

In what manner the resolution to which you may come is likely to affect your temporal interests we are unable to judge.

And we beg to assure you that if in any instance the claims of conscience cannot be yielded to without suffering loss, our sympathies and active exertions, as well as those of our people, will be called forth to meet the evil in so far as we are able.

It may be proper to state, before concluding, that the Committee are already prepared to continue operations in sending out Ministers to destitute localities, and they are ready to receive applications upon the subject.

We shall trust to your laying this communication before your Synod, with as little delay as possible, and we shall be glad to be acquainted with the result of your deliberations in regard to it.

To the Editor of the Colonial Herald.

Sir: Your anxious desire to publish and make known anything that may be proposed for the benefit of this little Island, which may, with the greatest propriety, be termed the "Garden of North America," induces me to address you the following lines, in the hope that you may select from them such hints as you may think proper, for the benefit of the public at large.

Taking a view of the resources of this Island, the seashore, and banks adjacent, I cannot but feel astonished, at the neglect of the Fisheries. Such astonishment is not only felt by humble individuals like myself, but every stranger from the neighbouring Colonies wonders at the neglect of such a mine of wealth.

The remarks of wealthy persons, in any community, generally tend materially to forward or prejudice a cause, and if their ideas once take root against any project to be set on foot, their less wealthy neighbours fall asleep over the supposed wisdom of their superiors.

Let me be rightly understood. Leave the Farmer tilling the soil, the mechanic at his work, and instead of burthening the country, year after year, with hundreds of poor ex-grants, encourage and make room, in every seaport in the Island, for some thousands of good fishermen and shermen.

The cry is, "What can we do? We have no money to begin with." I believe it in some instances to be too true. Now, what is to be done, to make a beginning? Why, I will endeavour to suggest a few hints, and if you do not avail yourselves of them, my earnest advice to you is, to make a present of your coast to the Americans, whose perseverance and industry make them worthy of being its possessors.

Let a sun be named for your capital—no paltry sun either—with shares moderate, and I will venture my existence, you will find friends in Britain, who only wait an opportunity of befriending you; and even in Newfoundland are to be found a spirited and noble set of merchants, who, instead of being jealous of you, would gladly receive their remittances in codfish, assist you with their capital, and give your shipbuilders a preference for the sealing craft they employ.

The Halifax merchants also will not be behind in this respect; they will not forget you in that quarter; but on all hands it is expected that you will throw off that apathy and indifference with respect to your own prosperity which you have hitherto so culpably manifested.

Let this be considered as the money of the Island shareholders, and I can assure you that articles for a Fishery are all within yourselves. This method was adopted in England, and gave rise to one of the largest shipping establishments in it.

If you intend to put your shoulders to the wheel, begin your work in time; for be assured, from the writer's long experience, that no pursuit requires this to be attended to more than a Fishing establishment. If you lose your spring, all is lost.

Among other things, I understand an application has been made, or is about to be made, to Lord Stanley, for permission to export wheat to England on the same footing as Canada. Spare my Lord Stanley the pain of refusing such a boon, for I really think you have so little to send to that quarter, that it would be scarcely worth notice.

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Newfoundland, last Fall and this Spring, some of which were actually brought back to the Island from thence, should show you the necessity of doing something in the way of fattening pork.

The want of a regular intercourse between Newfoundland and this Island is severely felt at present, and should be remedied without delay, and that should be by steam. Nothing would bring your neighbours more willingly to your shores than this.

I would also call the attention of your shipbuilders to the model and materials of vessels intended for the seal fishery. If care be not taken in selecting good timber, free from dry rot—the want of due attention to which is apparent in many vessels now building in this Island—with better fastenings, and moulded for the work the vessels have to perform, the Pictou ships will, as they did last Fall, command a profitable preference to any built on this Island.

What is to prevent the large proprietors from erecting Baking houses on their estates? I could not help thinking it somewhat singular to observe, a few days since, a quantity of Biscuit brought from St. John's, Newfoundland to this town, and driven on drays from hence to St. Peter's Bay, to feed the servants on a large establishment there.

Has the culture of flax and hemp been attended to? Once go-a-head in making your own canvass, twine and cordage, with the manufactures at present in operation, and then tell me what country can prosecute her fisheries with so many resources at her command?

It is the duty of every Journalist, no matter who is pleased or displeased, unceasingly to agitate the subject of the Fisheries, until this Colony is made worthy to be accounted a part of that mighty Empire which has shewn to all the world that commerce is preferable to a life of indolence and luxury.

It is to the wealthy, and to persons of influence in the community, that I would especially wish to direct myself, earnestly beseeching them no longer to act like drones in the hive, but with feelings becoming their situation, to come forward and save this beautiful but neglected Colony from being scuffed at, deservedly, by their more enterprising neighbours.

Sir: Among the many subtle practices of those who are termed zealous party men, but who, in plain language, should be called unprincipled politicians, is one which it behoves us all to be on our guard against being deceived by: I mean that of the misrepresentation of the speeches of the great men who hold high official stations at Home, and whose disinterested labours for the general good, and undoubted fitness for the very important stations they fill, it is rightly deemed a kind of petty treason to question.

I am led to make these remarks by having read in all the papers a report of some observations made by that wise man and consistent politician, the Right Hon. Lord Stanley, Secretary of State for the Colonies, &c. &c., who, when questioned as to his intentions with respect to the Canadian bill, is made to say, "that it was notorious that Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island were deficient in supply for themselves."

Now, Sir, can there be anything so derogatory to the character of a Colonial Secretary as to suppose him to have really spoken in such complete ignorance of the facts as regards this Island, which is all we have to do with in the present case? I hold it to be altogether improbable; and as I am apprehensive that an evil impression might prevail in this Colony if this report of his Lordship's speech should be generally received as a faithful one, I have, after much critical examination, come to the conclusion that his Lordship may better be understood to have spoken as follows:

"That the bill which he had introduced into the House regarded Canada alone, being in fulfilment of an engagement made with that Colony, but that the Government of which he was such a conspicuous member, in its earnest desire to do justly by all, and to give every reasonable encouragement to the other British North American Colonies, would shortly introduce a Bill extending the operation of the Act to them, and particularly to Prince Edward Island, as its Legislature had already passed a measure imposing a duty upon foreign wheat, in the expectation that by so doing it would acquire a claim to the same advantage as Canada."

This, Sir, I think, you will allow to be more like the Speech which may be supposed to have been uttered by His Lordship, in his benevolent and parental regard for the interests of this young and rising Colony; and I have little doubt that your accurate knowledge of his Lordship's consistent manner of delivering himself, will at once establish in your mind the accuracy of my report of his Lordship's remarks upon this occasion.

Sir: The Session of last year (1842), an Act passed to amend the Trespass Act, and the Fourth Clause of the Act, question provides as follows: "And he enacted, That when and as often as any goose or geese shall be found at large within the precincts of Charlottetown, it shall be the duty of each and every of the Hog-Reeves of the said Town, or any one of them, to take notice of the breach of their duty under the Act or Acts by authority of which they shall be appointed, to take and dispose of such geese, in the manner as hereinafter shall be taken up and disposed of; and such remedy shall not be taken up and disposed of with the right of any private individual to take up, seize and dispose of any such geese, as given and described in an Act passed in the Thirty-fifth year of the said King George the Third, intitled An Act to prevent the running at large of Geese within the town of Charlottetown."

Now, Sir, in gross violation of this solemn enactment, plain and explicit in legal bearing, geese are daily seen ranging at large through the streets of this Town; and what makes the matter more annoyingly notorious, the owners are frequently to be found among the respectable classes of the community. Two flocks of these objectionable creatures were seen this morning parading in Grafton Street, near the residences of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and are supposed to have come from the immediate neighbourhood of the Government farm.

It is to be hoped that this communication, Sir, will have the desired effect, and that the owners of geese will forthwith secure them, in such way as shall effectually prevent, in future, the intolerable nuisance now complained of. It is peremptory, on the part of the Hog-reeves, to take up all geese found running at large in the streets, and these officers are liable, in a penalty of Forty Shillings, for refusing or neglecting to perform their duty.

REPEAL! REPEAL!! ON Tuesday, the 11th inst., a numerous Meeting was held at the Ten-mile-house, St. Peter's Road, pursuant to public Advertisement, to appoint Repeal Wardens, to collect the contributions of those who are favourably disposed towards a Repeal of the Legislative Union between Great Britain and Ireland, and to forward such contributions to the Loyal National Repeal Association of Ireland.

That this meeting disclaims all connection with any political Society or Association whatsoever. 2. Moved by Robert Mooney, seconded by John McCarron— That while we will not yield to the people of any other part of the British Empire in loyalty to our beloved and most gracious Sovereign Queen Victoria, we hereby unhesitatingly declare our fixed determination, never to desist from peaceable and constitutional exertions, until Ireland possesses an Independent Legislature.

That the people of Ireland, who are proverbial for their loyalty, have violated no law by their multitudinous but peaceable assemblages to petition the Imperial Parliament for the REPEAL of the Act of Union—the right of petitioning the Legislature being, in the words of the Statute, "one of the true, ancient, and indubitable rights of the subjects of this Realm." 4. Moved by John Slattery, seconded by Patrick Mooney— That the unalterable determination of the illustrious Catholic Hierarchy of Ireland, and particularly of the Most Rev. Dr. McHale, the Right Rev. Drs. Higgins and Kennedy, to adhere to the agitation of Repeal, is hailed by this meeting with the most unbounded applause, and that we hereby repudiate the position— "That a Clergyman, by assuming the casocok, forfeits all right, as a citizen, to express his sentiments peaceably and constitutionally upon political questions."

That the unparalleled exertions of Daniel O'Connell, in the advocacy of his country's long unjustly withheld rights, and in the cause of civil and religious liberty throughout the world, demand our most unqualified approbation. The Chairman announced the Repeal Rent for the evening to be Eight Pounds Ten Shillings, which was received with loud cheers. Mr. Mooney was voted out of the chair, and Mr. William Fitzpatrick of Charlottetown was called thereto. Mr. Slattery moved, seconded by Mr. Richard Walsh—that the thanks of this meeting are due, and are hereby given to Mr. Harry Mooney, for his conduct in the chair.

The meeting, after giving three cheers for Queen Victoria, for Daniel O'Connell, and for Tom Steele, Head Pacifier of Ireland, was adjourned sine die.
