MACE & ORANGE SWEET BREAD

Mix and sift 3 times, 2 1/4 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 2 1/4 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 3/4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. ground mace, Cream 1/4 c. butter or margarine and blend in 1/4 c. fine granulated sugar; beat in 1 well-beaten egg, 1 tsp. grated orange rind and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture alternately with 1/2 c. milk. Turn batter into loaf pan (4 1/2" x 8 1/2") which has been greased and lined with greased paper. Bake in moderate oven, 350°, about 1 hour. Allow loaf to cool in pan. Spread sliced cold bread with butter or margarine for serving.

Suburban Area Building Permits

Forty-two building permits for the suburban area of Charlottetown, calling for an estimated construction valuation of \$334,360, have been issued by the Town Planning Division, Provincial Department of Natural Resources.

The permit calling for the greatest expenditure was that granted to the Island Fertilizer Company for the erection of a fertilizer plant in Zone 6. The plant, located on the old rifle range site, had a permit-estimate valuation of \$150,000.

Two permits were issued for residence construction in Zone 1 which is an area bounded by the City limits, Spring Park Road, Belvedere Road, and the North River. One of the new residences now being erected in that area will be that of Mr. Randolph Manning. Zone 1 is strictly a residential area.

W. G. Barbour is building a garage in Zone 4 with an estimated "permit" valuation of \$12,000. It is located just outside the City limits on the Malpeque Road. Zone 4 comprises that part of the suburban district between the Mount Edward and the St. Peter's Roads.

In Zone 2, an area bounded by the City limits, Spring Park Road, Malpeque Road, and the North River, Walter Pickard is erecting a sales and service station for farm machinery at an estimated cost of

Survey Finds Housewife's Lot Not Happy

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 14—(AP)—The housewife's lot is not a happy one, women doctors said today. The conclusion was voiced at the sixth congress of the Medical Women's International Association meeting here this week.

The women doctors presented the results of a questionnaire sent to 13 countries at a forum on the pathology and hygiene of housework. Replies from four continents all reported such troubles as dishpan hands, aching backs, sore feet, that tired feeling and frazzled nerves.

Dr. Dagmar C. Wilson of Britain, surveyed about 200 housewives ranging in age from 25 to 65. She said 79 per cent complained of tiredness, anxiety and depression; 78 per cent of flat feet, corns or bunions; frequent colds and coughs, 34 per cent; rheumatic aches, 27 per cent; severe headaches, 15 per cent, and disabling varicose veins, 12 per cent.
