Boston Markets.

POTATOES, &c.—The potato market has sustained a pretty strong tone, with sales of Houlton Rose at 50 to 53c, and Hebrons at 53 to 55c.

CHEESE.—There is not much change to note in cheese. Trade has been fair, but it is still difficult to cover the extreme rates paid in the country.

EGGS.—There has been a fair demand for fresh eggs and prices are well sustained. Eastern extra command 24 to 24c, New York and Vermont 22 to 23c, and Northern and Island 22 to 22c.

FISH.—Receipts of Mackerel at Boston for the week foot up 6,685 brls., including 4,197 brls from the fleet and outports, and 2,488 brls from foreign ports.

Indians to be Executed.

A despatch from Ottawa states that the Indians who have been condemned to death for the part they took in Riel's insurrection will be executed. The example, it is thought, will have a salutary effect on the tribes which might be inclined to disaffection.
