

Commonwealth Tariffs May Go, Committee Says

MONTREAL (CP)—The present system of Commonwealth trade preferences probably will have to be dismantled during the next few years, the Canadian Trade Committee says.

The future of trading preferences between Britain and Canada, in particular, is uncertain.

the committee says, and political strains are evident.

"During the next few years the British preferential system may well be dismantled in the course of negotiations to achieve the broader objectives of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) or of new regional agreements among North Atlantic countries."

The committee argues that it would be to the advantage of both Britain and Canada to make sure that the changes do not diminish opportunities for mutual trading.

The Canadian Trade Committee was established in 1961 to study Canadian trade problems and policies. Its membership consists of about 50 business, labor and agricultural leaders. Its statement, released this week, forms the preface to a pamphlet by Edward M. Cape, called Canada's Role in Britain's Trade.

Many of Canada's trading problems with Britain are the result of misunderstandings, the committee suggests.

RULES MISINTERPRETED

Canada's anti-dumping provisions and practices had been widely misinterpreted on a number of points.

The committee defines dumping as the act of selling a product abroad at a lower price than its "normal value" at home.

In his study of Canada's role in Britain's trade, Mr. Cape says the British believe the entire anti-dumping system is unfair.

"The British feel historical trends have made Canada's

treatment of British exports more and more inappropriate and unfair in comparison with Britain's treatment of Canadian exports, Mr. Cape says. He is on the staff of the Private Planning Association of Canada, co-sponsor, with the committee, of a recent Canadian Customs Act amendment which gives the government discretionary power to eliminate discrimination from Canada's anti-dumping system.

There was a gradual tightening of Canadian anti-dumping administration practices after the leniency of the earlier post-war years, the report says.

Canadian tariffs on British manufactured goods "are higher and more numerous than British tariffs on Canadian manufactured goods" and this has become "increasingly inappropriate."

The study also says Britain contends that the Canadian anti-dumping system provides for application of anti-dumping duties but does not require that cause or threat of injury be shown, as called for by GATT.

SEES LENIENCY

In some respects the Canadian provisions may be more lenient than those applied by other countries, Mr. Cape writes.

He says the real argument for dismantling the "automatic" feature is not that necessarily is bad, but that it looks bad.

Foreign governments and businesses have sometimes threatened to use the Canadian law as a precedent for strength-

ening their own anti-dumping provisions, he writes.

Turning to Canada's trade deficit, the committee says in its preface that Britain may have a "justified grievance," but no one nation should be singled out for special measures designed to correct an overall imbalance.

It says "some British spokesmen have pointed out that Britain's adverse merchandise trade balance with Canada makes up a major part of their country's import balance."

"The Canadian Trade Committee does not accept the implication that such a trade deficit in itself constitutes a reason for the application of policy measures designed to alter the balance of trade between the two nations."

If there had been unilateral changes in the commercial rules between the two trading partners, there may have been a justified grievance, the spokesman said.

But in a multilateral trading context, "such a grievance cannot be supported merely by reference to a trading deficit that one of the partners is suffering in its trade deficit with the other."

Cat And Captain Alone On Ship

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—The cat and the captain are the only crew members of the abandoned Greek freighter Proteus still in Canada.

The cat is under care of the Kingston Humane Society, and the captain, Christos Samonas, is awaiting a court hearing in Montreal on charges that the vessel illegally discharged oil in the St. Lawrence Seaway.

An earlier report that the department of transport had seized the freighter, aground on a mudbank 16 miles east of here, was denied Thursday by a department official in Ottawa.

Fifteen sailors from the ship left for their homes in Greece Tuesday after being assured by owner Maros Lemos of London they would receive back pay. Seven sailors had left previously.

West cashed the A-K of clubs and shifted to a low diamond. East won with the ace and returned a diamond, South taking the king.

Franklin then led a low spade to the queen. East took the king and played still another diamond.

South won and didn't bother to take a heart finesse. Franklin led the ace, caught the king,
