Ottawa: Nineteen members of Parliament have been named to the Liberal "Shadow Cabinet". Formally described as chairman of sub-committees of the Liberal Party caucus, they are the politicians who would normally rank as first choice for the respective cabinet posts if the Liberals should form the government.

Ex-Cabinet Ministers in this shadow cabinet, and the government departments whose work they will study are: Mr. St. Laurent, Justice; Mr. L. B. Pearson, External Affairs; Mr. Paul Martin, Health and Welfare; Mr. Gardiner, Agriculture; Mr. Marler, Transport; Mr. Lesage, Northern Affairs; Immigration, Mr. Pickersgill; Finance, Mr. Sinclair. All those held the same portfolio in the last Liberal government...

There are few surprises and no new faces among the members who will cover the other departments. Largely they are former Parliamentary assistants to Cabinet Ministers. They are: Mr. McElraith (Ontario), Defence Production; Mr. Kirk (N.S.), Post Office; Mr. Bendickson (Ont.), Trade and Commerce; Mr. Tucke (Sask.), Veterans Affairs; Mr. Treg (Que.) Public Works; Mr. Henderson (Ont.) National Defence; Mr. A. Dumas (Que.) Mines; Mr. Cannon (Que.) Revenue; Mr. Byrne (B.C.) Labour; Mr. Stuart (N.B.) Fisheries.

Some Sobering Moments

"The blip is fading" say the current headlines, and so, too, is public interest over here in the "chink of ironmongery" that Russia has launched into the sky. Nevertheless it provided for Britons, as it did for anyone with an ounce of sense in the Western World, sobering moments.

Britain was one of the nations who included themselves on the International Geophysical Year Organisation suggested that those countries with resources enough should think about launching an earth satellite. But they have been puzzled by the news that the Russians have taken the first step before America. It is just a year, British scientists say, since they have had the "barest inkling" that the Russians were in the satellite business.

In an attempt to get a British eye-view of the "thing" I went to the famous Royal Society where government and other scientists promised to discuss the satellite. Along with more than a hundred Press men from all over the world, I found the meeting a frustrating experience.

One of the scientists there would answer the key question: "Could you photograph defence works on earth from the satellite?" A spokesman from the British Ministry of Supply, that gives out defence orders, said that the satellite would help defence experiments "very little". How big is little?

On independent scientists said that the power being used on the "thing's" transmitter was in the region of half a watt. Another said it was between two and three watts. And it was revealed that of all the observations on the "thing", not one was being made by radar over here. It was disconcerting when the thought crossed one's mind that the satellite could have been a guided missile. The launching, in fact, surprised the British just as much as the Americans, although it is a scientists' mixed up with the International Geophysical Year. A Jamboree said that on August 21 last the Russians notified transmission wavelengths to them. In their own cosy world, it seems as if the scientists did not think it worth while passing the information on. But the British do not share the "sour grapes" attitude some Americans have adopted.

A hydrocortisone combination, a greasy, invisible lotion, which doesn't stain the skin, has given good results, according to a report in the Journal of the American Medical Women's Association.

LOTION WAS ENOUGH In some cases, acne surgery and ultraviolet light were used every two to three weeks in addition to the lotion, while in others the lotion was all that was used.

QUESTION AND ANSWER T.L.: My doctor told me that I have a dropped kidney. Would this have any influence on my becoming pregnant? Answer: In most cases, pregnancy can occur in persons with a dropped kidney.
