### OBJECT OF THE GERRYMANDER

The Mail and Empire has this interesting contribution to the literature of the Mallock gerrymander: At the last general election the popular vote stood thus:

Conservative..... 417,685  
Liberal..... 392,107  
Independent..... 55,522  
Patron..... 30,655

Yet the Liberals had a majority of the members and took office.

In Ontario the party vote stood thus:

Conservative..... 191,220  
Liberal..... 166,335

Yet the Liberals elected forty-four members and the Conservatives forty-three.

The gerrymander is designed to cure this injustice by enabling the minority of Liberals to elect a still larger majority of members.

It is a fraud upon the people worse than the Crow's Nest steal, for while the Crow's Nest took money the gerrymander steals liberty.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—A letter in the Birmingham (Eng) Gazette reiterates the reports of official wrongdoings in the Yukon, and says of the enquiry that "it is a complete farce."

—At a meeting of the Mount Allison regents held last week it was decided to rebuild the college residence larger and grander than before. An appeal will be at once made to the Methodist denomination for financial assistance.

—"The weakness of human nature" is the Liberal excuse for recent election court exposures in Ontario. The Gazette says that it looks as if the Hardy Government represented "the weakness of human nature."

—When the Liberals were in opposition they could not find language strong enough in which to describe the iniquity of the iron bounties, remarks the Mail and Empire. When Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Richard Cartwright, Mr Fielding, and Mr Patterson got their hands on the tariff, the bounties seemed to be sealed. Mr Fielding's

—The High Joiners have proved a costly luxury for Canada and the result will be nil. During the stay of the Commissioners at Washington even the tips of servants, to the amount of over four hundred dollars, were charged up to the country, while they got along with forty-six dollars' worth of towels and eleven dollars' worth of soap and matches.

—Alexander Smith is the Liberal party's Ontario organizer. There was a bye-election in West Huron some time ago which he took a part in. He was wound up as a witness but though detectives hunted for him for two days he could not be found. The Gazette points out that this is a fair indication of the kind of man Smith is, and of the kind of work a Liberal party organizer is expected to do.

—Reports to the Presbyterian General Assembly recently in session at Hamilton, Ont., show that in Canada there are pastors, theological professors, secretaries, agents, etc., to the number of 1,013. The retired ministers and those without a charge are 188. There are 850 charges that are self-supporting, but 208 that are not. The total membership of the church is 212,126. Contributions to the salaries of ministers amounted during the past year to \$1,162,176. Contributions for all purposes were \$2,511,175.

—The Americans gave Spain \$20,000,000 as an indemnity for the possessions taken from her, and now Germany not only gives Spain \$5,000,000 for the Caroline Islands, but she turns over three coaling stations to Spain and promises to defend them in time of war. This promise may at some future time impose a serious burden upon Germany, as the Philippines and Cuba certainly has done the United States. Germany gets the islands unencumbered with a rebellion, however, and that is more than the Americans get.

—Mr. Fielding has been declaring in Parliament his belief that if all the early confederatists in Nova Scotia were not scalawags, all the scalawags were confederatists. Under Liberalism we are getting accustomed to a good many unseemly things at Ottawa. Anything more unseemly than this sneer at the men who helped to make confederation possible, by a man who holds the portfolio of a minister under confederation, has not yet been put in evidence, remarks the Montreal Gazette. It suggests that some scalawags were, and are, anti-confederatists.

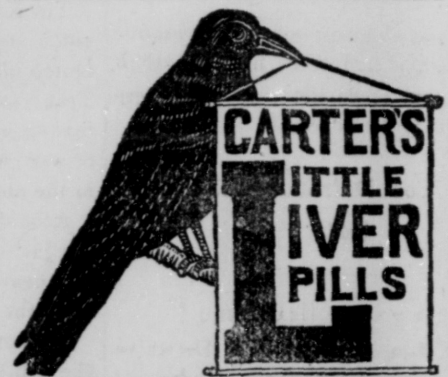

### SCOURGE IN INDIA

#### Many Persons Die From a Virulent Plague Calcutta

LONDON, June 23.—The Lancet says: "Between January 16th and February 30th, 360 deaths from the plague, were recorded in Calcutta. Doubtless the number was much greater, for the natives hide all cases as long as possible. The disease is not as virulent as in Bombay, where it often acts fatally within a few hours; but the natives refuse European aid, and no case of recovery is known. The English medical men regard with envy the effective, if somewhat brutal manner in which the Americans cleaned Havana. In Calcutta this is impossible, as there is no room in the native quarters. Everywhere there are little puddles of water, amidst the most filthy surroundings, and this water is used by the natives. It is worse than the water of the river. The city has a good supply of well filtered water, but the natives will not use it. Persons about to leave Calcutta for the interior are examined as to the state of their health, but it is impossible to carry out the regulations strictly, and many towns have been infected. In Bombay the plague is worse than ever. There are about 250 deaths a day from the plague, sometimes 2,200 a week. The people who regard Bombay as a doomed city may not be far from wrong. Past experience shows that the epidemic recedes for a few weeks during the hottest season, but only to reappear when cooler weather sets in. In the interior of the peninsula the mortality from plague is also very high in many places."
