CANADA IN EVIDENCE.

Strong Representation at Bisley

LONDON, July 14.—Sir Samuel Henry Strong, Canada's Chief Justice, took his seat with the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council for the first time yesterday. Col. Prior makes steady progress towards recovery.
Canada is in strong force this year. In the Queen's competition at Bisley she has eight more than the New Zealand entries.

SOUTH AFRICAN COMMISSION

Cecil Rhodes' Conduct Condemned.

LONDON, July 14.—The Parliamentary South African Commission has agreed upon a report. The Pall Mall Gazette publishes a summary of the conclusion of the commission. The report will express an emphatic opinion that whatever justification there might have been for action on the part of the people of Johannesburg, there was none whatever for Cecil Rhodes' conduct in subsidizing and organizing an armed expedition against the Government of the Transvaal.

CONCILIATION IN IRELAND.

Evicted Tenants Restored to Their Holdings.

LONDON, July 14.—Gerald Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland, announced in the House of Commons yesterday that a large number of evicted tenants would be reinstated upon their holdings by an arrangement with the landlords.

LABUAN, July 12.—There are no Europeans at Gaya, which is a mere collection of rude huts in charge of an Eurasian (half-breed) officer and a few police. Masalle had already been proclaimed an outlaw, and it is believed that his following is small. The Dyaks and Sikhs, who are being sent to hunt him out of the jungle, will probably capture him easily.

MEETING AT MOUNT HERBERT.

Opposition Candidates Get a Good Hearing - Well Pleased With the Prospects.

A large joint meeting was held at Mount Herbert last evening.

Premier Peters was the first speaker and occupied the time of the meeting for upwards of half an hour. His speech was remarkable for what it did not contain in regard to the financial and other vital questions.

Mr. McLean followed in a vigorous speech in which he exposed the maladministration of the Peters combination and pointed out the reforms promised by the Leader of the Opposition and his followers. Mr. McLean was well received.

Mr. Cummiskey spoke next, referring to some purely local matters and claiming that the Government had practiced great economy. His remarks fell flat.

Mr. McCourt was the last speaker. He spoke on the public accounts and exposed the boodling without tender that was carried on in the Public Works Department. The mismanagement in other departments of the public service was also vigorously exposed, and a strong plea was put in for reduced fares on the Southport ferry. It was claimed that the fares collected should not exceed the cost of operating the ferry. As it now is the people on the South side are taxed each time they cross to keep up ferries in other parts of the province. Mr. McCourt was given an excellent hearing.

The Opposition candidates are highly pleased with the treatment they received, and the prospects of strong support visible on all sides.

A REMEMBRANCE

SIR,—I see in a recent number of the Patriot a report of a Liberal Convention held at Souris wherein Dr. McIntyre is put down as the veteran champion Liberal of King's County, and that he asked the electors to fight for the good old Liberal principles for which our forefathers fought. I would simply ask the electors of Souris who it was that formed the posse that headed a band of Tory roughs from the head of Souris, which pelted the late Hon. Edward Whelan with stones and mud while delivering a speech at that place? I would also like to ask whose ancestor it was that kept poor old Angus McFisto h on the Georgetown limits for four or five years in the latter end of his life? Perhaps there are some living at Naufrage yet who know who it was. It would be well for the electors of the Second District as well as the First, to know who it was that sent the soldiers and constables to the North Side to imprison and shoot them, if they could see them, for putting a poor man called Haney back in his house after being turned out in the snow in the dead of winter with a wife and twelve small children. Perhaps there are some yet living that were in the scrape. The writer remembers it well. There are also some yet living in Tracadie, Pisquid, Scotch Fort, Johnston's River and all along the line who remember it, and just now is the time to govern themselves accordingly.

AN OLD TIMER.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, July 12.—Five thousand wrought nail makers in South Staffordshire and North Worcestershire have struck for a ten per cent. advance in wages.

COPENHAGEN, July 12.—A terrible railway disaster took place about midnight at Ghentofe. The express from Belsingoer ran into a passenger train at the station, wrecked eight carriages, killed forty persons and injured sixty others.

GREENWOOD, Ark., July 12.—A dance was held at the home of Frank Finn, a miner, last night, at which beer flowed freely. Tom Sturgal and Anthony Dollar became involved in a difficulty over a woman. When the dance was over Sturgal followed Dollar to his room and a bloody fight began. Sturgal used a long knife and Dollar defended himself with a razor. The candle was extinguished, and the deadly combat continued in the dark, until Sturgal laid dead literally cut to pieces, and Dollar was fatally wounded, having received 15 knife thrusts.

LONDON, July 12.—The Sunday Times publishes a report of an interview with Premier Sedden, of New Zealand, in which he is quoted as saying that the federal colonies of Canada, the colonies of Australia, New Zealand, Cape of Good Hope and Newfoundland should be represented in the Imperial Parliament. The self governing colonies, Mr. Sedden declared, contained ten millions of inhabitants, or one-fifth the population of Great Britain and her colonies, and these ten millions are not the least important. He urged the holding of a consultative council to discuss the questions of defence and the trade and foreign affairs of the colonies which were more important now than they had ever been before.

LONDON, July 12.—The visit on Saturday to Hawarden of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. R. J. Sedden and Mr. George H. Reid, prime ministers respectively of Canada, New Zealand and New South Wales, was a great success. The premiers were much impressed by Mr. Gladstone's mental alertness and physical vigor, and also by his magnetism and charm of manner. They declare it is no wonder that he exercised such influence over his countrymen. The conversation was informal and familiar. The visitors were engrossed by Mr. Gladstone's vivacious recital of reminiscences of colonial affairs sixty-two years ago, when he was appointed under-secretary of state for the colonies. Several group photographs of Mr. Gladstone and his visitors were taken.
