THE DEMONSTRATION IN HALIFAX.

The celebration in Halifax, in honour of the Prince's visit, was, as we anticipated, a very brilliant affair, and has gained immense credit amongst strangers for the taste and liberality displayed by the Halifaxians.

During the hundred and ten years that have elapsed since the landing of Cornwallis on our shores, the good city of Halifax has witnessed not a few gala days—demonstrations which would do no discredit to either of our greater cities; but in the reception awarded to his Highness the Prince of Wales, it has quite outdone itself.

To convey anything approaching to a correct idea of the general appearance of the city would require a more graphic pen than we possess, and much more time and space than is at our disposal. It was a scene not likely ever to be forgotten by those who had the good fortune to be present; calculated to increase our illustrious Visitor with a high, but not incorrect, opinion of the loyalty which has invariably characterised the people of Nova Scotia.

Early in the morning the ships of His Royal Highness's fleet were signalled, and precisely at 9 a.m. the Hero, Ariadne, and Flying Fish, were opposite George's Island, passing up the harbour in magnificent style, under a perfect hurricane of salutes from York Bay.

The landing at the Dockyard was probably the most attractive feature in the day's proceedings. Here were concentrated His Excellency the Governor, the Earl of Mulgrave, His Excellency Rear Admiral Sir Alexander Milne, Major General Fitzroy, surrounded by a brilliant staff, and in the various positions assigned to them, the Judges of the Supreme Court, the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, the members of the Executive, and of both branches of the Legislature, the Mayor and Corporation of the city, and other distinguished gentlemen.

The Prince's Fleet.—The Hero has a complement of 880 seamen and marines; the Ariadne, 450; the Flying Fish, 110. The Ariadne is a splendid frigate and although only mounting 26 guns, they are of the heaviest calibre, and she acts as a gun-boat, carrying nearly 100 tons more power, whereas the latter has only 60.

We have authority to state that the Hon. Mr. Johnston was honoured with a private interview with his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, who inquired of him that an investigation of a political character was incompatible with the nature of his visit—that his Grace had not received Mr. Johnston's memorial until he came here, and that it would be fully considered on his return to the Colonial Office.

At an early hour the Volunteer Companies assembled at the respective Barrack-rooms, and at ten o'clock they were in attendance at the Pavilion Barrack square, under their several commanders, were put through a variety of evolutions. In the meantime the "Regulators" were seen marching from the Citadel and other military quarters, towards the common, where the review was to take place. A little after ten, Captain Chesley, commander of the volunteers, took command of the Battalion, and after going through the customary duty of equipping companies, and numbering off divisions, the whole Battalion moved off to the common at a little before eleven o'clock. Arrived at the Common, the Volunteers were formed in line on the left of the regular troops, and both together presented a most imposing appearance, reaching as they did from one extremity of the ground nearly to the other. We were not able to ascertain what number of regulars were on the ground, but the volunteers were at least five hundred strong, all belonging to the City and Dartmouth. After the combined troops were formed in review order, His Royal Highness—accompanied by the Duke of Newcastle, the Earl of Mulgrave, Commandant-in-chief of the Volunteers, the Earl of St. Germain, General Trollope, and the remainder of his brilliant staff, numbering in all over twenty—slowly past the ranks, and received with the usual general salute, the whole line presenting arms together. This over, the regulars and volunteers formed into open column, right in front—the regulars leading off—and marched past the Royal standard—the right of which His Royal Highness was stationed—in slow and quiet time, after which the whole was formed into line and quarter distance column, and marched to the front. The regulars were then moved off the ground, and the Volunteers were, in presence of His Royal Highness and Staff, put through numerous evolutions by their gallant Commander, who was afterwards warmly complimented by the Prince, the Duke of Newcastle, and several officers of the Staff, upon the manner in which the officers and men under his command acquitted themselves. When the review was concluded, Capt. Chesley called for three cheers for His Royal Highness from the Battalion, which was then fired

in quarter distance column, and three times three were given with the most enthusiastic acclamation. The Volunteer Artillery, and other independent Volunteer Corps joining in the proceedings, the waving of uniform caps, with their varied plumes, on the points of the bayonets, was the most imposing sight of the whole day. His Royal Highness then moved off the review ground, greeted by the cheers of the assembled thousands, and under a salute from the Volunteer Artillery, fired with most regular and minute precision. He received the most pleasing military spectacle ever witnessed in Nova Scotia, and it is no exaggeration to say that the presence of the patriotic Volunteers added immensely to its brilliancy and success.—Evening Express.

DISTINGUISHED ARRIVALS.

His Majesty's Steam Frigate *Valorous*, Captain Aldham, arrived here yesterday morning (Monday), from Halifax, having on board a full Military Band, and a detachment of the 62nd Regiment, under the command of Captain Wilkinson, sent here expressly to do duty on the occasion of the Prince's visit.

His Imperial Majesty's French Frigate *Pomone*, 36 guns, commanded by M. Le Marquis de Moutaigne de Chauvance, arrived here this morning, and was saluted by the *Valorous* and by St. George's Battery, which was duly acknowledged by the *Pomone*.

We understand that the *Hero* and *Ariadne* are now in Picton, and will be here on Thursday morning, together with H. M. S. *Nile*—the flagship of Rear Admiral Sir A. Milne. His Excellency the Earl of Mulgrave is expected in the *Nile*.

PRINCIPAL LIBERALITY.—We learn from the *Public Ledger* that while the Prince of Wales was at St. John's, N. F., he made the following princely gifts—£50 was left for the Church of England Asylum for widows and orphans, and £50 for the Benevolent Irish Society; £50 to be expended amongst poor persons in the vicinity of St. John's, and £100 was left to be expended for the fishermen of St. John and Harbor Grace, in boat races, the particulars of which were to be settled by representatives from both places. His Royal Highness also presented a splendid bracelet, set with diamonds and emeralds, to Lady Bannerman, together with the portraits of his brothers and sisters.
