

Parkdale Dumps Saints 6-4 In League Opener

Parkdale Flyers scoring four goals in a furious third period sank St. Dunstan's University 6-4 in the opening game of the Island Senior B Hockey League at the Sports Arena last night.

Nearly 1200 fans watched the Flyers overtake 2-0 and 3-1 S.D.U. leads and burst forth with a three goal effort in the last ten minutes of play to send the Saints to defeat.

Saints had a wide edge in play in the first two periods and except for stellar goaltending by Frank Roper would have been carrying a lead a lot higher than 3-2 into the third period.

Orin Carver's marker at 18:53 of the third was the insurance tally. Gaston Roy, Daley, Paul Davey and Miner MacDonald hit for St. Dunstan's.

Referee Leith Jay and Don Whelan handed out 12 penalties, six to each team. Jack Kane of Saints and Skip Carver of Park-

dale received majors for scuffling late in the third period. Apart from the fisticuffs in the last minute of play, however, the game was very cleanly played.

Frank Roper kicked away 32 drives - 25 in the first two periods - and Earl Shepherd handled 26.

SAINTS TAKE LEAD
Gaston Roy shot the first goal of the season at the 2:02 mark of the first period and seven minutes later the Saints were leading 2-0 when Daley slipped in Kane's pass-out.

Orin Carver jumped out of the penalty box at 14:26 and Josey's pass landed right on his stick to give him a clean cut breakaway for Parkdale's first goal. The first period ended 2-1.

Saints surged ahead 3-1 when Buck Davey caught the Flyers defence napping and drove a loose puck by Roper but Jim MacLeod found the target on a three way passing bout with Willie Dunn and Erland Wood to cut the lead to 3-2.

But the Flyers had only begun to play and goals by Jim MacLeod Wood, Dunn and Orin Carver again settled the outcome.

Besides Roper, Jim MacLeod and Dunn were outstanding for Parkdale while Johnny Whelan, making his first start in a Saints uniform shone brightly on the blue line.

He has shown improvement and, depending upon how he feels, his doctors say he may be able to resume practice next Monday with just a possibility he can return to regular play late next week.

Irate Britons Cancel Tour Of Russian Hockey Outfit

LONDON (AP)— Bitter public reaction against Russia's suppression of the Hungarian rebellion Tuesday led the British Ice Hockey Association to cancel a planned tour of this country by a Russian hockey team.

J. P. (Dunny) Ahearne, secretary of the B.I.H.A. and chairman of the European Ice Hockey Federation, also dropped a hint that Moscow may lose the world championships, scheduled for February.

Ahearne said the Russian tour had been cancelled "in deference to public opinion following recent events, as it was felt that such games would be inadvisable under present circumstances."

MAY DROP CHAMPIONSHIPS
Ahearne said no decision had been reached about the world

championships in Moscow but "it is known that some of the leading countries outside the Iron Curtain already have decided to boycott the championships." He did not name the countries.

Ahearne added that the tournament next month at Stockholm for the Ahearne Trophy a competition in which the Russians usually take part—will not be held.

The Russians were scheduled to open their British tour in London, Nov. 8 and end it at Brighton, Dec. 5.

Last Summer the Swiss Ice Hockey Federation called off three matches which Russians were to have played against Swiss teams at Christmas. The Wembley Lions, a leading British team, cancelled a proposed tour of Russia.

Sawchuk Hottest Goaltender; Beters Efficiency Rating

TORONTO (CP)— Terry Sawchuk was the hottest goaltender in the National Hockey League last week and, as a result, was the only one of the six regular netminders to better his mark in the league's efficiency ratings.

The three-time winner of the Vezina Trophy was instrumental in Boston Bruin's winning streak which was extended to six games. He turned in outstanding performances against New York Rangers, Detroit Red Wings and Montreal Canadiens, who were beaten twice by Boston last weekend.

Sawchuk stopped 109 of the 115 shots fired at him in the four games for a .948 average, which boosted his season's rating six points and moved him closer to second-place Glenn Hall of Detroit.

Hall led eight of 109 shots get by him for a .927 mark on the week and a .936 average for the season.

Jacques Plante, the regular Montreal goalkeeper, was on the injury list all week but his .951 season's mark is still top. Gerry McNeil, who held the Canadiens' goaltending chores for four seasons before Plante succeeded him, filled in for Plante but recorded a poor .902 average as he was beaten 11 times out of 12 shots.

Lorne Worsley of Rangers lost 11 points on his season's average as he turned in the worst performance

ance by any goalie in a single week this term. Ten of 80 shots beat him for an .875 average and .941 on the season. Johnny Bower replaced Worsley in a game against Canadiens but the Habs fired 24 shots at him and scored four times, giving him a .833 average.

Ed Chadwick, rookie Toronto Maple Leaf goaler, recorded an .885 average on the week for a .909 season mark and fifth place. Chicago Black Hawks' Al Rollins slipped two points to .907 on the season.

TEAM QUIETLY CONFIDENT

Canada's Olympic Squad Ready To Start Training

MELBOURNE (CP)—Canada's Olympic contingent was scheduled to swing into intensive training sessions today with most team members quietly confident of a good showing in the Games starting Nov. 22.

Two plane-loads of Canadians arrived here Tuesday. The contingent was made up of oarsmen, weightlifters, a track team and a basketball team.

The athletes kept a general air of confidence throughout the trip from Vancouver even though a few officials remained noncommittal about Canada's chances against the cream of the world's athletes.

Ken Farmer of Montreal, president of the Canadian Olympic Association who travelled here with the team, said he is confident the Canadians would give a good account of themselves — both as

strong contestants and as sportsmen.
OLYMPIC PREVIEW
World mile record-holder John Landy stretches his legs competitively tonight for the first time in six weeks at suburban Geelong in another preview of the Olympic Games.

With the nationalist Hungarian flag now flapping at the Olympic village and the Hungarian athletes settled in quarters no more than 60 yards from the Russians, political tensions gave way to sport.

Interest ran high in the meet at Geelong both because of Landy's test race and the appearance of the United States record-shattering track team.

Landy, who has been bothered by sore Achilles tendons, will run in the two-mile event against Russian star Vladimir Kuts and other Australians, including Dave Stephens, Alan Lawrence and Dave Porter.

"I am not completely satisfied

with my form," Landy said Tuesday. "I badly need sharpening up. Tomorrow's race should tell me how I am going."

MEETING OF CHAMPS
The race will mark the first meeting of Landy and Kuts, who holds the world record for the 10,000 metres and has excellent times in the 5,000 metres.

The Australian and U.S. teams will clash at Geelong in the 400- and 1,000-yard events. Pole vault, shotput and hurdles events also are scheduled.

After their arrival, the Canadians headed for a good night's rest before starting training.

The oarsmen, an eight and a four from the University of British Columbia, were lodged at Ballarat about 75 miles from Melbourne, where the rowing and canoeing events will be held.

The weightlifters went to the Olympic village at suburban Heidelberg. A second plane-load, comprising the basketball and track

teams, arrived late Tuesday night from Sydney.
OAKLEY TOP WALKER
Track coach Fred Foot of Toronto praised the training performance of two members of the team, Terry Tobacco of Cumberland, B.C., and Alex Oakley of St. John's, Nfld.

"I believe Tobacco has an extremely good chance of getting into the 400-metre walk and that Oakley will pick up points for us in the 20,000-metre walk."

"From the information I've been able to get Oakley is probably in the top 12 men of the world in the walking event. Tobacco has certainly shown me he has class."

Tobacco also will anchor Canada's 1,600-metre relay team of Doug Clement, Murray Cockburn and Laird Sloan.

Foot said Diane Matheson of Montreal and Moncton, N.B., Eleanor Haslam of Saskatoon and Maureen Reyer of Regina are "three of the fastest girls we've ever had in Canada."

Combined with Dorothy Kozak of Calgary, these four could be point-getters in the women's 400-metre relay, he predicted.
