, however.
