

Damement Breaks Serious In Spots

A report was received last night that a section of the old Montague highway was closed to traffic early yesterday afternoon, between Millview and Cherry Valley.

It could not be confirmed late last night, but information obtained from a Vernon River source indicated that the closure had resulted after a large transfer trailer truck had smashed through a section of the pavement.

As a result it was claimed that the section of highway is completely impassable, until some repairs have been made.

Meanwhile efforts continue to make possible a section of the highway just west of Monell village where a bog developed after pavement broke. Yesterday a heavy road maintainer was standing by on a round the clock basis to pull emergency vehicles, such as ambulances, through until repairs are made.

The highway at Farmington between Souris and St. Peters was reported to be in poor condition Thursday night.

In some places the road is almost completely demolished and sand is being used to try and fill the holes.

Motor vehicles are continually getting stuck and muffled damage has resulted on some vehicles.

Police, Firemen Are Investigated

Questioned yesterday regarding strong rumors that members of the police force were involved in the reported removal of various articles following the recent fire at Simpsons Sears, Chief Stierlins Webster stated his investigation into reported irregularities had been completed.

The Chief said he would file a report on the results with the police committee of City Council.

At the same time, Chief H. J. Jewell said he was working on a report from Chief Webster regarding names of a number of members of the department who might be involved, and said as soon as this was

received any appropriate action would be taken.

He was supported in his statement by Fire Inspector Louis Ranahan who said he wished the matter cleared up for the sake of the "good name" of the department members who were not involved in any way.

Rumors of the involvement of members of the two departments have been current in the city ever since the fire, and recently Chief Webster has seen a large number of articles, ranging from television sets to bicycles, returned or has been anonymously informed where they could be found.

City Taxes Hit Fast Pace

The tremendous impact on city financing of the earlier presentation of the city budget was indicated in the tax returns to be filed at the end of the month. Figures of a year ago, when the annual budget was not presented until late April, are being compared with the current year's figures.

Personal property taxes to date have been \$300,000 more than the city treasury. Last April, only \$1,162 had been received.

Although real estate tax assessments have only recently been mailed, the public, already ready some \$40,516, has been received in payments. This compares with \$3,853 taken in during the first four months of 1962.

Other tax categories with the amounts required to date, with last year's figures in brackets, are: educational tax, \$58,032 (\$2,831); arrears, \$66,856 (\$2,421); streets and sidewalks, \$6,700 (\$711); licenses, \$1,242 (\$603); miscellaneous, \$88,742 (\$80,044).

New Wiltshire Man Pleads Guilty To Nine Charges

Arraigned before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, on nine charges under the Criminal Code, Frederick Harold Waite, of New Wiltshire, yesterday afternoon elected summary trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to all counts.

Waite, who is not represented by counsel, will appear for sentence May 10, on one charge of breaking and entering a West Wiltshire service station, and stealing \$4 in cash and tobacco and cigarettes to the value of \$8.

At the same time sentence will be handed down, on four counts of theft from the mails, two of uttering forged documents, which involved cheques in the amounts of \$30 and \$35, and two counts of forgery, which also involved cheques, one in the amount of \$30 and the other \$15.

Appearing for sentence on a charge of fraud Gordon Stanley McInnis, 162 Dorchester Street, Charlottetown, was sentenced to three months in Queens County Jail.

McInnis was charged with defrauding the public of various amounts totalling approximately \$287, by means of falsehood. Pleading not guilty to failing to carry and produce his motor vehicle operator's licence when requested by the police, a accused counselled by Allison M. Gillis, pleaded not guilty and is remanded until May 13 for hearing.

Charged with possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences, three other accused were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail.

Norman J. Arsenault, Kinkora, charged with speeding was fined \$10 and costs.
