

22 Institutional Chefs Begin Course In S'ide

Dr. O.H. Curtis, Deputy Minister of Health for the Province, officially opened the first refresher course for cooks to be held in Canada, yesterday morning at the old Prince County Hospital, Summerside with 22 chefs registered representing the hospitals and most other institutions on P.E.I.

The course which is arranged provincially in conjunction with the Department of National Health and Welfare is not intended to teach cooking but to instruct cooks in the complete planning of food service; planning menus for more attractive meals and to teach modern methods of buying, storing and preparing foods, stated Miss Margaret Lock, one of the instructors.

Miss Lock and Miss Helen Sackville of the Nutrition Division of the Department of National Health and Welfare are conducting the course.

Miss Mona Wilson, Director of Public Health Nursing for P.E.I. who attended to the numerous arrangements in preparing the course, presided at the opening ceremonies and expressed appreciation to Judge W.E. Darby, who was present and to other members of the Board of Trustees at the Prince County Hospital for the use of the old Prince County Hospital in which to conduct the course.

Judge Darby responded by stating the board was "happy to place the institution at your disposal." "We're happy to have you."

Those taking the 5 day course are divided into four groups, each group being responsible for the preparation of the meals for one day. Discussion periods are to be held after each meal, at the end of each day and at the end of the course to discuss and criticize meal preparation.

Observers present during the course are Miss Edith Hume, Matron of Beach Grove Hospital, Mrs. Allison MacLean, Instructor of Home Economics at Summerside High School, Miss Marilyn Tremblin, Fredericton, Dietary consultant to the N.B. Department of Health, Miss Hazel Roland, Nutritionist, Department of Health; N.S. Also present were Mrs. S.J. MacLellan, Superintendent of Prince County Hospital, Mr. John Ledgerwood, Administrator of Prince County Hospital and Miss Mildred Slack, Superintendent of chronic care, old Prince County Hospital.

During his remarks Dr. Curtis said the need for a refresher course of this type and he is parent for a long time and he thanked Miss Wilson for her excellent administration in arranging for the course.

See West's Hand In Russian Deals Strengthened By Revolt

FRANKFURT (AP) — The West's hand in dealing with Russia has been strengthened by the bloody Poznan revolt—just at a time when it was needed most.

For months, neutralist voices have been heard in Western Europe clamoring for closer negotiations with the Russians. Millions have been wondering whether the Kremlin's smiles were not sincere, although Western leaders have doubted it.

In particular, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has been under pressure to waver from his rigid anti-Russian policy and his former cold war popularity has been gravely jeopardized.

STIRS SYMPATHY
The three-day Poznan insurrection—its suppression by tanks and troops of the Russian-run Polish army — has stirred sympathy throughout the West. That sympathy has been heard not only from the masses of Westerners, but even from Communists like Giuseppe di Vittorio, head of the big Italian Federation of Labor.

The reported shooting of marching children, the defection of Polish tank soldiers to the workers—these are bound to raise doubts that things have really changed behind the Iron Curtain.

For Germany, the Poznan revolt has even deeper significance than the prospect of reunification of the divided country may have become more distant than ever before.

MAY LOOSEN GRIP
Moscow and the Red regime in Eastern Germany also must have been thrown upon the horns of a dilemma. There has been much talk that Moscow would loosen its grip on East Germany to encourage the negotiations between the two parts of the country.

But will Moscow and the East German rulers dare follow such a course now? Any great relaxation of existing terror rule might encourage the East Germans to try another revolt like that of June 17, 1953.

The Communist rank and file in France, Italy, Germany, Austria and elsewhere are likely to become even more critical of Soviet and national Red leaders when the full details of the crushing of the revolt become known.

In the Soviet satellite like Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria and Czechoslovakia, it is likely the Red regimes will have a difficult time. They must somehow find a compromise between suppression of unrest and dissatisfaction and the need to keep alive the fiction of "democratization."
