AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS.

The farmers are told of the high tariff on agricultural implements, but there is not one of such implements made in Canada that is not sold more cheaply by ten per cent, to-day than it was sold for in 1878.

CORN.

Mr. Blake made a great deal of noise about the tax on corn, but he did not tell the people that the Government reduced the taxes on molasses and tea to a greater amount than the whole duty on corn.
