The ship "Engenie," owned by Michael Foley, Esq., which sailed from Alberton for Georgetown, on Friday last, to take the balance of her cargo, anchored off Panmure Island on Monday night. On Tuesday morning she hoisted anchor, and through stress of weather was compelled to sail for Souris. In her foul of the breakwater and received very serious injuries to her bow. A TRIAL of a self-propelling steam fire engine was made in Springfield, Mass., the other day. The engine seems to be a vast improvement on all other self-propellers, for it was under perfect control, and could be run up and down streets with a grade of 17 to the 100, stopping at any point on the descent. It is questionable, however, whether the self-propeller is any improvement over the engine drawn by horses, and it is only in cities where the water pressure is very low that engines are to be desired at all, except for service on the outskirts. The self-propeller could not be allowed to travel any faster than the engines drawn by horses, for the reason that the danger to the public would be too great. Then steam must be kept up all the time or there will be great delay in starting. The object of all fire departments should be to get a stream of water going on the fire as quickly as possible, and for that purpose there is no system equal to the employment of fire hydrants.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. Last night a neatly dressed man, aged about 25 years, registered at Ebbitt House as Henry Seward Hubbard, of Providence, R. I. He told the clerk he wanted three rooms. These were given him, and as his baggage did not come he was asked to pay in advance. Hubbard had no money, but informed the clerk that he owned the entire city of Washington. The clerk discovered in his guest a dangerous looking crank, and had him immediately removed. He writes a remarkably good hand and is evidently a person of no ordinary attainments.

HUNNEWELL, Kan., Nov. 28. The excitement attending the suspension of the Danford Bank at this place culminated on Sunday with the gathering of a great crowd of creditors at the bank. The cashier promptly turned over money notes, &c., to the creditors and satisfied all who came. It is not yet known how heavy the losses will be. It is reported that Col. Danford, president of the chain of banks at Caldwell, Osago and Carbondale, has been arrested at Wichita, and that Mr. Smith, cashier of the Caldwell Bank, was also arrested, but nothing definite is known. Experts on insanity held a conference with Guiteau yesterday and then held a conference themselves, but no results are believed to be arrived at.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. Guiteau was examined to-day with reference to some papers. He is very uneasy about his personal safety. Nothing of importance was developed.

ABERDEEN, Mass., Nov. 28. On Saturday four men with a wagon passed through here en route to Arkansas. They encamped three miles west of Aberdeen, and Sunday evening was found lying on mattresses covered with quilts, each with his head split open as though with an axe. There are no evidences of robbery visible.

EUROPEAN.

LIMERICK, Nov. 28. This section continues to be in a very disturbed condition. The police have searched for arms in different localities.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The Times' Dublin despatch says: "Some more effective means must be found to restore order, unless the Government is prepared to let the country drift into absolute anarchy and revolution. Accounts received daily of outrages in various districts do not fully represent the truth."

It is understood that Boyd has refused to row on any river but the Tyne, and as Shanley's representative insists upon the match being rowed on the Thames, negotiations are expected to be declared off.

Fifty barges were sunk in the Thames during the late gale. Extensive floods are reported in the upper Thames valley.

Lefroy retraced his confession of murdering Lieut. Roper, saying that it was made under a hallucination. The execution will probably proceed to-morrow.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The greater part of the pier at Ventnor has been carried away.

The London Times, referring to a proposed government expedition to the Arctic ocean, to search for the missing expedition, say there is only too much reason to fear that the Jeannette with her brave crew must be added to the list of vessels which have perished in the Arctic seas.

LONDON, Nov. 28. At a meeting of the Grand Lodge of English Freemasons, on the 7th of December, the Prince of Wales will move a vote of condolence with the family of their late brother, James A. Garfield.

LONDON, Nov. 28. Arthur Lefroy's solicitor has written a letter to Sir Wm. Harcourt, the Home Secretary, stating that Lefroy confessed the murder of Gold and Lieut. Roper, and asking him to grant an immediate interview, so as to allow him to fully explain Lefroy's statement, which convinces the solicitor that Lefroy is the victim of homicidal mania.

To All Whom it May Concern.

THE undersigned having been appointed, by the Governor, General in Council, Inspector of Leather and of Raw Hides for the Division of Charlottetown, which comprises the whole of Prince Edward Island, notice is hereby given that on and after this date I will be prepared to examine and inspect all Raw Hides and Leather, at the Shop formerly occupied by David Wilson, Esq., Richmond Street, opposite London House.

Special attention is called to the 6th and 97th sections of the General Inspection Act 1874, which are as follows:—

96. The Inspection of Raw Hides shall be compulsory at every place where an Inspector or Deputy Inspector has been appointed; and every Raw Hide sold, offered for sale or exported, offered for export or laden in any vehicle or vessel for the purpose of being exported, and which has not been first inspected and stamped or marked as herein required, shall be forfeited; and the person so selling or offering for sale or exporting the same, shall incur a penalty of one dollar for every Hide so sold, offered for sale, or exported.

97. The expression "Raw Hides" shall mean and include all untanned or uncurried skins commonly used in the manufacture of Leather.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same,'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election for One Person to Serve as Common Councilman in the City Council for Ward Number Five of said City,

in place of HENRY B. SMITH, Esquire, resigned, will be held on

MONDAY, the Fifth Day of December, A. D. 1881, at the place following, that is to say:

In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Easton Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARD. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies North of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

Nomination of Mayor and Councillors.

Act 43 Victoria: "SEVEN days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and addition of such persons together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination by such candidates."

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose. Qualification of Electors. See Act 42, cap. 15, sec. 20 and 64.
