## TODAY, NO. 12: TOOK THEY THE BODY OF JESUS

Michelangelo Caravaggio (1569-1609) justified his given name. He became one of the greatest of Italian painters a generation after the original bearer of the name Michelangelo. His work is distinguished for naturalism; he placed his religious scenes in realistic settings. This classic work, completed in 1598, is one of the art treasures of the Vatican to be seen by Holy Year pilgrims. [St. Mark 15:40-45 relates:

*There were also women looking on afar off: among whom was Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the less and of Joses, and Salome; (Who also, when he was in Galilee, followed him, and ministered unto him); and many other women which came up with him unto Jerusalem. And now when the even was come, because it was the preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, an honourable counsellor, which also waited for the kingdom of God, came, and went in boldly unto Pilate, and craved the body of Jesus. And Pilate marvelled if he were already dead: and call-*

*ing unto him the centurion, he asked him whether he had been any while dead. And when he knew it of the centurion, he gave the body to Joseph. St. John 19:39-40 tells further: And there came also Nicodemus, which at the first came to Jesus by night, and brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about an hundred pound weight. Then took they the body of Jesus, and wound it in linen clothes with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury.*

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## LODE Award Goes To Maritime Student

Earl Frederick Guy, brilliant D. V. A. student at Dalhousie University, has been awarded a special \$1000.00 scholarship by the Archibald MacMechan Chapter of the I. O. D. E. for overseas study in Great Britain.

## OUTSTANDING IN ENGLISH

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas

F. Guy of Sydney Mines, and married to the former Barbara Manson of Charlottetown. Mr. Guy originally planned to become an electrical engineer, but these plans were interrupted when he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in May, 1941. He served as a radar mechanic sergeant in Canada and England until 1945.

In 1945 Mr. Guy enrolled for a course in journalism at King's College, in the special January-July session for ex-service men. His work in English was so outstanding that he was encouraged to complete his matriculation and take a full degree course. His work continued to be of such calibre that he was entered in the special Honorary Course in English, which he completed with high honors in May 1949. Since that time he has been working for his M. A., which he expects to complete in May 1950.

While serving with the R.C.A.F. in England Mr. Guy acquired a wide knowledge of modern poetry. This led to a study of metrics, which he has been carrying through the whole range of English Literature. He is particularly interested in advanced study in Chaucer and Middle Scots and intends to proceed to the doctor's degree with research in this field.

The awarding of this scholarship by the Archibald MacMechan Chapter of the I. O. D. E. has been made possible through the funds raised by the Chapter at their annual Horse Show, held last summer in the Halifax Forum. In commending the Chapter for making the scholarship available, Professor C. L. Bennett of Dalhousie University said it was particularly gratifying to the departments in the humanities to receive support and encouragement for students of outstanding ability.
