150 Donors Needed To Reach Blood Quota

A total of 393 donors registered at yesterday's two sessions of Red Cross blood clinics being held at Zion Church Hall—130 during the morning, and 263 in the evening. This was 27 short of the day's quota, and chalked up a total deficit of some 50 on registrations. However, the actual shortage in "bottles of blood" was in the vicinity of 100 since there have been many "rejects" due to the flu which has been taking its toll in the past few weeks.

An interesting incident in connection with the results showed that at least another 350 would be needed today to meet the objective for the three days, and provide the blood required to meet the demand.

An interesting incident in connection with yesterday's clinics was the story told by one lady who received two bottles of blood when she underwent a major operation. Her husband came to the clinic as a donor herself, and was accompanied by her husband and four other donors whom she recruited to replace what she had received.

She remarked that during her conversation with one of the Red Cross officials at the clinic, she had been told that she had been down to 45 at the time of the operation, and when she was discharged from the hospital it had gone up to 100 as the result of the transfusions she had received.

This experience could not be recounted by most of the more than 1500 Prince Edward Islanders who were recipients of blood transfusions through this Red Cross service during the past year.

Many new donors were in evidence yesterday especially among Prince of Wales College students, 97 of whom have registered at the clinics so far.

All signs pointed to keen competition among the various groups vying with each other for "blood donor supremacy".

Assisting the mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax were volunteers from the following organizations who rendered valuable services in the smooth operation of the clinic: the Ladies Auxiliaries of the Zion and Baptist churches, the United Church Women, the Charlottetown Business and Professional Women's Club, the Nurses' Association, Notre Dame High School Red Cross, as well as members of the local Red Cross blood donor committee.

Tourist Loan Act Broadened

The Legislature approved in principle yesterday a bill that would broaden the tourist accommodation loan act to permit the granting of loans for re-activating historic buildings for commercial use.

Promoter of the bill, Tourist Development Minister J. David Stewart, said his department had received a number of requests that loans be made available for the restoration of historic buildings which, as felt would be tourist attractions.

"It is felt," he said, "that as many forms of entertainment of interest to tourists as possible should be provided. There are many buildings in this province that can be restored and would be of interest to tourists. Owners of the buildings would be permitted to charge a fee."

Previous tourist loan legislation provided funds only for accommodation for tourists.
