## Larry MacPhail And Partners To Buy Race Track

BALTIMORE, Feb. 20 — (AP) — Larry MacPhail and his partners agreed today to buy controlling stock in Bowie race track for \$1,097,000.

Stockholders of the Southern Maryland race track began signing over the stock just as MacPhail's option to buy the plant expired.

MacPhail and his associates became operators of the track which has been plagued by a series of internal squabbles in recent years.

MacPhail, the colorful former baseball magnate who now owns a large horsebreeding farm near Bel Air, Md., last week threatened to call off the purchase because of the dates assigned Bowley by the State Racing Commission.

He objected particularly to the six day assigned in December. However, the dates still are effective.

The victory moved Bratton, no. 3 contender, into a more favorable spot for a return engagement with Cuba's Kid Gavilan, the 17-pound titleholder. The triumph also rewarded Bratton with a March 26 date in the stadium with Billy Graham, New York, another welterweight challenger.

## Filly Owned By Late King George En Route To B.C.

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Feb. 20 — (CP) — Batten Down, a valuable three-year-old bay filly owned and bred by the late King George VI, will arrive in Saint John tomorrow morning aboard the cargo liner Salacia, bound for a new home in British Columbia.

Batten Down, is one of three horses in a choice selection of livestock from the British Isles destined for farms in Canada and the United States. In addition to the horses the livestock cargo consists of 54 head of cattle and 11 sheep.

The horses are being imported by the Anglo-Irish Agencies president, Capt. D.H. Coghlan, who is acting on behalf of a group of British Columbia sportsmen.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 — (CP) — A fluke long shot goal by Gordie Howe with less than two minutes left gave Detroit Red Wings a 1-1 tie tonight with New York Rangers in a hard-hitting National Hockey League game.

Howe's shot, a floater from just inside the blue line, appeared easy for goalie Emile (The Cat) Francis to handle. However, he let the puck slip through his glove.

The goal—Howe's ninth in seven games and his 34th of the season—was the first scored by the Red Wings on New York ice in 168 minutes and 11 seconds of hockey between the teams. The Red Wings were shut out in two previous games at Madison Square Garden when Chuck Rayner, injured last Saturday, was in goal for Rangers.

New York outplayed and outshot the Red Wings and appeared headed for victory early in the third period when Ed Slowinski worked a passing play with Gabe Stewart and Don Raleigh to beat Terry Sawchuk while Ted Lindsay was serving a penalty for hooking.

Both goaltenders were superb, with the exception of Francis' lapse on Howe's goal. The Rangers tested Sawchuk 35 times while Francis had to handle 25 shots.

The tie boosted Detroit's first-place lead over Toronto to 15 points and enabled the Rangers to take a two-point lead in the standings over the fifth-place Boston Bruins.

A crowd of 12,261 saw the game.

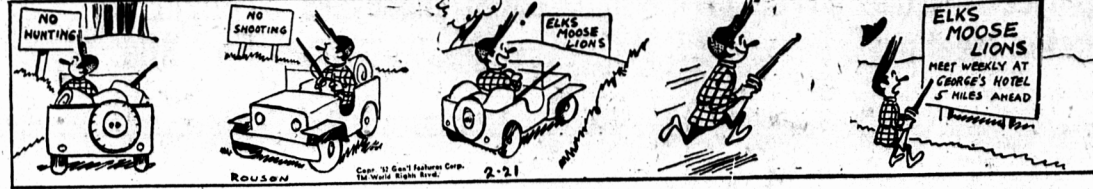
## Mt. A. Wins Badminton Title

## Acorn Rink Wins Confederation 'Spiel

The E. Frank Acorn rink of Charlottetown won the Confederation Championship at the local curling club last night by defeating the G. E. Full rink 12-7 in the finals of the Maritime Central Airways competitions.

The Acorn rink came behind in the last three ends to win the championship. They were trailing 7-5 tenth end but came up with two rocks in each of the tenth and eleventh ends to go ahead 9-7. They picked up three more in the last end.

The Full rink got away to a good start, going into a 3-0 lead in the second end. The Acorn rink then came up with four singles in each of the next four ends to go ahead 4-3 but fell behind again in the ninth when the Full rink came through with three.

In addition to the championship winner, three trophy winners were declared yesterday. The Acorn rink, the only unbeaten team in the bonspiel, won the Wholesale Grocers Trophy. The J. S. MacDonald rink of Charlottetown won the B-A Oil Trophy and the Dr. E. S. Giddings rink, also of Charlottetown, won the Prowse Bros. Trophy.

A Pictou rink skipped by H.M. Russell won the points competition. Dr. J.W. Dobson's rink of Moncton was runner-up in this play.

Yesterday evening a Halifax sports-caster intimated that he was resigning because of a leniency in handing out sentences after a game in Charlottetown last week. He did not specify either the Halifax or Sydney game.

His resignation came as no surprise here. The only thing that surprised us in regard to the referee this week was the return of Larry Heffering to the Maritimes. Heffering, an experienced official in the O.H.A. and a capable one at that, has his own opinions about the trials of officials in the M.M.-H.L. in comparison with other leagues. NEW YORK, Feb. 20 — (AP) — President Maurice Podoloff of the American Hockey League said today the suspension of coach Erwin (Murph) Chamberlain of Buffalo Bisons would be "continued indefinitely."

Chamberlain was suspended Monday by Podoloff after an incident at Cleveland — his third offence in a little over a month.

"I don't think he is ready to be reinstated," Podoloff said after meeting with Chamberlain. "I think he will have to cool off a bit longer."

Podoloff said Chamberlain protested a decision at Cleveland by referee Walton Russell, and banged his hockey stick against the boards at the Buffalo bench.

"When he was ejected from the game he refused to leave," Podoloff said. Chamberlain threw a puck at Russell, and before that registered displeasure at a decision in Syracuse by throwing a hockey stick on the ice.

In Buffalo today, Art Chapman, general manager of the Bisons, said he would continue as acting coach himself.
