

Miners At Pugwash Win 4-Year Battle With Muck

PUGWASH, N.S. (CP) — Determined miners took home jagged chunks of salt here Saturday as victory mementoes in a four-year battle against underground muck.

The miners grabbed their souvenirs as Malagash Salt Company Limited won what appears to be the final round over watery sand that often dampened this community's hopes for a bolstered economy. The new mine will eventually tap a 200,000-ton salt body beneath this quiet village of 750 on Nova Scotia's north shore.

The proven reserve would meet Canada's salt needs at the present rate for about 150 years.

Miners struck salt at 360 feet. They will go another 200 feet at least before starting horizontal working areas, but engineers say the rest of the way should be relatively simple.

With water problems over, miners are expected to cover the next 150 feet in six weeks. During the digging so far, workers averaged about 12 feet every six weeks.

The mine, started in June, 1955, was first expected to open later that year. Project engineer Charles Thurgood now predicts production will begin in early summer.

Mine manager John MacQuarrie said the salt pocket lies beneath a jumbled strata, much of it unstable. Concrete—enough to make building foundations for 1,000 homes—was the 42-year-old company's main weapon against the soggy sand and silt. Water poured from the sand several times, flooding the mine.

"The sand would come it with a rush," said minor Oran Broughton. "It would bring the water with it."

More than 300 carloads of concrete went into the 30-inch walls of the shaft. Concrete was pumped into the muck to harden it. Miners hacked it out about five feet at a time.

Over the three-year eight-month pull, diggers averaged about four inches a day. The company expects to progress about five feet a day from now on.

Twenty-seven feet from the surface miners hit water. It stayed with them until they struck salt. At 90 feet, the water-laden sand was buckling the timber sides of the shaft and they were pulled out to be replaced by concrete.

A mile to crush and screen 1,000 tons per eight-hour shift is ready for operation.

Mr. MacQuarrie said explosives will be used shortly for the first time since the sinking began. So far, rough-the-rock crews have dug out the rock and stabilized sand with heavy pneumatic hammers.

Mr. MacQuarrie said the company plans another shaft into the deposit. He said it will employ about 100.

It will replace a mine at Malagash, N.S., 20 miles from here, operating since 1918.

Broughton, who worked for 10 years in the Malagash mine, said he "got used to" the flooding during the shaft sinking. It flooded about nine times on his shift, he said, but "we always had time to get out when she rolled in. Sometimes you'd get your feet stuck in two or three inches of that sand and you couldn't get them out. I was pretty nervous at times."

Alfred York, South African cementation expert who supervised the shaft sinking said the job was "the toughest I've seen in a good many shaft sinkings."

A company spokesman said production will be aimed at supplying highway departments in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec, all present customers, and process industries in New England. A harbor here can accommodate 5,000-ton freighters.

Malagash is a subsidiary of Canadian Rock Salt Company Limited, which operates a mine at Ojibway, Ont.
