

**The Irish University Bill.**

Mr. Shaw, the new Home Rule leader, is most despondent as to the prospects not only of the Irish University education bill, but of the whole Home Rule programme. He does not say who is to blame for the absolutely total absence of any of the Irish bills getting the smallest consideration, but what is remarkable, he declines to blame the Government. He mourns most over Her Majesty's opposition, and complains that, though Lord Harrington and Mr. Forster give the Irish members plenty of fine words they will not pledge themselves to step in favor of the University, while the Radical wing, often found in alliance with the Obstructives openly flout their hostility to the bill. Meantime, the Presbyterian, Wesleyan, and other dissenting bodies in conference and synod assembled, continue to pass resolutions protesting against the bill as proposing to grant funds for the encouragement of sectarian education.

**Failure of Crops in Russia.**

Despatches from St. Petersburg give a gloomy account of the failure of the crops in southern Russia and of the danger of a famine in that portion of the empire. In some sections the crops have been destroyed by drought and hail, and grasshoppers and corn beetles have made their appearance and eaten up what little of the crops remained. The distress of the people throughout these regions is excessive. Representations of their condition have been forwarded to the Czar at Livadia and His Majesty has expressed his intention of taking immediate and efficacious means for the relief of the distressed agriculturists.

There is a tinge of sweetness in revenge, for the godly and ungodly alike, but few people will be disposed to believe that the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon on hearing that his libeller, Mr. Neal Dow, fell down stairs one day, and a little while afterwards tumbled off a railway car and dislocated his shoulder, exulted over it. The story goes that the famous pastor on being told of his enemy's accident meaningly exclaimed, "I thought so—I never tumbled down a flight of steps nor off a railway carriage." Scarcely anybody was convinced by Mr. Dow's equivocal denial that in his reference to a beet-swaggering parson, he did not mean Mr. Spurgeon, but nobody will believe that the latter returned evil for evil in the manner that this story says he did.

Advices from Australia state that the boat race between Trickett, champion oarsman of the world, and Laycock, is to be rowed on August 26. The stakes have been increased to £500. The race is to be rowed over the Parramatta river course; distance four miles.

Out of three dozen samples of wall paper examined by a London chemist, scarcely half a dozen were found to be free from arsenic. The presence of the poison was not confined to the green papers. The light blues and sombre browns were among the worst specimens.

Cox, the murderer of Mrs. Hull, employs his time in jail singing hymns. He has pulled out several locks of his hair and offers them at \$5 a piece to the curious.
