The competition began on the Drury range about ten o'clock on Thursday morning, says the St. John Sun. The condition was difficult for good shooting. There was a strong, gusty wind, with drifting fog. It was not only difficult to hold a rifle, but also to get a sight. The targets were almost half obscured by the fog. The riflemen managed to finish up the 200 yards contests on the Drury range, but then it had to be abandoned. The shooting there ceased about noon, and the match had to be finished at Sussex in the afternoon. At Sussex the men found a fine, bright day, with drifting clouds, with alternate light and shade. The wind was from the right front, was brisk and came in strong gusts. It was not a day for good shooting. The men started at the 500 yards range and at the P. E. Island end splendidly. They rolled up a score of 243, or 14 more than the Nova Scotians secured, and added a point at this range to their lead over New Brunswick. Pte. Smith of the 2nd Batt. P. E. I. started off with an inner this time and then got six bulls, making the best score made at any range. Sgt. Crockett did almost as well, and scores all through were big. A CLAIM TO GREATNESS. (Montreal Gazette.) The new crop of critics who deny Sir John Macdonald's title to greatness are neither consistent nor wise in their generation. If proof of Sir John's capacity were wanted it would be found in the critics' tributes to his stupendousness of the men he has overthrown. Taking Confederation as the starting point, it is seen that he has met and defeated Mr. Mackenzie, who, in his own mistaken, was undoubtedly a good man in every good sense of the term. Then Sir John tackled that heaven-sent orator and statesman, and intriguer and wobbler, Mr. Edward Blake, and Mr. Blake went down, and away. Sir John fought with Mr. Laurier, who (always taking the declarations of Sir John Macdonald's opponents) is as an orator an exponent inferior, if to anyone, only to his predecessor, Mr. Blake, and who possesses, moreover, unrivalled magnetism and the power of winning men's hearts. And Mr. Laurier was beaten as Mr. Blake has been. Mr. Laurier (and Mr. Blake, too) led with him Sir Richard Cartwright, the greatest (see Liberal papers) master of finance, the greatest trade authority, the greatest debater in Parliament. There were among the Liberal captains, Mr. Miller, the greatest constitutional lawyer and philosopher, and Mr. Paterson, of Brant, and Mr. McMillen, and Mr. Fraser, and Mr. Michigan Charlton, and Mr. Edgar, and Mr. Somerville, and Mr. Sutherland, and Mr. Lister, and Mr. Fisher, whose varied and variegated greatness is constantly being set forth before an admiring coterie, and the aggregate of whose debating talents only the Hansard can give an idea of. Sir John Macdonald can give his association of stupendous mental giants and worsted them, not in one fight, but time after time; and moreover taught his successors the trick. For the sake of their own friends' feelings the Herald and other detractors of the man whose monument is on Dominion square should admit that he had some qualities that appealed to the popular hearts. Unless they do this the public will come to think that those tales of high debating power told about every new recruit to the Liberal parliamentary ranks are false, and that Liberal leaders' greatness is itself a myth.
