It was a happy occasion for Colonel F. I. Andrew to note in his annual presidential report to the Ayrshire Breeders of Canada that three of the production shields for 1956 were won by Island herds. Col. Andrew has just returned from a meeting in Montreal.

In the 305 day division she took top honours with 15,250 lbs milk, 631 lbs butterfat.
