Five Drivers Charged With Being Impaired

SUMMERSIDE — Almost \$900 in fines was taken in yesterday in Summerside Police Court for offences committed over the weekend.

Five persons accused of operating a motor vehicle when their ability to do so was impaired by alcohol appeared before Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C. Joseph A. Gallant, RCAF instructor, Summerside, charged with impaired driving, pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned until June 26. Bail was set at \$125.

Russel Gardiner, Central Bodega, was fined \$10 and costs for driving without due care and attention. Police evidence revealed that Gardiner was travelling 45 m.p.h. on a Summerside street.

Gordon Edward Cook, RCAF Station, Summerside, was fined \$10 and costs for driving a motor vehicle without being in possession of an operator's license.

Lorne W. Arsenault, Grand River, charged with impaired driving, had his case adjourned without plea until June 26. Bail was set at \$125.

Emmanuel Mallet, Travelers Rest, and Frederick Borgel, Cape Breton, N.S., both forfeited bail of \$25 for being intoxicated in a public place when they failed to appear in court.

Outlook For Hay Claimed Brighter

A marked improvement has been noted in the hay and pasture crops in P.E.I. over the past few weeks, when the outlook was described as grim by reliable department of agriculture spokesmen.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae told this paper he expects a reasonably good crop, with the old meadows showing up good, and some of the new meadows showing a good grass growth, although clover appears to be almost non-existent.

Daniel Galt, Carverville, who pastures upwards of 100 steers annually, said that the pasture crop is really good now, although he had been pretty nervous several weeks ago, when a new grass showed little growth.

It took the few warm days to change the grazing picture, he observed.

The agriculture minister suggested that almost complete lack of cover in new meadows this year was caused by failure to germinate during the dry summer of 1961, and not by winter kill, as some others have suggested. Mr. MacRae said several new meadows showing a good growth of other grasses, although there is no clover.

However one farmer not far from Charlottetown said a few days ago that one of his new meadows is so poor he was thinking of plowing it and seeding the field to grain.
