Canada's Top Entertainers Slated For Tour Of Cyprus

TORONTO (CP) - Some of Canada's top entertainers head for Cyprus this weekend to stage pre-Christmas variety shows for Canadian and other United Nations peacekeeping troops.

Gordie Tapp, versatile emcee and one of the best-known radio personalities in Canada, heads the group.

With him are singer Doug Crosley of Oshawa, Ont., old-time fiddle champion Al Cheney, who started his career at the age of 12 in 1944 in Medicine Hat, Alta., and magician Bob Oweny of Windsor, Ont. And there are girls of course - Toronto's Jean Christopher, 24-year-old actress who has become, almost unwittingly, a sex symbol; Dahleie Dorice of Quebec City, a star of French-Canadian TV; and the attractive Lounsbury sisters from St. Catharines, Ont., flaming baton twirlers.

The trip to the Mediterranean island is the 10th in a series of concerts for Canadian troops, initiated by the defence department in 1961 and organized by producer Ken Dalziel of the CBC. Shows have gone five times to the U.N. emergency force in the Middle East - the latest one in May this year - three times to European NATO bases and to Cyprus in 1964.

The entertainers and the 13-

piece band of Toronto jazz clarinetist Phil Nimmons leave Trenton, Ont., Sunday and return Dec. 14. They will do six shows, including one at the British imperial base at Famagusta on Cyprus.

This will be the first such tour for Crosley and Miss Christopher, whose names popped up in the House of Commons earlier this year. MEP Ralph Cowen objected to CBC employees appearing in a low-budget movie, Miss Christopher apparently lightly clad.

Police censors eventually passed the movie, but the uproar fastened a "sexy" label on Jean even more than her appearances for two years on the late-night CBC show Nightcap. During the Cyprus tour CBC will record the musical high lights of the shows for broadcast in a special one-hour radio show in Canada Dec. 26. It will include taped Christmas messages from scores of Canadian soldiers serving on the island.

ANNUAL DEBATE HEARD ON WAR TOY SUITABILITY

OTTAWA (CP) - The annual argument about whether war toys make suitable Christmas presents for children is about to reach its regular climax again.

The Ottawa Journal turned to grade 4 pupils of St. Daniel's, a separate school here for opinions on the matter.

Here are some of their views - in their own words, and spelling:

"Well I think it is good if they want the guns. And if the parents agree. But they should stop them when they get to about 10 or 11. Not any later or they will grow up like Hitler."

"I think war toys are in a way dangerous. But why should parents worry. We aren't going to start a war. Like these grenades that exploding are dangerous but that is around the only thing. Parents are silly to worry. Some of their own husband are in the army and they don't worry."

"I think that the grown-up people are right. We are all hoping not to have war and yet the stores are selling war toys. All the boys are getting war toys and everything was quite and now all you hear is bang! bang! and they are putting it on the television."

"Why do adults don't let us have army toys? They don't hurt us. What harm has it done. And if we don't buy how will the store be able to sell things to get money."

"I personally think war toys are harmful, not to the body but to the mind. Children who

Author Fined For Booklet

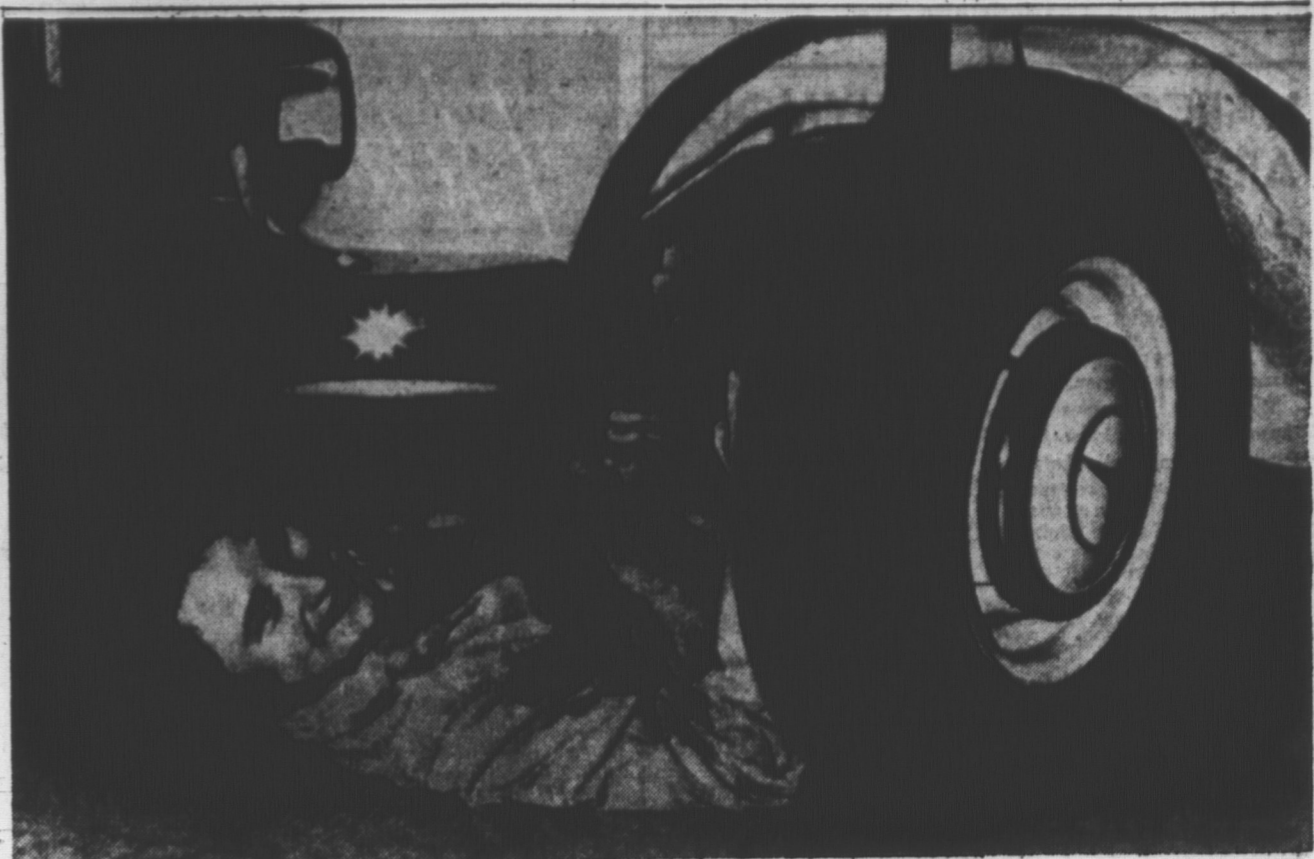
KALMAR, Sweden (Reuters) - A Swedish author was fined Tuesday for defaming the name of the late United Nations secretary-general Dag Hammarskjold.

A court here ordered Bengt Stjernkrantz, author and publisher of a 16-page booklet entitled *Dag Hammarskjold - God and Assassin*, to pay an undisclosed fine scaled on a percentage of his salary.

The booklet claims the secretary-general may have committed suicide by overpowering the crew of the aircraft in which he was killed. The court declined to award damages or order the booklet confiscated.

Stjernkrantz was facing charges of defamation brought by Hammarskjold's brother, Sven, who sued him for 150,000 crowns (about \$30,000) damages.

Dag Hammarskjold died four years ago with 15 other passengers and crew in an air crash near Ndola, in what then was Northern Rhodesia. Investigations threw no light on the cause of the crash.

Prize Late, Author Says

MOSCOW (AP) - Soviet author Mikhail A. Sholokhov said Tuesday that he was given the Nobel Prize too late and refused to withdraw his criticism of Boris Pasternak.

Sholokhov, giving his first press conference since being awarded the Nobel Prize for literature Oct. 15, also claimed that Soviet writers have complete freedom of artistic expression.

Asked about his reaction to getting the literary award, Sholokhov, 60, said: "I smiled slyly and thought it was a little late."

He won the Nobel Prize mainly for his epic novel *And Quiet Flows the Don*, published 37 years ago.

The short, white-haired Communist called Pasternak "an internal emigre." He said: "I am proud to be the first Soviet and Russian writer to win the Nobel Prize."

The Nobel committee gave the prize to Pasternak in 1958 for Dr. Zhivago, his novel critical of Soviet life. Pasternak was put under pressure by Soviet authorities and turned down the award.

Two Yank Prisoners Return With Praise For Viet Cong

PHNOM PENH (AP) - Two American soldiers freed by the Viet Cong guerrillas in South Viet Nam have praised their captors and criticized United States involvement in the Viet Nam war.

Both told correspondents in the Cambodian capital Tuesday that they expect harassment when they get home.

The soldiers are Sgt. George E. Smith, 27, of Chester, W. Va., and specialist Claude E. McClure, 25, of Chattanooga, Tenn., who were captured with two other Americans in a guerrilla attack outside Saigon Nov. 24, 1963.

"I have known both sides and the war in Viet Nam is of no interest to the United States," Smith said. He reported he is returning home "so Americans can see the light about the war in Viet Nam."

Smith did most of the talking at a press conference sponsored by the Cambodian information ministry.

Both said they were treated well during their two years of captivity.

Veteran Sea Captain Held Burning Memories Of Career

LONDON (CP) - A 91-year-old sea captain who died here Sunday had two burning memories. One was a source of pride and a constant preoccupation of his later years, the other he never discussed.

Capt. Henry George Kendall was the first man to use wireless telegraphy to trap a criminal tipping Scotland Yard that he had a murderer aboard his Quebec-bound ship in 1910. The case brought him continuing attention years later.

But he also was commander of the Empress of Ireland when she sank in the St. Lawrence River in 1914 in one of shipping's greatest tragedies.

"He never talked about it," Ernest Barnsley, a long-time friend of Kendall, said Monday. "It must have been the greatest tragedy of his life and suppose the memory was too painful."

Kendall was cleared of all blame in the sinking, which cost more than 1,000 lives.

He was on the bridge of the Canadian Pacific liner when she was rammed in heavy fog and darkness May 29, 1914, on her way from Quebec to Liverpool. The Norwegian Collier *Storstad* struck the Empress amidships.

Kendall signalled the *Storstad* to keep her engines running, so the great hole in the Empress's side would remain plugged. But the *Storstad* had to withdraw and the 14,000-ton Empress sank off Father Point in 15 minutes.

Most of the passengers and crew were trapped in their cabins. Only four lifeboats were launched and fewer than a third duty in the nearly 1,500 persons aboard escaped. The *Storstad* was held entirely to blame for the tragedy at a subsequent marine enquiry in Canada.

Four years earlier, Kendall had been master of another Canadian Pacific ship, the *Montrose*, when his curiosity was aroused by a "Mr. Robinson and son" among the passengers.

He decided Robinson was really Dr. Hawley Crippen, wanted by British police for the murder and dismemberment of his wife at their London home, and the "son" was really his secretary, Ethel LeNeve.

Using the newly-installed telegraph, Kendall sent a message to Scotland Yard and an inspector, travelling by a faster ship, reached Quebec in time to arrest Crippen and Miss LeNeve as they landed. Crippen was later hanged for murder.

Barnsley, who worked with Kendall for many years and visited him frequently after his retirement, said Kendall spent much of his time doing radio addresses and newspaper recollections about the famed Crippen capture.

Among Barnsley's souvenirs of his friend are two autographed photographs - one of a £250 cheque given Kendall as a reward for the Crippen capture, the other a photo taken surreptitiously through a porthole of Robinson and son walking on the promenade deck, unaware they had been spotted.

Kendall, born in the Liverpool area, went to sea at the age of 14 and joined Canadian Pacific just before 1900. He got his first command in 1908.

During the First World War, he was navigating officer on the Royal Navy ship *Calgarian*, an armed merchant cruiser, until she was torpedoed on convoy duty in March, 1918.

That same year, at war's end, he was made CP's marine superintendent and remained in London until his retirement in 1939.

British Plan For Troops Turned Down

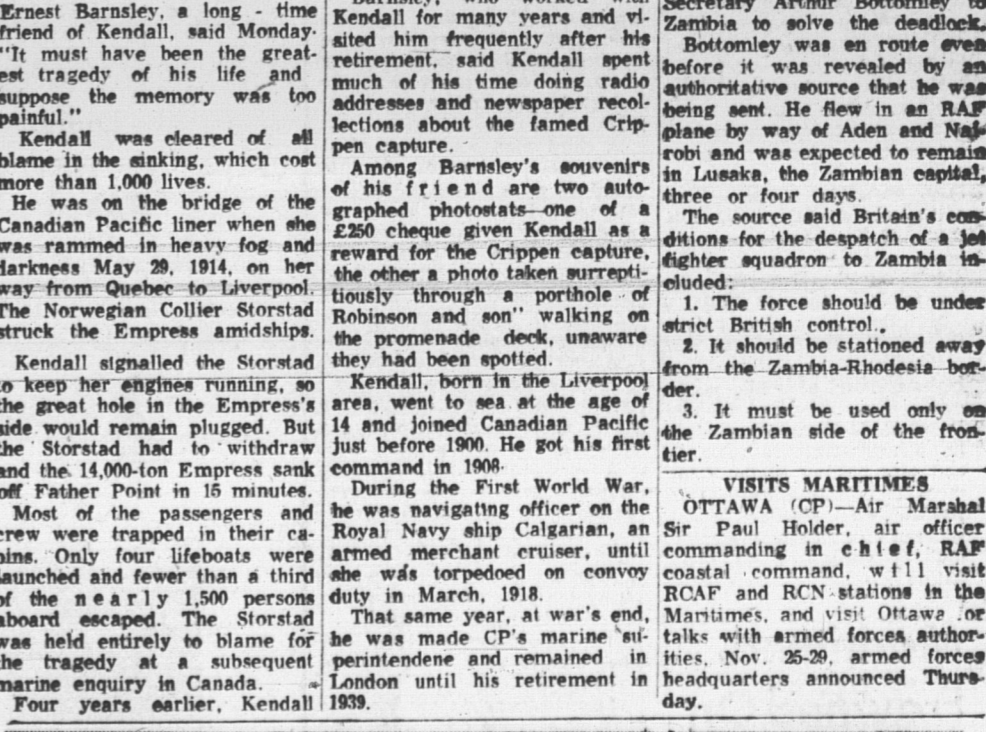
LONDON (Reuters) - Zambia has so far rejected Britain's terms for supplying a Royal Air Force squadron to meet the African country's request for military aid, but talks are continuing, an authoritative source said here Tuesday night.

The urgency of the situation was underlined by the immediate despatch of Commonwealth Secretary Arthur Bottomley to Zambia to solve the deadlock. Bottomley was en route even before it was revealed by an authoritative source that he was being sent. He flew in an RAF plane by way of Aden and Nairobi and was expected to remain in Lusaka, the Zambian capital, three or four days.

The source said Britain's conditions for the despatch of a jet fighter squadron to Zambia included:

1. The force should be under strict British control.
2. It should be stationed away from the Zambia-Rhodesia border.
3. It must be used only on the Zambian side of the frontier.
